HIGHEST PRUNE BID IN 10 YEARS IS SUBMITTED

sired a list of the estimated tonnage in time to communicate with their companies before submitting their bids. The pool at 3 o'clock consisted of only a half million pounds, but when the directors met in the evening they found that 744,500 pounds of Italian prunes and 11,500 pounds of Petites had been listed for sale. The bidders, however, offered to buy 50 tons of Petites, so there was no difficulty in selling the pool on that variety.

Whether or not the California Packing corporation will accept the increased Italian pool depends upon the instructions which Mr. Sutherland is requesting today. A. H. Marsh, president of the association, D. N. Busenbark and W. A. Burr, directors, were appointed as a special committee to act upon the matter at a meeting tonight, the price being entirely satisfactory to the directors if it is made applicable to the entire pool.

Entire Crops Listed Apparently growers are of the belief that the peak of the market price has been reached, as several of the leafiest growers in the association last night listed the remainder of their entire crop. Before many have been holding back, offering only a small part of their crop in the pools, but last night's pool was made up of several very large crops.

That the activities of the association are considered favorably by the prune growers of the county is shown by the increase being made in membership. Within the past four days 10 new members have voluntarily requested contracts, which have been returned signed. The association has over 100 members, representing between six and seven million pounds of prunes.

THINK DANIEL BOONE CARVED TURTLE'S SHELL

INDIANAPOLIS.—Because its underbelly bore the inscription, "I. Boone, 1769," a small, ordinary looking turtle has come under official notice.

The turtle was found by Ralph Lyons of Wingate, Ind., while he was shocking wheat on a farm. Statehouse officials, comparing the lettering on the shell with those Boone inscribed on a tree when he killed a bear. The signatures bore a resemblance, they said.

If a hoax, those who examined the turtle said, the perpetrator had not lived to know the outcome. The inscription had been made years ago.

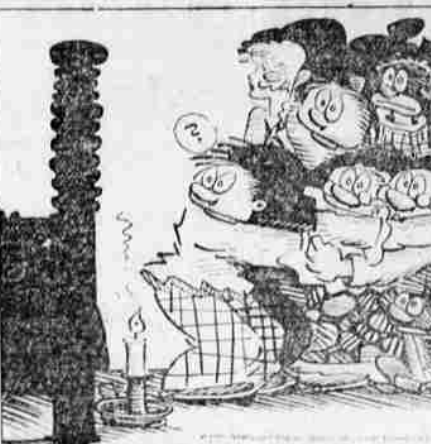
