The Roseburg All-stars were almost completely eclipsed by Conster pitching for Glendale, connecting only for 2 safe hits during the entire game. Conster, with Schleich supporting him behind the sack, struck out 12 All-stars. When the All-stars did connect with the ball, good fielding by Glendale prevented anything getting started on any damage being done, so that during the first 6 innings only one All-star even saw 2nd base. In the 7th inning Glass and Bales brought in Roseburg's only tallies on a hit by McGee who was caught out at home when he tried to stretch a 3 base hit into a home run. In the 8th inning Wood reached 3rd base largely on Glendale errors but all other All-stars never got as much as a good look at 1st base.

Bales started out to do the twirling for the All-stars. He pitched 4 innings during which time he walked 1 man, struck out 2 men, while Glendale took 9 safe hits out of him and converted 8 of them into tallies. Glass then
