OREGON POULTRYMEN WANT HIGHER DUTY ON EGGS

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 19.—Higher tariff on dried eggs as a means of encouraging establishment of drying plants in this section of the country to absorb small eggs and eggs of good quality

which, however, are unmarketable, is sought by the Oregon Poultrymen's association. The association adjourned its seventh annual session here yesterday, after election of officers. Lloyd A. Lee of Salem was elected president.

Chinese competition was discussed by the poultrymen in recommending higher tariff on eggs and processed eggs. A committee of the association will wait on Representative Hawley and other members of the Oregon delegation and will discuss the tariff question with him.

The association was told that a contract had been made with a detective agency to protect flocks against thieves. The contract is similar to those used in protecting jewelry stores or banks.

HOOVER WILL REIMBURSE FLORIDA FOR FRUIT LOSS

WASHINGTON, July 19.—President Hoover proposed to reimburse Florida citrus growers for damages in connection with federal activities for the extermination of the Mediterranean fruit fly.

Mr. Hoover announced today that after congress convenes he will recommend an appropriation for this purpose.

The amount necessary, he said, cannot be predicted at this time beyond the rough estimate that it will run into several million dollars.

hundreds of women are going to find themselves facing a federal judge.
Gurley assigned 75 per cent of bootlegging in his state to women and said half of those so engaged operated as agents for their husbands or men friends.

"The days of southern chivalry are over so far as women violators of the prohibition law are concerned," he added.

"In the past prohibition officials, especially in the south, have been inclined to look askance at the woman liquor vendor because federal judges have not favored sending them to such institutions as Atlanta and Leavenworth prisons. Now with the new prison for women at Alderson, W. Va., the situation is changed."

Pair Face Jones Law
LA GRANDE, Ore., July 19.—The Jones "five and ten" law made its first appearance in La Grande yesterday when John Nickleson and Mrs. Tom Harrison were arrested by federal, state and county officers on charges of sale of liquor. Both were taken before the United States commissioner. Bonds were set at \$1500.

To Probe Convent Raid
LOS ANGELES, July 19.—Plans asking for a grand jury investigation were being made by District Attorney Burton Fitts today in an effort to determine who was responsible for the tip which led a dry enforcement squad from his office to raid a Catholic convent in Belvedere, a suburb, in search of a still.

The door of the convent, in

which refugee nuns from Mexico were kept, was forced in when admittance had been refused. The officers, operating without a search warrant, found no evidence of prohibition violation.

Dismissal of at least four officers assigned to the prohibition detail will be ordered as an outgrowth of the raid, which was staged June 13, Fitts said. The names were not disclosed. While the dismissals will amount to a reorganization of the department, Captain Clyde Plummer, chief of the dry enforcement squad, will remain.

False Tip Blamed
Constable Harry Tucker of Belvedere denied having had anything to do with the case, despite the fact that the tip was believed to have originated from him. Tucker said he was of the opinion the information had been given by an unidentified person who previously caused him to send one of his deputies to the same locality in search of a still.

Isadore Lowmeyer, representing Bishop J. Cantwell, said that as far as the Catholic church is concerned the case is a closed incident. Bishop Cantwell had previously sent Senator Hiram Johnson of California a letter of protest under the impression that the raid had been staged by federal authorities.

Lawmakers Air Views
WASHINGTON, July 19.—The prohibition suggestions made by Chairman Wickersham of the president's law enforcement commission in the letter read to the governor's conference at New London, Conn., continued today to engage the attention of wet and dry members of congress.

In some quarters, meanwhile, it was regarded as clearly established that the president had no inten-

tion of complying with the demand of Senator Caraway, dry democrat of Arkansas, for the chairman's resignation on the ground that he had "sacrificed his usefulness."

That conclusion was drawn from a statement by Senator Watson of Indiana, republican leader, interpreting the letter as urging "that the states do their full duty in enforcing the eighteenth amendment."
"Chairman Wickersham's statement," he said, "was an effort to enlist the support of the states in doing their full constitutional duty. The eighteenth amendment left the states concurrent power with the federal government to enforce its provision. Some of the states have not exercised that power."

Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, dry leader and supporter of the president's enforcement program, remarked that Mr. Wickersham had "at least succeeded in making it clear that he regards the prohibition law as unenforceable." He declined to say whether he thought President Hoover had seen the letter before it was sent to Governor Roosevelt of New York, who read it to the conference.

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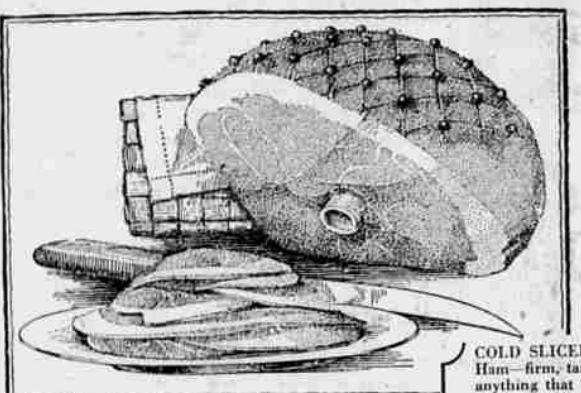
