INJUNCTION IS UPHELD IN NEW TAX LAW RULING

to 1928. As a result of the passage of this order, which the court announced would remain in effect only until November 1, 1929, several thousand dollars of delinquent taxes have been paid in, the taxpayers realizing a considerable saving by not being required to pay the penalty and interest charges.

"We have a right to assume that a law passed by the legislature is a constitutional act until the supreme court rules otherwise," District Attorney Gordon declared this morning. Acting under legislative authority the county court has made its order permitting the penalty and interest charges on taxes delinquent prior to 1928. We will continue to collect on that basis until such time as the court passes upon the matter. If the supreme court holds that the county courts do not have authority to remit the penalty and interest, then it will be necessary to cancel the order and restore the former system of collection.

"Whether or not the court would have a right, in the event taxes were paid without penalty and interest prior to the court rule, to go back and collect the extra charges is a question, but I do not believe that such action would be taken, and delinquencies paid now would have the penalty and interest deducted, but such will not be the case if the opinion of Judge Duffy is sustained by the supreme court, and it behooves delinquent taxpayers to make their payments immediately if they wish to avoid the possibility of having the extra charges restored."

tirely confident that it will be accepted by all the nations." Asked what he considered the most effective way of making the treaty a certain means of preserving peace, he pointed out that its value had been demonstrated in two major world disputes which have developed since it was signed in Paris last August. He remarked that it had played a large part in being toward an amicable settlement of the present breach between China and Russia and said he believed it also influenced the preservation of peace between Bolivia and Paraguay in their dispute last December over the Gran Chaco.

Brian's Senate Message
PARIS, July 25.—The renunciation of war by the United States, said Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg, which went into effect yesterday, marks "the most important contribution yet made to the work of peace." M. Briand replied to a telegram from Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson notifying the French statesman of the ceremony in Washington.

The message says in part: "It is with profound and unanimous satisfaction that the news that the pact has become effective, has been received in France."

"The accord which offers such promise for the future enters today into the law of peoples and marks the most important contribution yet made to the work of peace."

"Permit me to express the hope of seeing still further intensified the collaboration of the United States and France, so precious for world peace."

tion of the Kellogg-Briand treaty for the renunciation of war—and delighted to meet again many old friends who were close to him during his administration.

In one of the most intimate interviews he has ever given, he commented on the White House ceremony at which the anti-war treaty was proclaimed in effect as being "particularly impressive and one fitting in every way the world-wide importance of the occasion."

Mentioning his pleasure over renewing his friendship with Frank B. Kellogg, who, as his secretary of state, had a leading part in bringing the anti-war treaty into being, the former president said he was "glad to congratulate him on the successful outcome of some of the things he and I were working on which had not been completed when I retired from office."

"It showed the wisdom of the position he had taken," Mr. Coolidge observed.

Among other things, he men-

tioned the "very much better condition of affairs in Mexico and settlement of the long standing Tlacotalia controversy between Chile and Peru."

He also expressed delight "to see the large surplus that remained in the treasury at the end of the last fiscal year, which was substantially the last fiscal year of my administration."

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BOGIE BREAKS OLD RIVER SPEED MARK

ST. LOUIS, July 25.—The historic 59-year-old speed record on the Mississippi of the once proud packet Robert E. Lee, an epochal trip from New Orleans to St. Louis that had become a tradition celebrated in song and story, fell to-

day to a frail gasoline speedboat of modern design.

The Robert E. Lee's mark of 90 hours and 14 minutes, which had withstood the assaults of many modern craft, was shattered by the "Bogie" owned by Dr. Louis Leroy of Memphis, Tenn., pulled up at the municipal dock at 6:25 a. m., completing the approximately 1,154 miles over the winding course of the Mississippi in 57 hours and 31

minutes. The average speed was less than 12.8 miles an hour.
