WORK OF RAZING OLD COURTHOUSE MOVING RAPIDLY

Work of razing the old county court house is proceeding very rapidly, under the supervision of Leo Williams, local contractor. The work is being done by the county on force account. Mr. Williams has employed a crew of laborers, and the county has placed several of the prisoners at work, giving the men credit on their sentences for the time employed.

The walls were torn down very rapidly by use of tractors and trucks, which were used to pull down the bricks in large sections. It was necessary, however, to take down the north wall by hand, due to the proximity to the new building, so that there would be no damage to the structure.

The bricks are being hauled to the property recently purchased by the county across from the county home, and will be piled there to be cleaned by prison labor, and then sold out in small lots as demanded. The best of the lumber is to be used to construct sheds for housing county road machinery. Other parts of the buildings are being sold at good prices.

The county court advertised for bids for tearing down the structure, and the best bid received was for \$1600 plus the salvage. Judge Hamilton states that he is confident the cost of razing the building will be under the amount of the bid, and the county will still retain the material.

WEST COAST MILLS SHOW REDUCTION LUMBER SURPLUS

SEATTLE, Wash., July 15.—A drop in production of about 85,000,000 feet, or 45.13 per cent, is reflected by the reports of 208 identical mills for the week ending July 6 when compared with the previous week, according to the West Coast Lumbermen's association. Orders received by these mills during the week ending July 6 were 41 per cent over production. This big spread between production and orders has bettered materially the already strong position of the West Coast lumber industry.

Production reported by 277 mills for the week was 118,547,231, or 77,435,551 feet less than this group of mills cut during the preceding week. Production for these mills was 42 per cent of their rated weekly capacity.

The inventories of 140 identical mills, whose week by week reports since January 1 are on record with the association, were lowered considerably during the week. The amount of stock of these mills shows a decrease of 14.8 per cent since the first of the year.

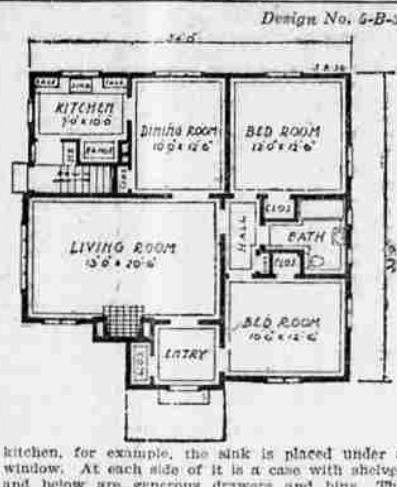
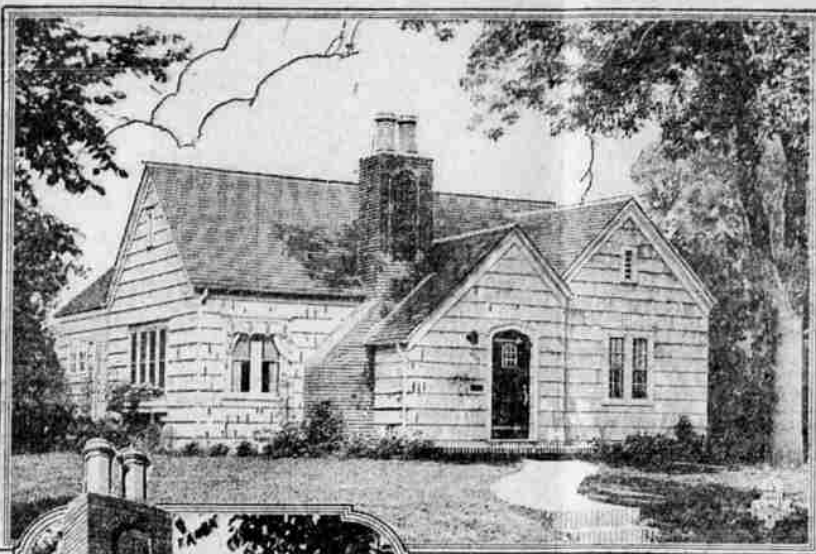
208 identical mills report. Two hundred and eight mills whose production, orders, and shipment records for four weeks past are complete at the association office reported the following for the week ending July 6:

