TURKISH CITY RAVAGED BY FIRE; SEVERAL LIVES LOST

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.—The greater part of the older part of the city of Angora was ravaged by fire today.

Six charred bodies were recovered in the ruined buildings when the fire was brought under control after burning 8 hours.

The total number of casualties had not been listed. It was estimated that more than 1,000 shops and houses were destroyed. The financial loss will be considerable.

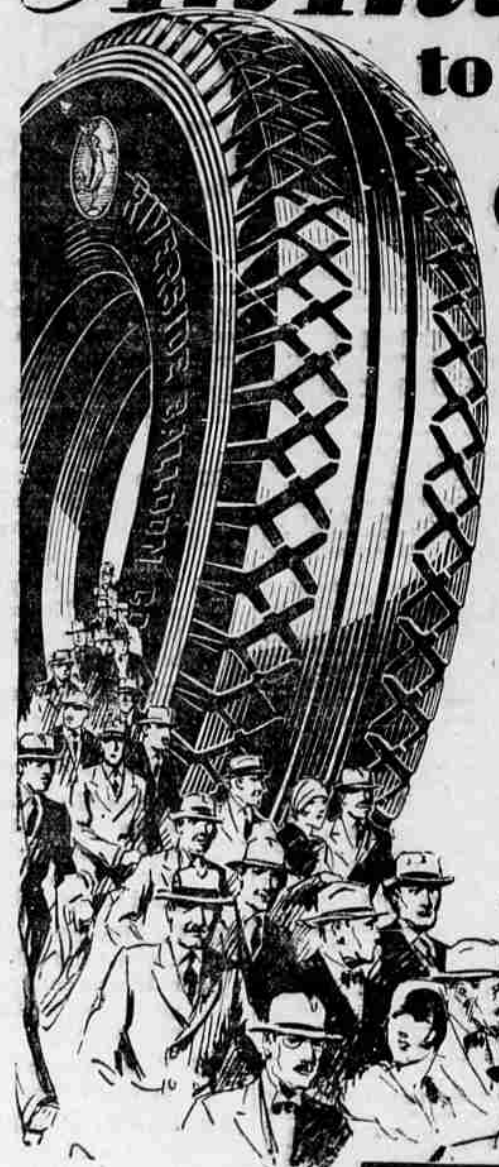
