the east bay last May. Those adjudged guilty were John Filippelli, reputed "czar" of the east bay liquor-craft ring; G. B. ("Bacci") Ratto, his lieutenant; Patrolman Clyde Miller, T. O. Sedgewick, former Oakland cafe man; Dick Gatto and Tony Taborsal, employees in Ratto's Oakland brewery, and John R. Claassen, Jr., owner of a local brewery.

Filippelli, Miller and Sedgewick were given two years each in federal prison. Claassen was sentenced to a year and a day and fined \$3,000 and Taborsal received six months in the county jail. In Claassen's case Judge Loderbach said he would entertain a motion for probation.

Ratto and Gatto obtained postponement of sentence until August 10, their attorneys contending the two had been twice in jeopardy.

## Markets

(Associated Press Local Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—Portland egg prices were advanced all along the line today in keeping with the advance in other markets. Extras and standards rose two cents each, while medium first and medium extras went up one cent each. This made extras 36 and 34 cents, respectively, to wholesalers, and medium extras and medium firsts 34 and 33, respectively. The price was two cents less to retailers. Prices fixed on the Yamhill street public market were 41 cents for extras and 36 cents for mediums. There stalls may charge less, but not more.

Butter, poultry and fresh meats were unchanged.

With buyers outnumbering sellers, prices for many products advanced at the east side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association. There seemed to be a scarcity of the goods most in demand. Yellow bantam corn in particular went sky high. A box of six dozen ears sold for \$5, or more than 80 cents a dozen ears. Raspberries catapulted up to \$2.25 and \$2.50, blackberries \$2 to \$2.25 and loganberries \$1.50. At one time, with loganberries real scarce, a grower sold as high as \$2 and \$2.25. Currants were little in evidence at \$2. Other prices were: Peas, 4¢; beans, 8¢; carrots, beets and onions, 25¢; turnips, 50¢; radishes, 20¢; lettuce, \$1.15; celery, 50¢; asparagus, \$1.50; squash, 50¢; cucumbers, 50¢; Bing cherries, 10¢; Royal Anns, 10¢; pie cherries, 8¢; potatoes 3¢; cabbage \$1.

BOSTON, July 20.—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "There is a broader inquiry for fine wools and a little more business in such wools at prices which seem to have crystallized about on the basis of last week's sales, medium wools are firm. In the west, buying is scattered and consignments more general, with no change in price basis."

"London had been irregular but seems to be steadying towards the week-end, with no change in values. Withdrawals have been fairly considerable thus far."

"Tropical worsted openings are made at prices unchanged to 10 cents a yard lower than last year and reveal a shortage of such goods in the market, which has resulted in better business for the mills and better prices for medium wools."

"Mohair is quiet but steady."

LANDIS RECEIVES MEDAL FOR PATRIOTIC SERVICE

CHICAGO, July 20.—The distinguished service medal of the American Legion, the highest award given by that organization, today was presented to Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, commissioner of baseball, by Paul V. McNutt, national commander of the American Legion.

In his presentation address McNutt said: "Your devotion to the defenders of our nation, your support of Legion ideals and endeavors have been invaluable and a great public service to America. You have responded instantly to every call the Legion has made on you."

Judge Landis was the third American to receive the award, the other having been General John J. Pershing and Admiral Robert E. Koontz. Nine foreigners have received it.

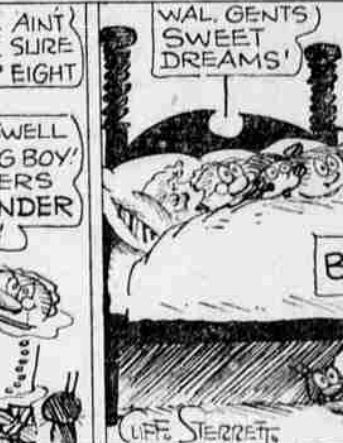
