Tree Breaks Wires
Communication over the Western Union telegraph lines was interrupted for a short period last night as a result of a tree falling across the wires near Glendale.

There are several reasons for the loss of feathers on the head and neck of a fowl, says the Oregon experiment station, but it is usually due to the fowl's involvement in scratching and breaking the feathers off with their claws. This is apparently caused by a mite, thought to be the same as that causing scaly leg, and which gets under the skin, causing irritation. Application of carbolated vaseline into which has been work-
