The minister of railways announced he had word from Harbin normal passenger and freight service was being maintained despite "wholesale changes in personnel."

U. S. Stays Afloat
WASHINGTON, July 16.—Reports from Riga that the United States might be asked to assist in a settlement of the Sino-Soviet situation arising over the seizure of the Chinese Eastern railway were not considered seriously today.

The general consensus was that the United States will desire to remain neutral in the controversy. The Washington government has always maintained a policy of not introducing itself in a controversy between two nations unless each party specifically asks for American assistance.

It was remarked that since the United States does not recognize the Soviet government some difficulty might arise in the manner of approach which the Soviet could make with an arbitral proposal.

Consulate Stopped.
BERLIN, July 16.—The communist newspaper Rote Fahne today said there was a demonstration in front of the Chinese consulate last night with the demonstrators crying "down with Nanking's war mongers."

Enquiries at police headquarters were told "nothing was known there about the demonstration." Rote Fahne said stones were hurled at the consulate's windows and many panes damaged before the police appeared on the scene.

Other cries heard in the demonstration were "down with the Kuomintang's murderers of workers" and "defend and protect Soviet Russia."

China's Officials Reply.
NANKING, China, July 16.—An official spokesman for the national government stated this afternoon that his government considered the strained relations between Russia and China over seizure of the Chinese Eastern railway would be settled without great difficulty.

"Moscow's note, termed in some quarters an ultimatum, is being telegraphed from Moscow to Nanking in four sections, three of which have already arrived," read a statement issued by this official spokesman.

"The nationalist government considers the alleged crisis one comparatively simple to settle. The nationalist government is willing to settle the Chinese Eastern railway questions by negotiations."

"The government considers it necessary that the Chinese-Russian agreement of 1924 be faithfully carried out. The soviet government has never fulfilled the terms of the agreement."

"The nationalist government is willing to release its Russian prisoners if the soviet is willing to release the Chinese imprisoned in Russia, where approximately 1,000 Chinese are imprisoned."

"The government is not only willing to negotiate the Chinese Eastern railway question, but all outstanding Chinese-Russian problems."

"Friendship between the nationalist government and the soviet remains firm."

"The nationalist government has no ill feelings toward Russia as long as the latter does not engage in propaganda against the nationalist government."

"The government is planning to send an envoy to Moscow to negotiate questions. This envoy will call at Harbin enroute for a final investigation of the Chinese Eastern railway problems."

CANYONVILLE MAN CHARGED POSSESSION OF LIQUOR
Arnold Casper, arrested at Canyonville last Friday, was charged with possession of liquor and not with sale, according to Sheriff Jackson. Statements were made, the sheriff says, that Casper was accused of sale of liquor, but the officers have no proof that sales were conducted by the man who was arrested. Casper's arrest was made when he and a group of four other men visited a cache of beer which the officers had discovered and were watching. The Canyonville man entered a plea of guilty to possession and was fined \$100 and given 30 days in jail.

Troops Line Frontier
NANKING, China, July 16.—The soviet ultimatum to China allowing three days for restoration of the status quo in Manchuria and submission of differences on the Chinese Eastern railway question to negotiations was handed to President Chiang Kai Shek yesterday, July 15. He immediately instructed C. T. Wang, foreign minister, to return post haste from Tientsin to take up the Russian problem.

A soviet official message said 100,000 Chinese troops were concentrated at the frontier station, Manchull, on the Siberian border, where it was alleged soviet troops were digging themselves in on their side of the international line.

Five thousand Chinese soldiers have been sent to reinforce the eastern section of the Chinese Eastern railway.

Invasion Reported
PERING, China, July 16.—Messages received here through foreign sources today said 2,000 Russian troops had crossed the Great Black river near Hlaingyachuan, Siberia, last Monday and a few days later attacked and destroyed a Chinese river steamer. Chinese soldiers were sent to repel the invaders.

This report could not be confirmed in any other sources and was discounted by military observers.

Another Harbin report said that to armored cars and a hundred armored motorcycles have been sent to the western frontier.

The messages were said to have emanated from Chinese sources in Harbin and Changchun.

War-Like Maneuvers
SHANGHAI, July 16.—Kuomintang official news dispatches from Nanking today said six armored trains were patrolling the entire line of the Chinese Eastern railway between Harbin, Manchuria,

STATE COMMANDER SPANISH WAR VETS SAW HARD SERVICE

The business sessions of the 21st annual encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans, department of Oregon, are being presided over in a very capable and efficient manner by Robert Campbell of Portland, department commander, who is not only a very active member of the veterans' organization, but has seen active service in the war of 1898-99.

His commander, John M. Stotsen, was killed in the battle of Quinua, April 23, 1899. Mr. Campbell was under fire in thirteen major engagements, besides numerous scouting expeditions.

He came to Oregon from Nebraska in 1915, and is employed as an inspector in the freight department of the Union Pacific railroad company at Portland.

For the past fifteen years he has been very active in the affairs of the Spanish War Veterans' organization, and during the past year, while serving as commander, has given very able and efficient service. He has seen the membership grow to a marked degree during his term in office, and has directed the activities of the organization along highly constructive lines.

GIRL RIDING ON RUNNING BOARD OF AUTO IS KILLED
SALEM, Ore., July 16.—Mildred Stoutenburg, 16, was killed on the Salem-Dayton highway near her home at Unionvale Monday evening when the automobile in which she was riding skidded and overturned in the gravel. She and three other girls, none of whom was seriously injured, were standing on the running board.

Felix Wetman, 52, was instantly killed here yesterday when a scaffold on which he was standing to paint a house collapsed. He fell head foremost upon a concrete driveway.

JUDGE RAPS ARREST OF MAN BECAUSE FACE RED
BUFFALO, N. Y., July 16.—Halt-ing a man on the highway by state troopers on suspicion that he was a violator of the Volstead law just because his face was of a rosy hue, was branded yesterday by Judge John H. Hazel, as "a shock-outrage."

Two troopers from Batavia barracks testified they stopped Walter Trzask, of Lima Lake, because his countenance was "real red and flushed." They said they found alcohol and beer in his car.

Trzask was indicted by the grand jury. Judge Hazel dismissed the indictment and vacated the evidence.

EVERETT HOME AT GLIDE DESTROYED BY BLAZE MONDAY
Fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the home of Edward Everett of Buckhorn Creek near Glide, yesterday at about 11:30 in the morning. The blaze was first noticed by Mrs. Everett who was in the yard. The flames were burning through the roof. Neighbors endeavored to put the blaze out but were unable to control it. Practically all of the furnishings of the house were saved.

According to reports the house was completely covered by insurance. The damage was estimated at approximately \$1200.
