

Southern Pacific To Use \$200,000 In Cow Creek Canyon

UPPER END OF SECTION TO BE STRAIGHTENED

Will Reduce Curves, Widen Fills and Do Rip-Rap Work Along Banks of Stream.

Immense Amount of Dirt to Be Moved in Making Improvements to the Tracks.

GLENDAL, July 20.—Nearly \$200,000.00 is to be spent by the Southern Pacific company during the next five or six months in bettering their railroad track in the famous Cow Creek canyon near here, a canyon known to the side door Pullman gentry as the Hungry Man's canyon.

The betterment work which has already started will consist mostly in easing track curves and this will necessitate a considerable amount of rock work, cutting back the face of the rock bluffs in places as much as 40 feet and in other places widening the fills and doing a large amount of riprap work along the banks of Cow creek. As some of the bluff faces are as much as 130 feet high, an immense amount of dirt and rock has to be moved before this work is completed.

To Improve 4 1/2 Miles

Most of this work is being done at the upper end of the canyon, along the right of way extending from Reuben station, which is about four miles west of Glendale, to Brant siding a distance of about four and one-half miles. Some of the more extreme track curves near the mouth of the canyon will be widened in order to permit lessening the degree of curve now existing at those places. A 16 degree curve now in tunnel No. 7 will be reduced to 10 degrees. As the rock bluffs here are nearly 130 feet high, the railroad company has a very big job at this one point. After the tunnel here has been widened sufficiently, its portals will be concreted.

Crews Now at Work

The railroad company already has several crews at work on this job totalling about 60 men and these crews will be increased as soon as the work permits until a maximum crew of about 140 men will be employed. Two tunnel gangs, each employing from 20 to 25 men will be used on this job. Two large steam shovels are already at work and a third will be added soon. Four air compressors supply air for the pneumatic rock drills. A narrow gauge railroad with a dozen dump cars handled by an industrial type gasoline locomotive is used to move the rock debris to fills and dumps along the right of way. A regular work train will be placed in service here in about a month to handle the large rock used for riprap work along the creek banks.

Reduce Running Time

The completion of this big undertaking will see the elimination of nearly all extreme track curves in the Cow Creek canyon. As a result the running time of Southern Pacific trains through this canyon will be greatly decreased as it is estimated a general increase in train speed from ten to twenty miles per hour will be permitted over present train schedules. Places in the canyon where the passenger trains now are compelled to slow down to twenty and even fifteen miles per hour will permit it. It is expected a safe average running speed of at least thirty miles per hour. With the easing of the track curves the danger of wrecks from derailments due to rails spreading is largely removed.

This job is being done by the railroad company under the general supervision of D. C. Harris, Southern Pacific roadmaster, whose office is in Glendale, and Southern Pacific Division Engineer H. A. Hampton, who will alternate between his Portland office and Glendale while this work is in progress.

WATER SUPPLY AT GLENDALE SHORT

GLENDAL, July 20.—Fearing that this city's available water supply may prove inadequate to take care of the regular domestic requirements and at the same time leave a reserve for fire protection purposes, City Recorder Wm. B. Leach, acting on orders from the mayor and city council, posted notices the fore part of this week, effective at once, restricting the use of city water for sprinkling and irrigating purposes to but two hours per day, with the added threat that even this limited privilege may be curtailed later on if further water shortage continues.

City water-users under the present restrictions are permitted to use water for sprinkling or irrigating from 7 to 8 o'clock a. m. and from 6 to 7 o'clock p. m. Business places on Pacific avenue are permitted to use water for street sprinkling between 8 and 9 o'clock a. m. and at noon between 12 and 1.

The main source of Glendale's water supply is Section creek at a point near where J. S. Woodroffe logged this spring. The amount of water supplied by Section creek this summer is said to be less than at any time during recent years, even though this year so far is not so much compared with some previous years for dryness. Glendale has an auxiliary water supply in a spring on the Stranne place, which is pumped into the mains by an electrically operated pump, to be used in emergencies. This was brought into daily use recently and this pump has averaged about eight hours use per day for some time now, but even with this additional water supply the reserve in the reservoirs was being lowered, hence the order restricting use of water.

Some dissatisfaction is being expressed as to local water conditions. Only a few weeks ago the city council placed in effect a new schedule of water rates which increased the amount paid by the average household from \$1.00 per month under the old rates to \$1.50.
