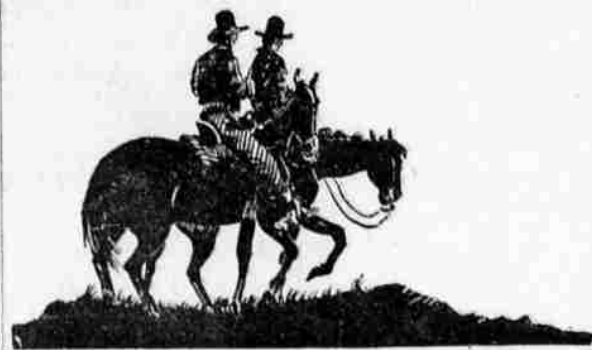
way, then on the Roosevelt highway, and will continue south on the Redwood highway before returning to their home in Burbank.

FIRE LOSS FOR SIX MONTHS OF 1929 WAS LOWEST SINCE 1925

SALEM, Ore., July 18.—(Special)—Reports in the department of state fire Marshall Leo show that the fire losses for the first six months of 1929, outside of Portland, amounting to \$1,409,833, were \$27,900 less than for the first six months of 1928; were the lowest of any previous corresponding period since 1925, and \$259,983 below the average six months losses for the five years previous.

The fire losses in the state for the month of June of 1929, aggregating \$197,114, were approximately 27 per cent greater than for June of last year, but were lower than for any other June since 1923 and \$192,794 less than for the average June losses for the previous years.

Dwellings and their contents suffered the heaviest of the June, 1929 fire losses with an aggregate of \$116,329, or 59 per cent of the total, in 45 of the 64 fires reported during the month. Six dwelling fires entailed losses of \$60,400. Farm dwellings, barns and outbuildings were damaged in the amount of \$59,960, or 25 per cent of the total, in 20 fires. The Owyhee irrigation project in Malheur county suffered a \$50,000 loss by a fire at the dam and headworks. A Klamath Falls lumber yard fire, \$7,900 and a theatre fire at North Powder, \$6,600, comprised the other major losses of over \$5,000 during the month.

In the list of known causes of electricity and defective wiring stand at the head of the June losses with \$56,972; rubbish and sparks are second in point of aggregate damage with \$51,971, and overheated or defective flues, chimneys, etc., were held responsible for \$16,724 of the total. Two fires of incendiary origin inflicted damage in the amount of \$5,100; four explosion fires caused losses of \$5,470, and 33 fires of unknown or undetermined origin exacted a toll of \$37,885 upon the state's economic resources.
