

McGraw's Giants Take Third Loss From Chicago Cubs

Much to the embarrassment of John McGraw, the New York Giants' current western tour to date has been a constant source of satisfaction to the rowling Cubs of Chicago, traditional foes of McGraw's team.

For the third straight day, the Cubs yesterday administered a beating to McGraw's punch-drunk Giants, 8 to 5, thereby increasing their lead over the second place Pittsburgh Pirates to one full game.

The St. Louis Cardinals, now operating under the personal guidance of Bill McKechnie, advanced to within three and a half games of the third place Giants by trouncing the Phillies for the third straight time, 10 to 5. Jess Haines held the Quakers to four hits, one of which was Chuck Klein's ninth homer of the season.

Behind clever pitching by Red Lucas, the Cincinnati Reds buried the Boston Braves under a 14 to 2 count and evened the series with two victories apiece.

There were only two games in the American league, but in one of them the Athletics drove out 25 hits to crush Cleveland, 21 to 3, and extend their league lead to 10 1/2 games. Nine runs in the first inning decided the game and allowed Lefty Grove to win his 17th game without extending himself.

Fred Marberry weakened in the late innings and the Chicago White Sox eked out a 3 to 1 victory over Washington in ten innings.

Seals Beat Oaks
The league leading San Francisco Seals found themselves yesterday, and administered a sound spanking to their rivals from across the bay, the Oaks, at Recreation park, winning by 12 to 5. The Seals were defeated two in a row earlier in the week by the A's, and this enabled the second place Los Angeles Angels to close quite a gap. Today the Seals were credited with 19 games won out of 25, while the Angels stood 18 won out of the same total. Oakland advanced to fifth place.

Until the eighth inning the Seals and Oaks were on even terms, but the Seals opened up with everything they had, crashing out eight hits in a row for a gain of six runs. They totaled 16 hits for the nine innings. Jolley, Wingo and Baker helped with homers.

Los Angeles batters administered the twelfth straight defeat to the Sacramento Senators in the southern metropolis. The offerings of Billie and Vinie were pounded all over the lot for a 10 to 8 victory. Both were touched for 17 hits.

The Mission Reds ran away with the Portland Ducks on the latter's home lot. After the fifth inning, including the game 8 to 1. Cole was shut out and was pounded freely in the early innings, but settled down and held the foe to 10 hits while his mates collected 14 off Ortman and Chesterfield.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—A bronze bas-relief picturing the naming of Mount Hood by Lieutenant W. R. Broughton of the British navy will be unveiled here August 24 at a ceremony in which representatives of the navies of Great Britain and the United States will participate. Captain C. C. Dobson, commander of the British warship Columbus, will represent England. Commander J. B. Spore of the U. S. destroyer Farragut will act for the secretary of the United States navy.

The bronze tablet represents Lieutenant Broughton naming Mount Hood. In the picture with Broughton is the chief of the Indian village of Ner-chee-ko-oo which stood on the present site of Portland.

SPRINGFIELD SPAN CONTROVERSY MAY BE SETTLED SOON

PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—The King controversy centering around approaches to the new Springfield bridge in Lane county is in a fair way to being ended, such was the opinion expressed here Thursday afternoon at the regular meeting of the state highway commission. The highway commission has urged that a fill bridge be put in for the approaches, instead of regular trestle work.

Springfield citizens objected to this plan, declaring it would cause floods during high water. No progress has been made in a year's discussion of the problem, and in the meantime a needed bridge has been useless.

Now, the county court of Lane county has offered a compromise. It was understood today that this compromise would be accepted. The new plan calls for a shorter fill than first proposed, and an extended approach.

The drive for the Wallula cut-off got under way again at today's meeting. A delegation from Umatilla, reinforced by Portland representatives, urged that this much-discussed cutoff be put on the Oregon road program.

This short-cut would lessen the automobile route between Walla Walla and the Old Oregon Trail by many miles. Although it has been urged by the federal road department, the state highway commission has opposed it.

The question was first raised some six or seven years ago when Commissioner Barrett of Heppner objected. His objection was never shaken. It was reported here today that the federal road department will see to it that if one state builds this cutoff to the line, the other state will do so or be denied federal aid on other projects.

While it has not been officially so stated, it is understood that the government has long been eager for the connecting link between main Oregon and Washington highways.

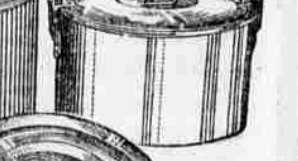

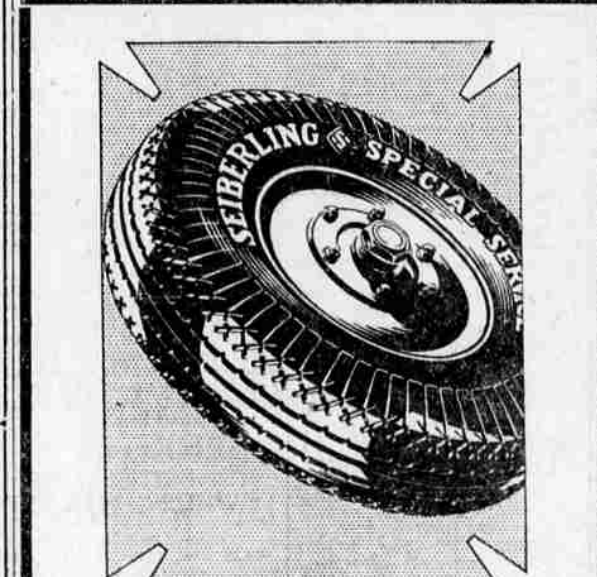
