



OREGON FARMERS MAY EXPECT MOST PROSPEROUS YEAR

PORTLAND, July 25.—Barring unusual weather conditions in the next 90 days, farmers of Oregon will receive approximately \$5,500,000 more for their crops than they received last year and about \$34,000,000 more than the average return for the last eight years, according to estimates by R. H. Kipp, manager of the agricultural

The 1929 return, said Mr. Kipp, will be the highest since 1920. His estimate was based on a study of conditions covering 75 of the principal farm commodities of Oregon and the northwest.

For the entire Pacific northwest, including Oregon, Washington, Idaho and western Montana, Mr. Kipp estimated farm income would show an increase of approximately \$32,000,000 over 1928 and an increase of from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 over averages for the last eight years.

"In several instances," he said, "crops will be smaller in volume than last year, but probable increases in prices will more than offset this. This does not mean that the farmers will all be in the market for 'cold bricks' inventments, but it means there will be considerably more new farm wealth to be used for payment of indebtedness and for purchase of necessities and equipment."

Mr. Kipp said he considered it extremely unlikely that there would be sufficient change in the weather during the next three months to cause any drastic reductions in his estimates.

CHAMBER LEADERS TO DISCUSS PLANS

SALEM, Ore., July 25.—Oregon Chamber of Commerce leaders will attend a meeting called in the house of representatives here Monday, July 29, to discuss the most effective use of the \$25,000 fund appropriated by the 1929 legislature for state advertising and development.

W. G. Ide, manager of the State Chamber of Commerce, has also invited newspapermen and representatives of advertising agencies. Recommendations reached by the meeting will be submitted to the supervisory board provided for by the appropriation act.

RESOLUTIONS AIM TO KEEP NATURAL BEAUTY OF STATE

(Associated Press Special Wire)

SALEM, Ore., July 25.—Recommendations intended to protect the natural beauty of Oregon highways and streams were prepared by the state park commission, recently appointed by Governor Patterson, at a meeting in the executive's office yesterday.

Among the recommendations were the following:

That the matter of acquiring public lands suitable for park and recreational purposes be taken up with the department of interior.

That arrangements be made with private owners for the acquisition of timbered strips along roads and elsewhere by exchange, purchase or donation and the acquisition of typical stands of native trees.

That the commission cooperate with garden and nature study clubs in the protection of native shrubs and flowers.

That legislation be sponsored to carry out the plans of the commission.

The commission voted to take up with the federal forestry department the matter of protecting national forests along state highways.

Governor Patterson, who called the forest meeting of the commission, declared that demand for protection of natural timber strips is urgent because they are being destroyed for commercial purposes. Several of the recommendations made by the commission were suggested by the governor.

H. B. Vanduser, chairman of the state highway commission, was elected chairman of the park commission, and Roy A. Klein, state highway engineer, was elected secretary. Other members of the park commission are C. E. Gates of Medford and R. W. Sawyer of Bend, both members of the highway commission, and William Dwyer of Baker and R. A. Booth of

Eugene, both former members of the highway board.
