Reinhardt, through the skies. Neither had had any outstanding previous flying experience. Mendell, the older of the two, was a balloon pilot during the war, but did not take up heavier-than-air flying until 1921. He had logged 3,500 hours in the air when the endurance flight started. Reinhardt was so new to the flying game that he had just acquired his private pilot's license, after training at a Vancouver, Wash., air school.

When the endurance record was broken, a public becoming a trifle weary of a growing series of records established apparently only for the purpose of being broken again, read and passed on and would have forgotten—but the "couple of tough hombres" would not quit. Gradually it became apparent that there was something new—the mere breaking of a new record and setting of a new mark was not the goal. Mendell and Reinhardt furnished the world an innovation—two young fliers, who, having won all possible honors, kept on just for the fun of it. They want to see which will last longest, man or motor.

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FORMER ROSEBURG WOMAN IS DEAD
