DRAIN RESIDENTS GET WORD OF DEATH OF SON AT TOLEDO

DRAIN, July 22.—Friends here of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. R. Moore, who, with their family, resided in this vicinity several years ago, received the sad news recently of the death of their son, Roy Moore, who was dragged to death by a horse about July 6th, at their home near Toledo, in Lincoln county. The deceased was a graduate of the former normal school here and was about 40 years of age. Besides his wife and children he is survived by his parents, two sisters and a brother. Mrs. Alice Ellenburg, of Drain, is an aunt by marriage.

EARLY SETTLER IN OREGON DIES AT AGE 73 YEARS

GLENDALE, July 22.—Nathan Harrison Damewood, a Cow creek rancher, whose funeral took place Sunday, July 21, at Canyonville, died at Roseburg Friday, July 19, where he had been taken to a hospital Tuesday of last week, suffering from an acute attack of appendicitis.

Mr. Damewood was 73 years, 2 months and 16 days of age at the time of his death, having been born in Page county, Iowa, May 3, 1856. He came west at the age of seven with his parents who were early-day settlers in Oregon and who moved to Jacksonville in 1863, at which time that city was the metropolis of southern Oregon. Here the Damewoods made their home for many years. They also resided at Canyonville for some years. Seventeen years ago Damewood moved to a ranch above Azalea on Cow creek where he had resided ever since.

As a young man he married Miss Nettie Williams and to them the three surviving children were born. They are: Mrs. Mabel Johnson, William H. Damewood and George D. Damewood, all residing at Marshfield, Oregon. In 1920 he married Mrs. Lavina Clothier, who survives him. In addition to his widow and the three children there are five grandchildren and also a brother, W. H. Damewood, of Drain, Oregon.

Mr. Damewood was highly respected as a neighbor and citizen and was beloved by his family and a host of friends. Just about three weeks before his death the Damewoods had the misfortune to lose their house by fire.

ROSS BATES HURT SERIOUSLY IN AUTO PORTLAND WRECK

Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Dillard returned last night from Portland where they were called last week when Bates, seriously injured in an automobile accident.

Mr. Dillard reports that the accident happened on the Columbia highway, just outside of Portland. The car struck loose gravel on a turn and went over the grade and struck a telephone pole. Had it not been for the pole the car would have gone down a high embankment and all occupants would doubtless have been killed outright. Mr. Bates and Claude Bogart, who was employed in the same department with Ross in the Blake, Moffitt and Towne paper mills, was an occupant of the front seat, and suffered internal injuries. Two other young men, who were in the rumble seat escaped injury.

Ross Bates, who reports is in a very serious condition, although out of danger unless complications arise.

His left leg was broken in two places, a compound fracture below the hip and a break below the knee. His right hand was broken, his left arm badly bruised, and his scalp lacerated so severely that numerous stitches were required. It is not believed, however, that his skull is fractured. He will be in the hospital for at least two months, it is expected, and will be forced to wear a cast on the injured leg for a least two more months.

The car was completely demolished.

23 COOLIES ARE ENTOMBED WHEN MINE CAVES IN

SINGAPORE, Straits Settlement, July 22.—Twenty-three Chinese coolies were entombed today in a tin mine at Papan, in Penak, when half the face of the open cast mine fell in. Efforts to dig out the entombed men were fruitless owing to the volume of debris. It was believed a subterranean river runs through the mine which is one of the oldest in the Malay country.

SURVEY IS MADE OF UPPER SMITH RIVER PROJECT

H. L. Eppstein, county surveyor, who has been spending the past week in the upper Smith river country conducting a road survey, returned home yesterday. The county is contemplating construction of a 2-mile section of road between the mouth of the north fork of Smith river and Fiddle creek that will give the Smith river residents an outlet to the railroad and Roosevelt highway.

The Forest Service is constructing a road from Ada up Fiddle creek to Sulphur Springs on North Fork. There is already an old county road from Smith River to North Fork, so that by connecting across from the mouth of the north branch to the Fiddle creek road an outlet will be furnished by way of Ada.

The section to be constructed is a dry work, with the exception of one rock point. The estimated cost is in the neighborhood of \$10,000, which will probably be expended during the summer.

AIRPLANES TAKE FOUR LIVES IN MIDWEST CRASHES

CHICAGO, July 22.—Four persons were killed yesterday in two airplane crashes in the middlewest, one here and the other at North Platte, Nebr.

Jens Jensen, 28, and Miss Hilda Schaufelberg, 21, were killed and Miss Pauline Taylor, 28, was critically injured when Jensen's plane fell. The engine stalled and the plane went into a tail spin, landing near the Albers airport, west of Chicago.

County police said they learned the woman had given Jensen, who was not licensed as a commercial pilot, \$5 to take them aloft.

"Frozen" controls were believed

to have caused the North Platte accident.

Henry Oldham, pilot for the Midwest Aviation corporation, was instructing Mike Ryan in flying. They had been in the air nearly an hour and were about to land when the crash occurred near the North Platte municipal airport.

Both Ryan and Oldham were killed. They lived at North Platte.
