FORMER DRAIN RESIDENT KILLED IN LOGGING WOODS

DRAIN, July 26.—Jacob Kunz, a former resident of the Drain vicinity, met with an accident in the woods a few miles from Myrtle Point, in Coos county, on Tuesday of this week, which resulted in his instant death. He was employed with a crew who were using a large caterpillar tractor and in some manner he failed to get clear of some logs that were being dragged by the machine and was caught between two logs, his head being crushed. Mr. Kunz was a son of Mrs. Laura Hekethier of Drain and had resided in and near Drain many years during his young manhood. He is survived by his wife and six stepchildren, his mother, a brother and sister, two half-sisters and three half-brothers. He was fifty years of age.

The body was brought to Drain on Thursday, where funeral services were held in the Christian church. Rev. Bond conducting the service, and burial was made in the Odd Fellows cemetery. Undertaker Schroeder of Myrtle Point being in charge.

VIOLENCE LOOKED FOR IN CHICAGO IF TRACKS ARE CLOSED

CHICAGO, July 26.—Vengeance by violence for the state's attorney's action in closing the Chicago dog tracks was predicted today by Pat Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney.

Roche said he had direct information that "the hoodlums controlled by the dog track interests are to be turned loose on Chicago for a wave of bombings and robberies if we persist in our fight against the tracks."

It has been Roche's contention that the dog tracks provide a large part of the money required to finance Chicago gangs. He estimated that Al Capone, now in jail in Philadelphia for gun toting, took half a million dollars a year from his dog track interests here. The Hav-

thorne track, twice raided this week, is known as a Capone enterprise.

Owners of horse race tracks in the Chicago area have taken Roche's prediction seriously, guards being placed there last night.

All three dog tracks—Hawthorne, Thornton and Fairview—were closed last night following the action of Circuit Judge George Rush in dissolving an injunction which was intended to protect the tracks from police raiders.

YOUTH GIVES LIFE IN EFFORT TO GET GLIMPSE OF PLANE

TACOMA, July 26.—A fourteen-year-old Tacoma boy sacrificed his life this morning in a vain effort to see Lieutenant Harold Bromley make a test flight in the "City of Tacoma."

Clinton "Honey" McCarthy, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. D. McCarthy, was instantly killed at 9 a. m. in the freight elevator of an apartment building while helping Jack Fjetland, dairy driver, who had promised to take him to Tacoma field to see the take off scheduled for the morning.

The boy volunteered to take the milk to the third floor of the apartment and started to do so, after the milk man had warned him not to use the elevator. The boy disregarded the warning and was killed when he was caught between the freight elevator and a beam as he prepared to step at the third floor.

MRS. SOLOMON HURT

Mrs. George Solomon, whose husband operates the egg track between Roseburg and Eugene, was hurt yesterday at Eugene when she fell from the rear of the truck, striking her head on the pavement. Her scalp was cut and her back injured, making it necessary to take her to the hospital. She is not believed, however, to be in a serious condition.

CANADIAN SHIP TO PICK UP STRANDED AMERICAN ARTISTS

TORONTO, July 26.—The Canadian steamer Baltic, bound for the Arctic with supplies for stations of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, has been requested by wireless to pick up Rockwell Kent and his party of United States artists shipwrecked in Greenland.

The wireless message was sent by the Canadian government on the application of A. H. Hobson, vice-president of the Toronto Art Gallery, who said he was acting at the request of Arthur S. Allan of New

York, whose son is a member of the shipwrecked party. Kent, Alan and Lucien Cary, Jr., son of the novelist, were stranded at Godthaab, Greenland, on July 19 when their yacht, The Direction, was wrecked.

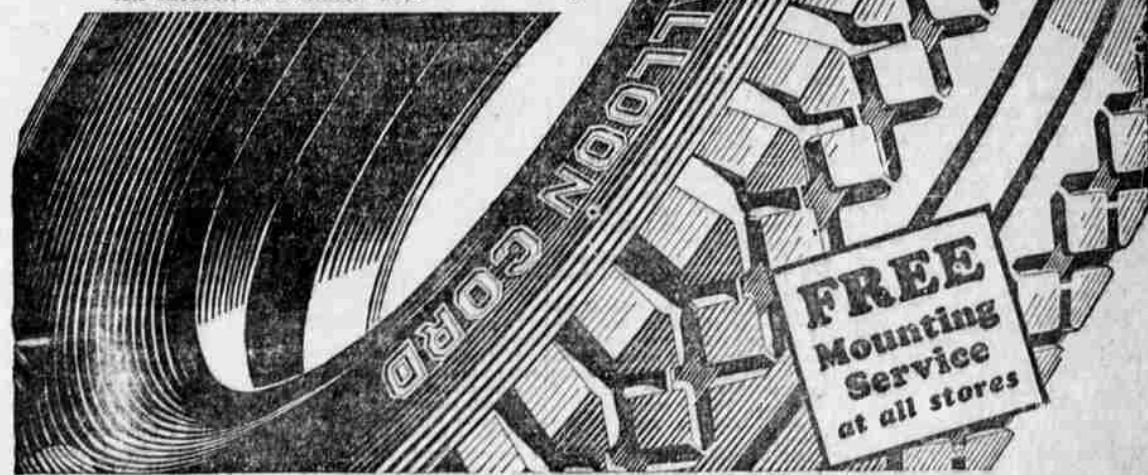
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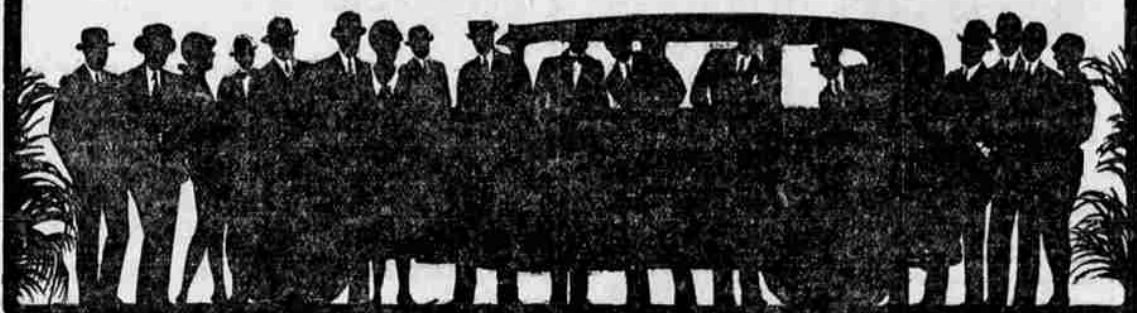
