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Our American Birds

Popular Home Lessons in Natural History

THE BIRD OF THE WEEK
(By Louis Albert Banks)
(Cut out this block each week and you will soon have an interesting bird book of your own.)

THE KILLDEER

The killdeer is the universal bird representing the plover. It winters in the Gulf states and South America, and spreads all over North America in summer from Maine to Oregon and from Florida to Manitoba. It is a suspicious, restless, noisy, uneasy bird, always on the alert; it runs and flies rapidly. It loves the shores and the beaches and margins of both fresh and salt water and, falling that, it satisfies itself and is content with a springy, marshy spot in the meadow or the pasture. Its food consists of mollusks, insects and their larvae, which it gathers from the surface of the ground, especially in damp wet spots. The killdeer is from nine and a half to ten and a half inches long, practically robin size, with a conspicuously black band across both breast and neck, and reddish brown upper tail coverts, the latter showing plainly when the bird is flying, or as it alights and quite daintily lifts its wings for a moment before sitting down. It is a very trim, neat, dainty bird, and always looks well kept. His song or call note is well known to every boy or girl. "Killdeer, killdeer," which it gives both on the wing and standing still.

During the breeding season it is a noisy bird, calling or scolding incessantly as it circles about over the field or pasture where its nest is placed. The nest may be in a cornfield or on the shore of a lake or creek, and is sometimes lined with little pebbles from a sandbar. The three or four eggs are sharply pointed and heavily mottled with varying shades of olive-green and black. They often raise two broods in a season.

"Killdeer! Killdeer!" How it rings across the sands along the lake! "Killdeer! Killdeer!" How he sings. No matter what the way I take! Cries and runs so swift away. By water-side or moistened land; See the killdeer's way of play— With him just two can make a band.

Morn or noon it is the same— The timid bird runs to and fro, Seems to always play the game, Is ever ready on the go. Seems forever in alarm With head a-bobbing up and down, Timid bird, that's half your charm. We'd soon forget if you calmed down.

Why this constant talk of killing? Not who is seeking you offense. Calm your nerves, if you are willing. And let us talk some common sense. Stop this painful, saddening note, And cheer your heart to softer lay; Give us something sweet to quote Before your sorrow turns us gray.

"Killdeer! Killdeer!" Still he cries: "He hearkens not to my appeal. 'Killdeer! Killdeer!' till he dies. He cries aloud in changeless peal. Restless world, so full of fear, This life's locked doors all open to love. Kindness now will bring peace near. Not clashing sword, but harmless dove.

committee was unanimously adopted. By this arrangement members will pay \$2 a year to the local club treasurer, who will forward \$2 of this amount to the state association to be used in promotion of its work. The plan was voted by means of an amendment to the constitution which also allows for bequests from individuals or firms.

Want Better Protection
Mr. Lockwood told the governor before presenting him to the group that the primary purpose of the state game organization is to further preserve the game and natural resources and that the association is an "honest organization looking forward to the betterment of wild life in this state."

The chairman also introduced Charles Childs, Albany, a member of the legislative interim committee named at the last session to study the fish problem. Mr. Childs declared that every session of the legislature has seen a fish fight between the commercial interests and the sportsmen and that the interim committee is seeking a way to avoid such conditions and at the same time secure an adequate supply of fish for all time to come.

Members of the committee, to whom the sportsmen pledged their aid, are Gus Moser, Lloyd T. Reynolds, Salem; A. C. Marsters, Roseburg; Fritz Conkonek, Astoria, appointed by the president of the senate and Homer R. An-

gell, Portland; Earl Snell, Arlington; Charles Childs, Albany; A. W. Schoupe, Klamath Falls, and Roderick Macleay, Gold Beach, appointed by the speaker of the house.

Sam Koser briefly stated his desire to see the wild life of the state pass on to the coming generations and complimented the sportsmen on their work.

GREAT INTEREST BEING SHOWN IN POULTRY PROJECT

A great deal of interest is being shown throughout the county in the matter of increasing the number of producing hens, signed up with the state association, to secure a packing plant in Roseburg, according to J. C. Leedy, county agent. A survey is now in progress to determine exactly the number of hens now raised up, and it is believed that the reports will show in excess of 50,000 in this county. A committee will go to Coquille on the 20th, and will endeavor to interest the poultrymen of that locality in joining the state organization, which, if successful, will give almost enough hens to make up the minimum requirement of 75,000.
