EUGENE PLANS TO ENTERTAIN RECORD CROWD AT PAGEANT

EUGENE, Ore., July 12.—(Special)—Visitors from all over Oregon are expected to be in Eugene July 25, 26 and 27 for the Sunset Trail celebration, and a busy three days will be in store for all, it is declared by Hugh Ross, manager of the event.

Starting Thursday evening, July 25, with the first performance of the Sunset Trail pageant, events will be provided for each following morning, afternoon and evening. While the pageant will be the outstanding event, three other features will offer entertainment and be of interest to the thousands who are expected to be here. These will be the pioneer parade, to be held Friday morning, the air circus to be held Friday and Saturday afternoons, and the industrial parade Saturday morning.

The pioneer parade will be of interest to people from every corner of Oregon, for Cal M. Young, head of this feature, has entries from every part of the state. Nothing is up-to-date will be allowed in this event, yet indications already are that it will be about three miles long. Covered wagons that

actually crossed the plains, ox teams, replicas of early log homes, the first post office in this part of the state and many other relics will be included, while real pioneers, to whom the relics will recall memories of early days, will be in the line of march.

Entries from every section of the state are also expected in the industrial parade, declares Jack Magdary, chairman. Industries, products and resources of Oregon will be graphically shown in this. Several Oregon cities have already entered queens as members of Queen Susanah's court, a part of the parade.

At least 30 planes are to compete in the air circus, with additional competing ships from army and navy posts. It is announced by E. C. Simmons, chairman. Races, stunts, parachute jumps and other features will thrill lovers of this sport.

Organization work on the pageant itself is now completed and regular rehearsals of the cast of 1500 are going ahead under the direction of Mrs. Doris Smith. The dawn of civilization in the Oregon country, the coming of the pioneer and finally the development of resources and industries will be graphically and beautifully depicted during the show to be staged on Hayward field.

Preparations are already under way to take care of a record crowd during the celebration.

LONDON, July 12.—Lloyd's Land's End wireless station received a message from the Spanish steamer Cristina today stating that she collided with and sank the British steamer Seaforth, 349 tons, during a fog near the Bristol channel.

The Seaforth's crew was saved.

VALETTA, Malta, July 12.—The X-1, largest British submarine afloat, today reported an explosion aboard during naval exercises in the Mediterranean. No lives were lost, no one was injured and the vessel was stated to be only slightly damaged.

The submarine, which is attached to the Mediterranean fleet, is returning to Malta under her own power, escorted by the cruiser Ceres, and is expected early tomorrow.
