ACTORS' SOCIETY OUSTS 5; OUTSIDE CONTRACTS MADE

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., July 11.—

Five actors were suspended and two others reinstated by the Actors' Equity association in meeting here last night. It was announced by Frank Gilmore, president. While no statement was made as to the cause of the suspensions, it is understood they resulted from making contracts with talking motion producers without sanction of the organization.

The suspended were Tully Marshall, Anders Randolph, Raymond Hatton, Louise Dresser and Henry Otto.

The action was interpreted to be the first move of Equity in its demand made on producers here recently that only contracts from pickup members of the association be accepted by them. The leading members of the industry here made a flat refusal of the demand, insisting that open shop continue.

Rumors, the source of which could not be located, were yesterday that the equity association planned a preliminary strike by setting today as the last time in which members can appear as extras with non-talking picture production work. Producers maintained that the proposed walkout would include insufficient members to cause embarrassment.

Equity officials refused to comment on the reports.

A California jury awarded Mrs. Mohr \$100,000 but Mrs. Tingley appealed the case to the state supreme court.

CATHOLIC SOCIETY OF AMERICA WILL MEET IN SALEM

SALEM, Ore., July 11.—With the arrival of the special train from Chicago and St. Louis Saturday morning, the 73rd annual convention of the Catholic Central Society of America and the National Catholic Woman's Union, will open here, the first time the two organizations have met further west than St. Cloud, Minn., or San Antonio, Texas.

Willibald Ehlmer, of New Ulm, Minn., national president, and other national officers, will arrive on the special train according to the latest advices.

General participation of Oregon Catholics in the convention will take place Sunday when Catholic Day will be observed at the state fair grounds. Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, D. D., archbishop of Portland, will be celebrant at the pontifical high mass in the open air at the fairgrounds at ten thirty Sunday morning. More than 15,000 people are expected to attend the high mass.

Women of the various church organizations in the county will serve dinners and lunches at the fairgrounds at noon and a program of speeches and music has been arranged for the afternoon.

Rt. Rev. Charles D. White, D. D., bishop of Spokane, will deliver the sermon at the high mass in the morning. Addresses of welcome will be made in the afternoon by Archbishop Howard and by Governor Isaac Lee Patterson. Rt. Rev. Msgr. Louis Nau, rector of St. Mary's seminary at Cincinnati, will speak on "Religion in a Nation," and August Brookland, assistant director of the Central Bureau of the Catholic Central Society, will speak on "The Meaning of Catholic Action." Sunday evening the Salem young people will entertain the visitors with a play in St. Joseph's hall.

Convention sessions will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Dr. Stevenson, who is a psychiatrist, told of interviewing 150 patients at the Cornell clinic, and how he found that there is often a big difference between the patient's complaint and his motive in coming to the doctor.

Menigitis Ban Ready

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—Regulations which the United States health bureau has prepared as a bulwark against the invasion of America by cerebro-spinal meningitis were in the hands of Secretary of Treasury Mellon today, telegraphed him last night by Dr. Hugh S. Cumming, surgeon general of the public health bureau.

Dr. Cumming is in Portland in connection with the American Medical association convention.

Determined to prevent a recurrence of the meningitis epidemic which swept the country in 1918, Dr. Cumming sent the telegram to Secretary Mellon and outlined that the disease, under federal law, is not quarantinable. Special regulations were set by the general to restrict entrance of persons from the Oriental lands.

Regulations covering arrivals of persons from the Orient who might bring in the contagious disease will be in effect within a few days, the general said.

Authority of the regulations, Dr. Cumming pointed out, is found in the act of 1937 passed to halt the cholera epidemic on the Atlantic coast during the Cleveland administration. This act empowers the president to restrict by executive order the "importation of persons or things."

RIDDLE IRRIGATION PLANS BOND ISSUE

The projected Riddle Irrigation District, which was recently started for the purpose of establishing irrigation for a large section of land in the Riddle valley, will soon issue bonds in the sum of \$25,000 according to a statement made yesterday by O. V. Logsdon, in speaking before the chamber of commerce forum luncheon. The district will have an approximate valuation of \$125,000, and the land will be security for the bonds, making a very safe investment. It is proposed to sell as much of the issue as possible among the farmers benefited. Mr. Logsdon says, but it will probably be necessary to sell part of the bonds outside the district.

gallons of fuel in its tanks, the "Untin" Bowler awaited favorable weather early today at Port Burwell, Labrador, to dash across Hudson and Davis Straits to Mt. Evans, Greenland. The next scheduled stop on its flight from Chicago to Berlin.

The Chicago Tribune, which is backing the flight, was told by Robert Wood, aviation editor and passenger on the "Untin" Bowler, that thick fog and unfavorable winds kept the amphibian out of the air yesterday. The day was spent, Wood said, in fighting to keep the plane from being crushed by huge ice cakes blown into the fjord where it was anchored.

Swedes Again Halted
COPENHAGEN, Denmark, July 11.—Advices received here from Iqvit, Greenland, state that Captain Albin Ahrenberg and the crew of the airplane Sverige, reached Iqvit this morning in a motorboat after landing at Kingait bay from Reykjavik, Iceland.

The word from Iqvit was that Captain Ahrenberg encountered increasingly bad weather and decided to fly along the Greenland coast.

Perceiving that they would be unable to continue to Iqvit, the Swedish airmen made an excellent landing in the dark and lit fires to attract attention.

These beacons were noticed by a motor boat, which put in and took them safely to Iqvit. They intended to return to Kingait bay as soon as possible to fetch their machine.

Iqvit, which is on latitude 61 north, is about 100 miles or so around the corner of South Greenland, Cape Farewell, and was used as a supply station for the Sverige. Mount Kumpalt is on the north shore of Arak Fjord and is outside the firths near Iqvit.

Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—Veal, pork and poultry were being quoted higher today.

Broilers of the 12 pound variety were priced a cent higher at 23 to 24; heavier broilers two cents higher at 27 to 30; choice veal a cent higher at 20 to 22; pork a cent up at 16 to 17 cents. These were buying prices.

Spring lambs and old pork ducks were lower at 20 and 23 and 18 and 20 cents respectively. Other varieties of fresh meats and poultry were firm.

Egg and butter prices remained unchanged.

In the fruit line, The Dalles is shipping in some excellent avocados which wholesalers are holding at \$1.50 for 15 pound boxes. Little if any decline is expected in this fruit because of the shortage of the California crop.

With shipments from Imperial valley lessened, water melons and cantaloupes were steady. No further price recessions were looked for until other areas begin shipping. Oregon and Washington melons and cantaloupes are not due till the first of August.

Car trading was somewhat sluggish at the Union avenue market of the Gardner and ranchers. Association with prices ranging above or below those of Wednesday. Raspberries were slightly cheaper; strawberries were scarce; black caps were plentiful and easier; loganberries were not much in evidence, Bing cherries were cheaper at 10 cents, while the Royal Anns were absent because of the demand and prices at the canneries.
