

MARKET COSTS FIRST TARGET OF U. S. FARM BOARD

(Associated Press Local Wire)
WASHINGTON, July 17.—The federal farm board announced today that no loans would be made out of its \$150,000,000 fund available, pending a determination of policy.

Reduction of the marketing costs of agricultural products will be sought by the board as a means of boosting the farmer's returns without adding a corresponding increase to the consumers' expenses.

To accomplish this objective, the board has set itself to the task of organizing the farmer's marketing facilities on a gigantic national scale, working all the time with the thousands of voluntary groups of farmers who are organized or who may be organized on a basis of specific farm commodities.

The board's announcement warned that "deliberate" action must be expected. It was revealed that several appeals are pending from agricultural groups but no hint was given as to the probable disposition of the \$150,000,000 which the board already has available out of the \$500,000,000 loan fund.

The board's decision to work through the farm organizations in its drive for reduced marketing costs is expected to lead to many conferences with the agricultural leaders. Regional commodity meetings are planned "as soon as time will permit" in such sections as the need for them becomes apparent.

Chairman Lerge is enthusiastic about the rise in wheat prices. He says it is justified by crop reports and weather conditions both at home and abroad. "Although I would like to take as much credit as possible for it for the board," the "psychological effect" of the establishment of the board, he believes, has helped.

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"Angelino" Fliers Set New Endurance Mark



Much of the credit for the new endurance flight record which L. W. Mendell and R. M. Reinhart established recently in their Wright Whitebird equipped Buhl airplane at the Culver City, California airport, can be contributed to the ingenious oiling system which the two fliers perfected before starting on their record-shattering flight, states G. M. Krell, local manager of the Western Auto Supply company.

Endurance fliers in the past have been faced with the problem of properly lubricating the valve

tappets and rocker arms of the motor. Mendell and Reinhart worked out a force lubrication system which is of utmost value to endurance airmen and under other conditions where the plane cannot be landed for oiling.

A set of Atomite nipples, the same type as used on automobiles, were installed on each side of the cockpit. From these couplings, four oil lines led to each cylinder—two to the rocker arms and two to the valve tappets. This battery of thirty-six oil lines permitted Mendell to thoroughly lubricate all of

the rocker arms and valve tappets from the pilot's seat in five to eight minutes' time. Speedy lubrication was made possible through the use of an improved type high pressure Atomite pressure gun.

"Featherlike" mattress was used by the fliers for their bed. Messages from the men in the ship stated that it afforded them a good night's rest. Other equipment included two Russell Lobe parachutes, non-breakable vacuum bottles, air cushions and helmets.

WHOLLY DRY UNITED STATES IMPOSSIBLE, VOLSTEAD SAYS

Author of Prohibition Enforcement Statute Declares There Always Will Be Liquor For Those Who Want It But That Drunkenness Will Decrease—No Intention to Regulate Public Morals.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 17.—Andrew J. Volstead, "father of the dry law," has decided that the time will never come when a person cannot get an intoxicating drink if he wants it.

Perfect prohibition is as impossible as perfect prevention of murder or robbery, he says.

Getting him to comment upon himself on the cause he espoused is a task requiring patience. He shuns publicity, and for that reason the country that has come to regard his name as synonymous with prohibition has lost trace of him.

Six days a week the tall, spareman of 70, gray-haired, wrinkled and seldom smiling, is at his desk in the northwest prohibition enforcement headquarters here. He is the legal adviser.

Volstead, an chairman of the Judiciary committee of the lower house of congress, led in the drafting of the prohibition enforcement act in 1919. Later he was defeated for reelection.

Some of his views
Out of his experiences in the enforcement bureau, Volstead has reached some conclusions. There always will be liquor for those who want it, he believes; "homebrew" often is more poisonous than moonshine; the sale of malt and hops combination should be banned; the buyer is as morally guilty as the seller, and the sale of hotel serving "beverage" is morally violating the law.

Volstead holds that prohibition has brought great prosperity to the average man; has reduced drunkenness and poverty; has made remote a temptation and raised the social standards of a nation. He thinks Great Britain even usually will try prohibition, and other European countries will follow.

He has no patience with the claim that prohibition is an attempt by law to regulate morals, and therefore, illegal.

Drunkenness Big Issue
"Law does regulate morality," he observed, somewhat heatedly for such a cautious individual. "Law has regulated morality since the Ten Commandments were given."

"Personal liberty has been taken away, cry the wets. Personal liberty also was taken away by the quarantine laws, and the right to steal was taken away by the law against larceny."

"The American public has to answer only the question as to whether prohibition is the best known method of eliminating drunkenness, not whether the law is perfect."

Beauty Contests Hit
Beauty contests are given the taboo in a resolution passed by the National Catholic Women's union in Tuesday's evening session of their national convention. "We vigorously urge Catholics to avoid such beauty contests in every way, not to patronize business people who promote these contests, nor to subscribe to papers that feature unbecoming pictures of the participants."

A vulgar, competitive parade of purely physical attractions designed to attract the attention of the masses and rob her of that grace and delicacy which is the source of her real charm. Such contests, by their very nature, become the source of temptation to many and often the cause of ruin to the participants."

False and perverted feminism is also scored in a resolution adopted Tuesday evening by the National Catholic Women's union whose national convention closed here Wednesday afternoon.

"As at former conventions," says the resolution, "the national Catholic women assembled in convention at Salem, Ore., deplore the decline of women's character, the influence on humane society, especially as to the dress which of late has assumed the appearance of an immoral display. We, therefore, emphatically deplore the trend on the part of the girls and women who by displaying too much of their physical form have become a source of temptation to all men, young and old. A nation-wide campaign for a dress which although stylish will inspire the reverence and respect of all well-meaning people."

Resolutions condemning birth control as "immoral because it is diametrically opposed to the divine commandments and to the sacredness of the matrimonial state, as an Christian because it is based on a flat denial of the faith in divine providence, and unpatriotic because it drives out the very roots of our national stability," were also passed by the women's organization.

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NEW ENDURANCE FLIGHT FAILURE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—A broken off line last night ended the second attempt to set a world's record in endurance flight record with the California-built monoplane San Francisco.
