PORTLAND, July 22.—Produce was plentiful, but prices held firm at the East Side market of the Gardeners' and Ranchers' association today. Raspberries, blackberries and loganberries were standing up like Gibraltar without any sign of recession. Raspberries and loganberries have both passed their peak without weakening, and with the black-berries getting more abundant every day, quotations persist in sticking around the same figures which marked the opening of the season.

Failure of the strawberry crop in some localities and shortage in the cherry output are believed to have created a larger cannery demand for other fruits. Cannery prices have held up remarkably well with the demand still active.

EFFORT TO KEEP PEACE RAPIDLY LOSING GROUND

(Continued from page 1)

to evidence of subversive communist propaganda in Manchuria, emanating from the highest soviet officials in the province.

Japanese news agency dispatches furnished what appeared to be the most authoritative report of events within Manchuria.

Dispatches from Harbin said Wan Fu-Lin, governor of Keshi-jung district of Manchuria, would be appointed commander-in-chief on the western front with 80,000 troops, and Li Chensheng, governor of Kirin district, commander-in-chief with 60,000 men on the eastern front.

Armies Mile Apart

Dispatches said red cavalry had advanced to within half a mile of Manchuria at the western end of the Chinese Eastern railway, where the rival armies were camped less than a mile apart. Japanese residents of both Manchuria and Pongranchnaya have fled to Harbin upon the advice of their consuls, who viewed the situation as dangerous.

A detachment of Chinese heavy artillery with 8,000 men arrived at Tsaluhar from Shanhaiwan, this (Chihli) province.

At Pongranchnaya the Chinese were said to have fired upon the four soviet planes which had been giving demonstrations over the city. The planes were not struck and as a warning to the Chinese dropped a number of bombs on Russian territory.

In explanation of the border situation it was pointed out that communications were slow and the purported attitude of the home governments toward the controversy, choosing rather to settle it by peaceful means than war, had not yet been conveyed to the rival military forces.

Will Appeal to League

SHANGHAI, July 22.—Japanese press dispatches from Nanking late today said the nationalist government had decided to appeal to the League of Nations for settlement of its controversy with soviet Russia growing out of its seizure of the Chinese Eastern railway in Manchuria.

The appeal is to be made in the event Russia "takes a positive action in connection with the Chinese Eastern railway," the dispatch said.

It was stated also the ministry of foreign affairs telegraphed Chinese ministers resident in countries signatory to the League of Nations covenant instructing them to inform the governments to which they were accredited to "Russia's unlawful attitude."

China Opposes War

NANKING, July 22.—The nationalist foreign office is reported to have sent another note to soviet Russia reiterating the desire of the Chinese government for settlement of the Chinese Eastern railway dispute by peaceful negotiation.

It also was reported that the nationalist government sent separate notes to the signatories of the Kellogg renunciation of war pact, stating that China had no intention of starting war with Russia, but wished merely to defend her rights.

The notes were understood to charge that the soviet government had assumed the offensive on the Chinese border thus violating the spirit of the Kellogg pact.

Will Abide by Pact

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Chinese Minister Wu, acting on instructions of the Nanking government, informed Secretary Stimson today that China had abided by her obligations under the Kellogg-Briand treaty and would continue to do so.

The minister's statement to the secretary was in reply to Mr. Stimson's action in calling to the attention of the Chinese government to its obligations as a signatory power to the anti-war treaty.

Secretary Stimson conferred twice today with French Ambassador Clauel and also with Japanese Ambassador Deluch.

Minister Wu told Stimson reported "seizure" of the Chinese Eastern railway actually consisted

of the dismissal of the Russian employees.

He also said he was hopeful that an amicable means of settlement of the dispute would be found.

TOKIO, July 22.—Rengo dispatches today from Harbin said Chinese officials alleged soviet war craft had seized 25 Chinese trading boats near the mouth of the Sungari river since the beginning of the strained relations. This was not confirmed from other sources.

The Chinese have sent two additional gunboats to the lower Sungari.

Conditions on the Manchurian-Siberian frontier continued quiet.

NANKING, China, July 22.—Foreign Minister C. T. Wang of the nationalist government tonight stated that "China will appeal to the League of Nations in connection with the Russian crisis if the soviet violates the spirit of the Kellogg pact."

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Secretary Stimson was advised today by Ambassador Clauel of France that he had been informed the soviet if possible would abide by the Kellogg pact for the renunciation of war.
