

# PITTSBURGH LEAD IN NATIONAL RACE CUT TO ONE GAME

## Series Opener Dropped to Giants as Cubs Climb Nearer by Victory Over Brooklyn.

The Giants yesterday turned back the Pirates by a 1 to 0 in the three game sweep through the Brooklyn Robins for an 11 to 7 decision. The Pirates remained in the top perch in the league standing, but they enjoyed a margin of less than one full game.

Another Chicago victory today, nudged by another Pirate defeat would send the Cubs back to the top by a percentage margin with the standing in games a virtual tie.

A five run rally in the eighth inning old "Alex the Great" to pick up credit for the Cardinals' 6 to 4 victory over the Braves. The Phillies turned back Cincinnati by 6 to 4.

The Yankees were raised out in Cleveland, and the Athletics picked up a technical advantage of half a game by defeating the Red Sox 8 to 4. The Mackays' margin now is eight and one-half contests.

More important to Connie Mack than this paper advantage of having won a game which the Yankees yet have to play was the showing of George Walberg who in recent games had threatened to enter a slump. ### HIGH SCHOOLS TO HAVE HELP OF GUIDANCE EXPERT

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, July 19.—For many years state institutions have been providing extension specialists to help the farmers with their problems, but Oregon State college will be as far as is known, the first to provide such assistance for the



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boys and girls of the state—to help them with that most important problem, selecting their life work. In announcing the appointment of Leighton L. Love as vocational guidance specialist on the college staff, Dr. J. R. Jewell, head of the school of vocational education, said that any high school in Oregon may have the services of Mr. Love upon request.

Experiments and observation have demonstrated, says Dr. Jewell, that it is now possible to assist an individual to choose the career which offers him the best chances of success, and to warn him against those for which he is not fitted. Application of these principles prevents misfits, by directing individuals into the work in which they will be most successful and happy, and helping them to decide whether the expense of higher training is necessary for the career they wish to follow.

### ITALIAN CITIES ROCKED BY E-SECOND TEMPLOR

FLORENCE, Italy, July 19.—Florence was shaken by an earthquake yesterday. The shock lasted about eight seconds and did considerable damage to walls and roofs in neighboring villages.

Roofs fell and crevices appeared in walls in Borgo, San Lorenzo, Vecchio, Barberino, and Firenzezola, but no personal injuries were reported.

The Piazza Michelangelo, the Campo de Marte, and Le Gascone were full of fearful people, while the populace of the hamlet Mugello went out into the fields to sleep.

At Bologna the shock was lighter than at Florence. At Faenza and Castel Del Rio the inhabitants were greatly alarmed.

### SONNENBERG DEFEATS RUSSIAN STRONG MAN

TELSA, Okla., July 18.—Gus Sonnenberg, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, defeated Master Kirilenko, Russian strong man and circus performer in two straight falls here last night. Kirilenko, who has been in the United States five months, held his own with the champion until he misadvised a try for a flying mare and his head struck the canvas. He was an easy victim for Sonnenberg's flying tackle.

The champion gained the second fall in less than a minute. The time of the first fall was 35 minutes.

### PRESBYTERIES OF SO. OREGON, COOS BAY ARE MERGED

ALBANY, Ore., July 19.—Urging his hearers to "preach about God," and to "get rid of 'man worship,'" Dr. Henry W. Wilson, director of the board of national missions of the Presbyterian church, yesterday was a speaker at the conference of the Oregon Presbyterian synod here. Ministers and elders from every section of the synod attended the meeting.

Consolidation of the southern Oregon and Coos Bay Presbyteries was the most important business beyond the synod, and was favorably acted upon. The resulting Presbytery now reaches from the eastern boundary of Lake county to the Pacific ocean, and from the California line to the Empqua river. It embraces 27 churches and membership of 3025, and has 21 ministers in its jurisdiction.

The Rev. Joseph Snyder of North Bend was elected moderator.

### LAKE MICHIGAN SWEEP BY DAMAGING STORM

Marines described the storm as the worst in 29 years. Excursion steamers and freighters sought their way with difficulty through the tumbling waters.
