AGRICULTURAL NOTES

Stock Worm Remedies

No drug or mixture of drugs now known can truthfully be offered to the public as an expeller or vermifuge for all types of worms which infect poultry and other animals, says the Food, Drug and Insecticide Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Manufacturers of products are to be held accountable for selling treatments found not effective, according to a recent ruling, and it is expected to save farmers many thousands of dollars.

Spider Mites

The small pests are continuing to do considerable damage in the peach and pear orchards of the county. The first evidence noticed is a curling or shriveling of the leaves, similar to that caused by a lack of moisture.

Summer sprays for peach and pear consist of 1 to 1 1/2 gallons of liquid lime sulphur, plus 5 pounds of wettable sulphur to 100 gallons of water, or sulphur dust 50 to 100 pounds per acre. Either of these sprays will also give protection in case brown rot develops.

Summer oils, 1 to 1 1/2 gallons to

100 gallons of water are more often used for peaches because of the danger of russeting.

Walnut Aphids

Walnut trees are badly infested with a small, pale yellow aphid on the undersides of the leaves. These insects are producing great quantities of honeydew, causing severe smutting of the foliage. A thorough spraying with sulphate of nicotine, 2 pound to 100 gallons of water, or dusting with a 2 per cent nicotine dust, will satisfactorily control these insects.
