H. J. SWARM WILL TAKE POSITION IN TACOMA SCHOOL

Leaving Glendale to Take Place as Commercial Instructor and Coach of Athletics.

Has Had Fine Record in Promotion of Community Use of New School Structure.

GLENDAL, July 27.—H. J. Swarm, principal and superintendent of the Glendale schools for the past three years, announced yesterday that he had accepted a position in the commercial department of one of the Tacoma high schools. Besides teaching, Mr. Swarm will assist with the athletic program. W. Ray Parker, former superintendent of schools at Butte Falls, will succeed Mr. Swarm. Mr. Parker will assume his new duties with the opening of the regular school session this fall.

When Mr. Swarm came to Glendale, he found a splendid corps of six grammar school and three high school teachers eager to cooperate with him. In addition, the new high school building, costing nearly sixty thousand dollars, had just been completed. Mr. Swarm realized that such an investment must lay quite a burden on the community. He determined that the only way in which the new building could justify itself would be to become the center for community activities.

It was not possible for Mr. Swarm to put his plan into effect immediately, but two years ago he offered the Women's Health Club of Glendale the facilities of the new building for their carnival. The invitation was accepted and the affair proved a success, a net profit of three hundred dollars being realized. At this time, also, the local music teacher was invited to hold her recitals in the school building. The community interest was aroused and the recitals were well attended.

As a further step toward his goal, Mr. Swarm offered the facilities of the school gymnasium to the townpeople interested in sports. A men's and a women's athletic club were soon formed. Each club has a membership of about sixteen; volleyball and basketball are the chief centers of interest.

One of the major problems facing Mr. Swarm when he took over his new duties was the small percentage of eighth grade pupils who went on to high school. The lumber industry around Glendale offered ready employment to pupils and there was no offsetting attractions at school to keep them interested. Prior to this time, no athletics were provided in the schools. Mr. Swarm believed that this type of activity would provide the needed incentive to keep students in school.

After taking into consideration the size of the school and the athletic needs of the community, Mr. Swarm decided to introduce as the three major sports football, basketball and baseball. At the outset it was determined that good sportsmanship was to be stressed above all else.

I. W. Tucker, of Pacific University was the first coach. He proved to be a man with the same ideals concerning athletics that were held by Mr. Swarm. Mr. Tucker built up a reputation for Glendale for good clean sportsmanship.

O. M. Bagley, who succeeded Mr. Tucker as coach last year, was a former varsity baseball man from Oregon State college. Mr. Bagley turned out winning teams in all sports this year.

As a further expansion of his athletic policy, Mr. Swarm has endeavored to provide a full athletic program for women. Basketball and baseball are the chief sports which have since been taken over by the girls. At all times, emphasis has been placed on scholastic achievement so that Glendale athletes are something more than just athletes. It has been found that boys and girls participating in activities have a higher grade average than those pupils not participating.

Many other activities besides athletics are provided for the students. Debate, dramatics and various school clubs have proved very popular.

The appreciation for the splendid activities program provided for their children has been well expressed by the townspeople of Glendale through the increasing number attending school functions. During the past year the various school plays offered have been given before crowded houses. At the commencement exercises every available seat was occupied.

Mr. Swarm deeply appreciates the efforts of the townspeople and the school board in the cooperation offered to make his plans a success. "The cooperation of the school board and the townspeople has made possible the achievements of the past three years and I have in any way helped to build a better school system for Glendale," he said.

SHIPPING OF FIR AND PINE CONES MAY BE NEW INDUSTRY

GLENDAL, July 27.—Ivan H. Jones of Longview, Wash., who is connected with the forestry division of the Long-Bell Lumber company, has been here since last week in the interests of his employers. Mr. Jones is checking up the various logging operations on Cow creek and in this immediate vicinity for the purpose of ascertaining approximately how many seed cones from the Douglas firs and sugar and yellow pines are available here. It is found that a sufficient amount of cones can be had in this vicinity to warrant the expense of shipping a small seed extraction plant to Glendale, a market will be opened locally for pine and fir cones. The seeds taken from these cones are in demand for reforestation projects in this country and elsewhere. Newfoundland is using a quantity of fir seeds while different European countries are in the market for pine seeds.

Captain J. B. Woods, chief forester for the Long-Bell people is expected here this week to confer with Jones as to his findings and to decide definitely as to whether or not the local supply will warrant a market being opened by them here for seed cones.

FISHERMEN HAVE NARROW ESCAPE ON NORTH UMPQUA

HOAGLIN, July 27.—J. W. McClusky and Ed Ey of Hollywood, Calif., who have been spending a week's vacation at Copco camp, about a mile above Rock creek on the North Umpqua, had a thrilling experience Monday evening when they became marooned in a boat in the swiftest part of the Honey creek rapids while fishing.

McClusky and Ey had fished down from the fire patrol station near Hogback and anchored their boat in the middle of the stream just above the upper Honey creek rapids expecting to hook some of the big trout usually lying there. Becoming interested in the fishing they failed to notice that their anchor was slowly dragging until they were almost over the first rapids. Then, in the swift, deep water, they found it impossible to haul in the anchor, as at each attempt to pull the boat up stream the anchor would break and gallons of water. It was also impossible to cut the anchor rope as a short length of chain extended from the boat to the anchor rope.

After an hour or more of futile effort to get themselves out they called for help and a telephone message was sent through the fire dispatcher's office at Glendale to Elmer Johnson, assistant at the state trout hatchery, and Mr. Winkler, son of the manager of the Ideck Park, made record time to Honey creek, reaching the rapids shortly after dark. Mr. Johnson and the Honey Creek fireman waded out to within about forty feet of the fishermen and cast one end of a rope to them, after which it was an easy matter to tow the boat to shore.

The marooned men were not unduly excited over their mishap and both later laughingly expressed their determination to come back next year after the big trout that played around their boat while they were awaiting rescue.
