

## PORTLAND BUILDER GETS CONTRACT ON NEW STATEHOUSE

(Associated Press Local Wire)  
SALEM, Ore., July 22.—The state board of control Monday formally awarded to Ross B. Hammond, Inc., of Portland, the contract to build the state office building, for which the state has borrowed \$500,000 from the funds of the state industrial accident commission. Hammond's bid was \$1,100,000.  
The plumbing and heating contract was awarded to the Plumbing & Heating Sales corporation of Portland whose bid was \$36,800.  
The electrical contract went to the Dimitt Electric company of Portland, bidding \$29,100.  
No decision has yet been reached in the controversy between the Otis Elevator company and the Portland Elevator company, bidding respectively \$11,230 and \$11,600 for installation of the elevator. The Portland company contends that it should receive the contract under a law giving differential of 5 per cent in favor of Oregon industries. The Otis claims to be an Oregon industry also. The board will not reach a decision until a representative of the Portland company appears to explain the operation of the Portland-made machine.  
The building is to be 209 by 99 feet, five stories high. Construction will start about August 1 and the Hammond firm guarantees completion in 150 days. As far as possible Salem labor is to be used in the construction. The ornamental construction will be of Ashland granite. The total cost of the building, including architect's fees and all details, will be \$1,847,595.

## SPECIAL FARE FROM ROSEBURG TO EUGENE FETE

A special train will be operated from Roseburg to Eugene and return Sunday, July 28, for the Sunset Trail Pioneer Pageant and roundtrip tickets may be purchased at the regular one-way fare, announces J. E. Clark, Southern Pacific agent.  
The special train will leave Roseburg at 8:00 a. m. and the round-trip fare will be \$2.70. On the return trip the special will leave Eugene at 11:40 p. m. after the close of the pageant. Regular trains may be used if desired.  
The three-day celebration includes a pageant each evening with a cast of 1500 citizens of Eugene. This elaborate spectacle will depict the history and progress of Oregon from the days of before the pioneer up to the present time.  
An air circus will be held each afternoon. Pioneer and industrial parades, with floats from all parts of the state entered, are scheduled for Friday and Saturday mornings.

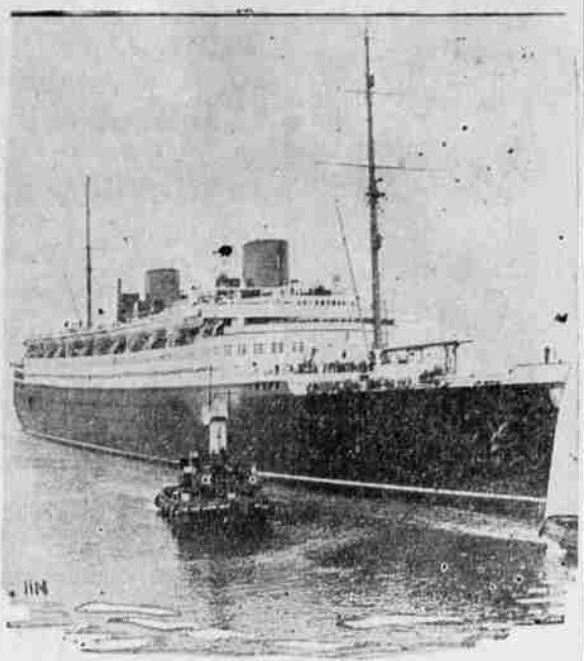
## 1 DIES, ANOTHER MISSING AS TWO BOATS COLLIDE

## Makes Fastest Ocean Trip



Although delayed by fog over the North Sea and at Southampton, the great new German liner, "Bremen," docked at New York yesterday afternoon after making the fastest trans-Atlantic crossing in the history of navigation. She made the trip from Cherbourg, France, in 4 days, 15 hours and 15 minutes, maintaining a speed of almost 28 knots an hour. The boat is 933 feet over all and especially designed for speed, offering a minimum of wind resistance, due to streamlining construction. She has turbines generating 100,000 horsepower.

Large crowds gathered downtown last night for bulletins of the flier's progress.

Houston Plane Going  
HOUSTON, Tex., July 22.—More than half way to their goal, Glenn L. Loomis and Joe Glass still were aloft today in their endurance monoplane "Billion Dollar City."  
The fliers who hope to break the record of 246 hours, 43 minutes, 12 seconds, completed their 133rd hour in the air at 2:49:44 a. m.

Air Heroes Squelched  
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 22.—Deputy sheriff, who let Loren Mendell and Roland R. Reinhardt, holders of the endurance flight record, use their new plane. The test was obtained by Miss Eleanor Merry, actress, who won a damage suit against Mendell.  
To Try Flight Again  
SHREVEPORT, La., July 22.—Failing in their first attempt at an endurance flight record, W. Curry Sanders and Van Lear Leary, Louisiana aviators, held hopes of trying again.  
Their plane, the KWKH, which began its flight at 1:30 a. m. last Wednesday, was forced down at 7:17 o'clock last night on Steers field, five miles from Shreveport, due to motor trouble. Three of the nine cylinders blew out as the fliers sought to gain altitude immediately after a refueling contact.

