

## LOCAL CANNERY STARTING ANNUAL PACK OF CHERRIES

## THREE AIRPLANES TRYING TO BREAK ENDURANCE MARK

ST. LOUIS, July 18.—Two St. Louis airplanes in an "endurance derby" continued in the air today, the "St. Louis Robin" starting its sixth day and the "Missouri Robin" its second day aloft.

The "St. Louis Robin" had been up 120 hours at 7:17 a. m. and ap-

proached the halfway mark of the record endurance flight recently made by L. W. Mendell and R. B. Beldhart, California aviators. The plane, piloted by Jackson and Forest O'Brien, appeared to be in good spirits as they took on a new supply of gasoline and breakfast from the refueling plane.

The "Missouri Robin," a sister ship that went aloft yesterday, also was flying smoothly this morning over Lambert-St. Louis field. It is piloted by Joseph Hammer and W. Gentry Shelton.

HOUSTON, Texas, July 18.—The monoplane "Houston-Billion Dollar City," piloted by Glenn L. Zoomis and Joe Glass continued aloft today in a second attempt to break the refueling endurance record of 246 hours, 43 minutes 32 seconds. The plane took off at 1:49:54 p. m. yesterday.

Motor trouble forced the plane down on the first attempt after it had been in the air 29 hours.

## ALLEGED HEAD OF JAIL BREAK EFFORT SHOT BY OFFICER

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho, July 18.—William Colgate, pioneer citizen, was shot and seriously wounded by a deputy sheriff who said Colgate was the ring leader in an attempted jail break. Colgate, who had lived here for 20 years, was serving a sentence

on a federal charge of liquor in possession. Deputy Sheriff K. T. Holmes said Colgate came from his cell after having obtained permission to use the telephone.

Then, the officer said, Colgate raised a smuggled claw-hammer in a threatening manner. Holmes drew his pistol, and Colgate dashed from the jail, only to be shot by the officer. Six men in the "tank" had been planning to get away, police here believed.

## ROGUE FRUIT MEN TOLD TO CONTINUE CARE IN SHIPPING

MEDFORD, Ore., July 18.—Edwin Smith, Seattle, foreign fruit expert authority, told directors of the Rogue River Traffic association and members of the Fruit Growers' league here today that "while there was no complaint from spray residue on fruit last season, British importers of north-west fruits fear a let-down on the part of growers and a recurrence of the former trouble which will upset the markets." Smith was at one time connected with the United States embassy at London. The spray tolerance issue is so firmly ingrained in the minds of the British people, Smith said, that strict adherence to its regulations by apple and pear growers is imperative.

He declared that in spite of increased sales of northwest fruit in continental Europe last year the Great Britain market was "still worth more than all the rest to the Pacific coast."

Smith decried the use of old boxes and careless packing of labels on fruit boxes as leaving a "bad impression on the trade of the United Kingdom."

Jorgenson senior, who had questioned Robert when he found the rifle and a ramrod on the floor of the attic, took the youth to the district attorney. The case was given to the juvenile court.
