PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—Brisik trading and wide variety of offerings marked today's session of the east side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association. A number of new seasonal products made their appearance at comparatively reasonable prices. Among the latter were green apples, green peppers and egg plant. In the price changes, currants, pie cherries and squash were up, while turnips, Bing cherries and cabbage were slightly lower. White corn was 10 cents cheaper as yellow hantam began to arrive in quantities.

Following prices were quoted: Peas 45¢; beans 85¢; yellow corn 60 cents; white corn 50¢; carrots, beets and onions 25 cents; turnips 45¢; lettuce 30¢@1.00; celery 90¢@1.00; celery hearts \$1.50; squash \$1.50; cucumbers \$1; Bing cherries 90¢; potatoes 3; cabbage 90¢; raspberries \$1.75@2.25; blackcaps \$1.75; currants \$1.75; green apples \$1.25 lug box; peppers \$2 box; eggplant \$1.75 box.