The aviators had been in the air approximately 124 hours, falling far short of the record.  
Another Plane Goes Up  
MINNEAPOLIS, July 22.—The monoplane "Minnesota" with Owen Houghland of Buffalo, Minn., as chief pilot, was off today on another refueling endurance record seeking flight.  
Accompanied by Captain T. L. Erickson of Minneapolis, Houghland soared away from the World Chamberlain airport at 6:10 o'clock last night in an effort to better the world's record.

SURVEY MADE TO CONNECT WITH NEW LANE COUNTY ROAD  
The survey has been completed on the Elkhed London Springs road project which the county is undertaking in cooperation with Lane county this year. Lane county is extending the road to the south fork of the Willamette to the county line and Douglas county in building in from the Scotts Valley Elkhed road, a distance of about a mile and a quarter. These two roads, when joined, will form a loop that will provide a very scenic drive and will open up a large amount of valuable farming land.

The Elkhed district recently voted a tax of \$2.20e of which \$1,700 has been collected. The county will probably provide additional funds to grade and surface the new construction.

The road viewers, appointed to determine the value of land desired for right of way, awarded damages in the sum of \$115.

## ONE KILLED, FOUR HURT, WHEN AUTO GOES OVER GRADE

REDDING, Calif., July 22.—One man was killed and four others injured, two seriously, when their automobile overturned last night on a steep grade of Iron Mountain road, 12 miles north of here. The dead man was Charles Foster, 50, of Redding, owner of the car.  
John Williams, shift boss of the Iron Mountain mine, and John Johnson, an employee, received possible fractured skulls among other injuries, and may die. The others injured include Edward Debridge, driver of the machine, who told physicians Foster asked him to drive the party to the mine as they had been drinking and "didn't want an accident."  
The car was descending the grade, Debridge said, when Foster, who was sitting beside him, pushed his foot off the brake pedal and stepped on the accelerator. The car struck a hole and overturned, throwing the passengers clear. Foster died enroute to the hospital.

## STILLS TO MAKE MORE LIQUOR FOR MEDICINAL USES

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Five or six distilleries will be given permission by the prohibition bureau in the near future to resume the production of whiskey in the United States to replenish medicinal supplies.  
In making that announcement, Commissioner Doran said the nation's government-guarded supply of medicinal whiskey had dwindled since distilling was halted under the eighteenth amendment to 9,549,671 gallons.

About 1,500,000 gallons are withdrawn from this stock each year and, taking probable evaporation into consideration, the total is considered sufficient to meet legal requirements for only five years.  
About 2,000,000 gallons, the commissioner announced, will be produced next year and that the requirement for four-year aging can be complied with and, allowing for evaporation of 400,000 gallons, provide a full year's supply in storage in 1934.

The distilleries will resume operation under government supervision next year and are allowed to produce about 1,000,000 gallons of bourbon, 600,000 gallons of rye whiskey next year. It is estimated that about one year's supply will be on hand when the new stock is ready for sale.  
The commissioner regards recent "speculations" that large amounts of the present supply are of questionable quality as having little foundation. Not more than 1,000 of the 200,000 barrels in the bonded warehouses, he believes, can be classed as questionable.

## MRS. MARY WILSON OF GARDEN VALLEY DIES IN ROSEBURG

Mary Ellen Wilson of Garden Valley passed away at Mercy hospital this morning after two weeks of illness. She was 74 years, 2 months and 12 days of age. Her husband, G. Wilson, died 18 years ago. She leaves ten children: Mrs. Inhabit, J. M. Wilson and Mrs. Lizsie Price of Oklahoma; W. M. Wilson, Mrs. A. Nida, Lillie Wilson and Chas. Wilson of Wilbur; John M. Wilson of Yoncalla; Carl M. Wilson of Colorado; Jesse Wilson of Portland.  
The remains have been removed to the Roseburg Undertaking Co. parlors, where funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Charles Edwards will officiate.

and started for the walls. The convicts formed human pyramids like circus acrobats, flinging the topmost man to liberty on the wall above. The guard's gun spot and

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the prisoners fell back, three dead.  
Riot Lasts 5 Hours  
Seeing at last that the break was a lost cause, some of the men returned to their cells and some barricaded themselves in a storehouse.  
The riot lasted more than five hours.  
Prison authorities saw in the outbreak an enactment of what might have happened several months ago if the "poaching" of Harry Ross, an inmate had not revealed a prisoners' arsenal of revolvers, rifles, knives and "enough dynamite to blow up the whole place." Ross got a pardon for his revolution and brought down on his head the threat of those he had reported to "get him inside or out."
