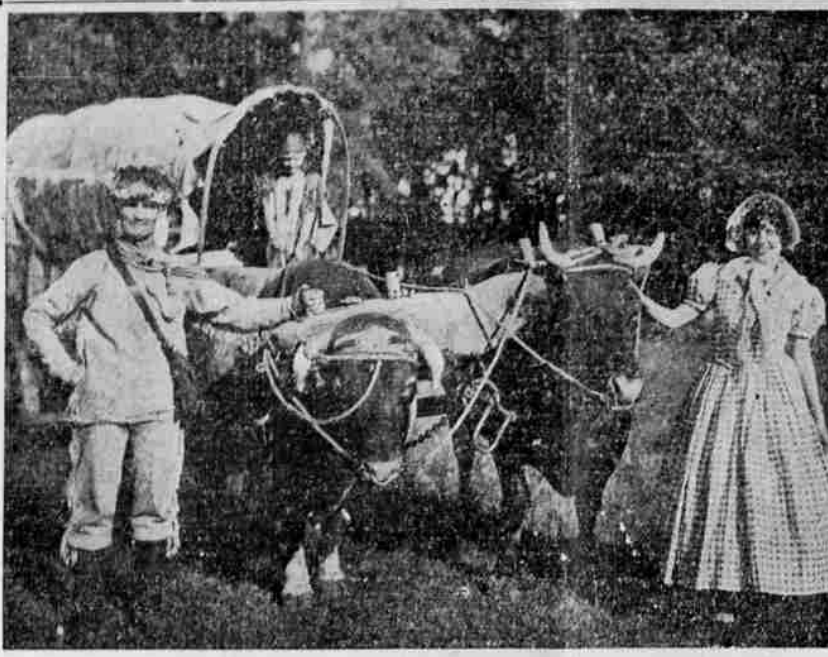

NEW CURRENCY IS CROOKS' HANDICAP. MORAN DECLARES

WASHINGTON, July 20.—In making more difficult the task of converting a one-dollar bill into a ten, or a two-dollar note into a twenty, the new small currency has brought an educational problem to the secret service.

Much of the past work of the secret service in dealing with spurious currency has been caused by note raising operations, although there have been sporadic appearances of counterfeit bills.

W. H. Moran, chief of the secret service, believes the new currency will place new and greater handicaps in the way of the note raisers because of the denomination.

One thing that I am glad to see with reference to this small currency," he told members of congress, "is the restriction in the number of designs. We have had a great deal of trouble about that.

Take, for instance, the raising of bills, with the employment of the same portrait on different denominations of currency.

"Washington's portrait, Lincoln's portrait and all those portraits that have been commonly used, have been employed on bills of different denominations, and that lends itself to the note raiser's operations."

"The restriction of designing will simplify that and will embarrass the note raisers and counterfeiters as well. In other words, it will be difficult to raise a one dollar bill because you will know that Washington's portrait is only on the one dollar bill."

"As you can see, all these matters become an educational problem, we can go to the people and say, 'you must not take a bill with Washington's portrait on it for more than one dollar.'"

Moran has favored the adoption of denominational designs as a check to note raising operations for a number of years.

The new currency bears the following photographs: One dollar, Washington; two, Jefferson; five, Lincoln; ten, Hamilton; twenty, Jackson; fifty, Grant; one hundred, five hundred, McKinley; one thousand, Cleveland; five thousand, Madison; ten thousand, Chase.

Hoyt on Wing Again
VANDERHOFF, B. C., July 20.—Captain Ross G. Hoyt, in the United States army plane New Alaska, took off today for Nome, Alaska, after landing here yesterday because of adverse weather. The captain is flying from New York to Nome.

Endurance Planes Aloft
ST. LOUIS, July 20.—Dale (Red) Jackson and Forest O'Brien, piloting the endurance plane "St. Louis Robin," completed one week in the air at 7:17 a. m. today.

As the fliers passed their 168th hour aloft, the plane was again refueled and roared on toward a new world endurance record, still more than three days off. The motor was functioning smoothly and the fliers indicated they were in excellent condition.

A sister endurance plane, the "Missouri Robin," passed its 70th hour of flight this morning and also was refueled. The pilots are Joseph Hammer and W. Gentry Shelton.

The "St. Louis Robin" was remaining close to Lambert-St. Louis field and was flying high.

The pilots of the "St. Louis Robin" had announced they plan to remain aloft three weeks if motor trouble is not experienced.

Known as Kindly Man.
Eugene Burgess was known to his neighbors as a kindly man, who spent his spare time fishing. The Burgess and Fairchild families had been on friendly terms for a quarter of a century. Other acquaintances of Mrs. Fairchild considered her affable and "harmless."

Several years ago Eugene Burgess joined a mysterious religious cult and differences arose between the two families. They became friends again about a year ago.

R. A. Morter, of the Michigan state hospital for the insane at Kalamazoo, examined Burgess and his wife last night but refused to divulge his findings.

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BROMLEY GETTING READY FOR TACOMA TO TOKYO FLIGHT

TACOMA, Wash., July 20.—More convinced than ever by the splendid performance of his plane on a 1,000-mile non-stop flight yesterday that he can span the Pacific from Tacoma to Tokyo, Lieutenant Harold Bromley planned today to rush preparations and start his great adventure within the next few days.

Twenty thousand cheering Tacamans greeted the flier when he brought his huge Lockheed monoplane to a graceful landing at the Tacoma airport late yesterday on the completion of his flight from Los Angeles. Despite some unfavorable air conditions, the flight to Tacoma was made in eight hours and 17 minutes.

The lieutenant, who is backed by a group of Tacoma business men in his plan to span the Pacific, declared before he retired that he hoped to be in Tokyo within one week.

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DAIRYMEN FROM CALIFORNIA STOP FOR NIGHT HERE

A caravan of fourteen cars carrying 42 persons associated with the Challenge Cream and Butter association, stopped in this city last night. The association is made up of 17,000 dairymen in California and Idaho, and does a business of about sixteen million dollars annually, operating ten cooperative creameries in California and five in Idaho.

The annual convention is being held in Boise this year, and a California caravan was organized to attend the meeting. The California members came up the coast route, visiting the various points along the line between San Francisco and Crescent City. The party reached Roseburg last night and remained until this morning.

State traffic officers are piloting the caravan through the state.

FARMERS ASKED BY FEDERAL BOARD TO ORGANIZE FOR AID

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Laying the ground work for their titanic task of organizing American agriculture, the federal farm board is moving deliberately, as it promised.

Using the press as a medium of contact with the farmers and the public generally, the board has broadcast its policies as they have been determined around the table presided over by Alexander Legge, Chicago business man.

Chairman Legge thus has launched a campaign of education, and joined by Vice Chairman Stone has made its high point clear with an appeal to the farmers to organize into cooperative marketing associations, on a broad and more intensive scale than ever before. The board interprets the farm relief act as confining its activities to dealing with such associations, and wants the farmers to organize so it can help them most effectively.

Meanwhile, the veritable army of job hunters and the most of those who would dip into the \$500,000,000 loan fund provided by congress have knocked in vain at the board room doors while the members in their shirt sleeves, have been getting acquainted and getting started.

Only one man has been hired by the board—Chris L. Christensen, cooperative marketing expert of the department of agriculture, who will serve as the secretary. Christensen, too, has gone behind the closed doors with the board leaving to the outer guard of stenographers drafted from the department of agriculture the heavy

task of dealing with the scores of job seekers.
