BIG FREIGHTER NOW AFLOAT FROM ROCKS

SEATTLE, July 25.—The 10,000-ton freighter Golden Forest was proceeding slowly under her own power for Dutch Harbor, Alaska, today after being stranded yesterday on Avatanak Island in the western Alaskan archipelago, radio messages received here said. The United States coast guard cutter Haida was conveying the ship which was refloated last night just before a heavy storm approached. The big freighter has 17 feet of water in No. 1 hold and ten feet of water in No. 2 hold.

SEATTLE YOUTH WHO SHOT GIRL AND HIS RIVAL FORGETFUL

SEATTLE, July 25.—Held for investigation over the shooting of Miss Charlotte Reed, young soda fountain clerk, and George A. Oakes, 27, tombstone salesman, last night, Cameron McIntosh, 20, shipping clerk, told police his mind was a blank and that he remembered nothing. McIntosh was captured early today after a statewide search had begun. He was said to have returned to an apartment where he lived with his mother and sister since moving here from Vancouver. B. C. and was told by his sister to talk with the apartment manager, who called police.

Under questioning the suspect said he "did not know what happened to any pistol and that his mind was a blank." Miss Reed told police she was in front of the drugstore where she worked when accosted by McIntosh. When she attempted to enter an automobile for a ride with friends, McIntosh told her if she entered the car he would "get you all." Miss Reed said she and McIntosh opened fire, shooting her twice in the arm.

Oakes, who was in the car, jumped to the sidewalk to protect Miss Reed and was fired upon. Oakes was wounded in the chest, neck and arm. Both victims were in a serious condition today. McIntosh was a former suitor of Miss Reed.

CUBS REGAIN LEAD IN NATIONAL WHEN HACK SWINGS BAT

For it was "Hackenschmidt" with an architectural style that resembled a quarter section of fortress wall, who crushed the New York Giants with his big bat yesterday after even the elements had seemed to contrive to keep intact a slender one-point margin of the leading Pirates.

The scene was set nicely for the graceful ascent of the Cubs into first place when things began to happen that called for sterner, brusquer methods. For the second straight day, the malevolent Brooklyn Robins, getting nowhere in particular but mighty pugnacious about it, swarmed all over the Pirates and beat them 6 to 4. Everything was peaceful at Wrigley field. With Guy Bush, ace of the Cub staff, going nicely, the Cubs ran up a lead of 4-0 on the Giants by the time the sixth inning rolled around. Rogers Hornsby hit one home off Jack Scott, his 20th of the season, and Hack got another, his 24th. Everything was under perfect control from a Cub standpoint.