A PICTURESQUE SMALL HOUSE



Simplicity of Entry Lends Charm — Economy of Design Striking

HERE is a house almost without hallways, very little space is taken up for stairs. That means practically the whole area is given over to use and the home builder gets full value for his money. It also means a house that will be easy to keep in order, particularly designed for the woman who has to do her own work.

The living room is big and airy, with a fine fireplace. An entryway protects this room from drafts from the front door. At the end of the room is a great battery of casement windows which insure fine lighting. Double casement windows at the front add light. There is plenty of wall space for large pieces of furniture.

The kitchen and dining room arrangements have been worked out for greatest convenience. In the

kitchen, for example, the sink is placed under a window. At each side of it is a case with shelves and below are generous drawers and bins. The range is placed in an alcove. A hood above this will insure proper ventilation of the kitchen at all times. In the rear entry is a broom closet set into the wall so that it takes no space from the floor plan. There is also space for the refrigerator. A china closet is arranged in the corner of the dining room, over the doorway to the basement, thus also occupying no floor space that could be used otherwise.

The bed rooms are separated from the living room by a hall. The bathroom is between them. There is a recessed tub. The lavatory is on an outside wall with windows on both sides of it. Each of the bed rooms has a large closet with a linen closet in the hall.

Construction: Wood frame, exterior finish large shingles, brick or cement base course, roof of shingles.

Facing: East or south. Reversed plans should be secured for other facings or to take advantage of peculiarities of the site.

Size of lot: Approximately 45 feet.

COAST ROAD BIDS BEING ASKED BY HIGHWAY BOARD

The state highway department has issued a call for bids for the grading of a 10.1 mile section of the Drain-Reedsport road. This is known as the Drain-Red Bridge section, which lies between the town of Drain and the Elk creek bridge at the base of Hancock mountain. This road is to be relocated, right of way having already been purchased by the county, and will be graded to standard state highway specifications. At the same time bids will be received for the construction of two bridges on the section. The route was surveyed by the state highway engineers, who established a large part of the road on new location, which will give better alignment and grade, but calls for the discarding of much of the road previously built.

The construction of this section will carry the road to the foot of Hancock mountain, from which point on there is a question regarding the course to be followed. The present grade goes over the mountain in a series of switch-backs, while the project of tunnelling the mountain has been advanced.

MINE VENTURE RUMORED

Fred S. Blakely, former Roseburg resident, is reported to be heading a large mining development at the famous Sterling mine in the Apple gate district near Jacksonville. Water filings on upper and lower Squaw lakes and Elliott creek for the storage of 2,000 acre feet of water and appropriation for mining and irrigation purposes led to the rumor. 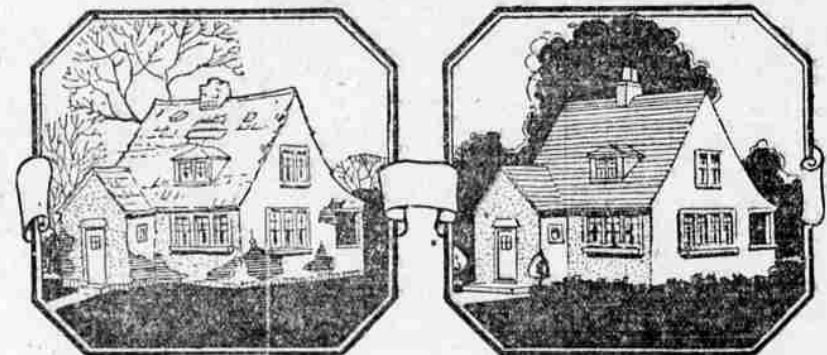
