**CARGO OF VODKA
TAKEN OFF SHIP;
OILER ARRESTED**

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—Federal authorities seized 1,299 cans of vodka, two automobiles and Howard Wise, an officer on the States line steamship Oregon early today, a few hours after the vessel docked here from San Francisco where it is reported to have undergone a systematic search.

The liquor, customs officials said, was brought in by members of the Oregon crew. Oil smeared on some of the cans of vodka had officers to believe it had been hidden under plates in the engine room.

Clyde J. Hagby, customs officer, who was notified by San Francisco authorities that crew members were under suspicion, arrested Wise after drivers of two automobiles had escaped. It is believed the motorists were to transport the vodka shipment.

ONE SHOT IN LEGS**

TURKEY CROP OF ROGUE VALLEY TO BE "ENORMOUS"

MEDFORD, Ore., July 10.—The turkey crop of the Rogue river valley the coming season will be enormous and the largest in the history of Southern Oregon, according to Clay D. Parker, manager of the farm exchange co-operative. A recent survey of the turkey situation by that organization reveals that the turkey death rate is low, that grasshoppers and other forage are plentiful and no other fowl malady is cutting down the turkey ranks.

DIET AND CANCER SUBJECTS BEFORE MEDICAL MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., July 10.—Although Americans have advanced from the fried potatoes and pie for breakfast, there still is a tendency toward a diet conducive to degenerative diseases, Dr. Lovell Langstroth, San Francisco, told members of the American Medical association here today.

Dr. Langstroth said that a study of 500 sick persons revealed that 85 per cent of them ate chiefly bread, meat, potato, sweet, deserts and other foods poor in vitamins. Many of them improved on a diet of fresh milk, fruits and vegetables, he said.

Dr. E. T. Quigley, instructor in the University of Nebraska medical school, who has done extensive research work in cancer, said that so many "sure cures" for cancer have been announced or are about to be announced, that sufferers are under the impression that "the day of salvation is just around the corner."

"This state of mind," Dr. Quigley said, "is what makes it so easy for the quack to market, at a huge profit, his utterly worthless nostrums."

"When the medical profession ceased seeking a cure and turned to the cause of cancer, the death rate slowed up. Primarily there seems to be four causes. Constant irritation of tissue, chemical irritation, and heat and infection," he said.

Dr. Quigley advised watching the diet and consuming sufficient vitamins to ward off a possible attack. Such things as white bread and sugar, the doctor said, gave cancer an opportunity to gain a foothold in the body, where vitamins tend to obliterate it.

Dr. Albert Soland, Los Angeles, urged the increasing use of the X-ray and radium in the treatment

of disease and said the use calls for a special medical field of radiation. Dr. Soland said, that although most laymen associate the use of radium with cancer, it has been found to be valuable in the treatment of other skin diseases.

MOVIE "IT" GIRL TO WED HARRY RICHMAN

LOS ANGELES, July 11.—Clara Bow, oft referred to as the "IT" girl of the screen, is engaged to be married.

The announcement came last night from Harry Richman, musical comedy actor and night club owner of New York, who is the bridegroom-to-be. The marriage will probably take place within a month, pending completion of pictures Miss Bow and Richman are now participating in at separate studios.

Richman began his career at a cafe near Los Angeles, later going to New York where he first won success. He was married to Yvonne Stevenson in 1918 at Santa Ana, Cal., and divorced in 1923. Miss Bow has never been married.

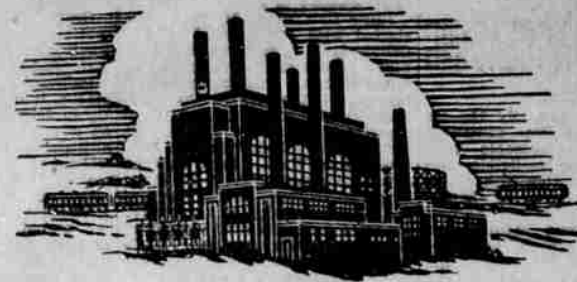

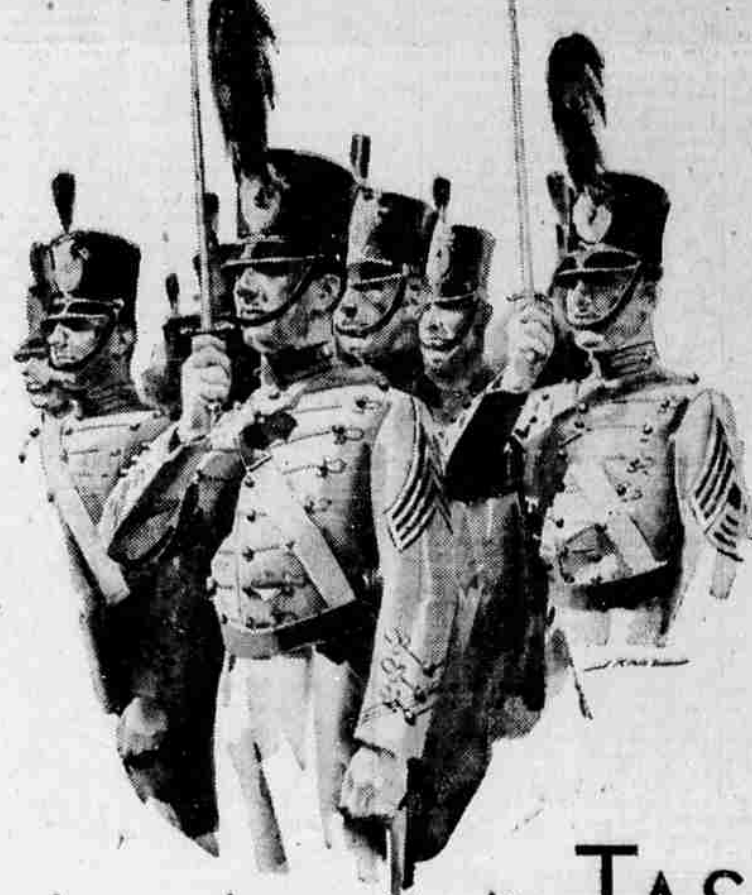
