

WEATHER BUREAU OBSERVER GIVEN AIRPLANE TRIP

Flight Over District Will
Aid in Giving Weather
Bulletins For
Aviators.

Government Endeavoring to
Cooperate in Providing
Greater Safety on
All Air Routes.

In order that he may be able to more efficiently cooperate in the handling of weather reports relating to flying conditions in the Roseburg vicinity, E. H. Fletcher, meteorologist in charge of the Roseburg station of the U. S. weather bureau was the guest of the P. A. T. company on a flight from Medford to Portland and return while on his recent vacation. Mr. Fletcher sends three reports on weather conditions each day, the first at 6:30 a. m. and two others at hourly intervals. In the event the weather is bad bulletins are continued throughout the day whenever any change that might affect flying is noted. Mr. Fletcher receives reports from various parts of the county, and sends reports not only for Roseburg but for the entire district.

Medford makes similar reports for the southern part of the state, and a complete summary of conditions is made up at Portland and sent out to all airports for the benefit of them.

In order that Mr. Fletcher might be more thoroughly versed in the conditions faced by a pilot, the nature of the topography and various other factors entering into the daily flights over the coast route, the Pacific Air Transport company took him as a passenger on a flight over the state.

Was Thrilling Experience
"As it was my first trip in the air, it was a very thrilling experience," Mr. Fletcher said, "but it was also a most helpful one, for I feel that I can now be of greater assistance to the pilots on the coast route in furnishing them with weather information that will be of practical use."

"Leaving Medford we flew on a direct air line to Portland, passing about 20 miles east of Roseburg, and also east of Eugene."

"Despite the fact that we were considerably east of Roseburg, it was not difficult to locate the city. I was particularly impressed by the sight of Mt. Nebo. While the promontory with which we are all so familiar is not unusual from a standpoint of elevation, it is very conspicuous from all directions. From Medford to Eugene, almost all of the way, as soon as we had crossed the Rogue river range, Mt. Nebo was in sight. When the government places a beacon there, as is to be done in the near future, it will be visible for a great distance in every direction."

Snowcaps Are Guides
"Another thing that impressed me is the use made of snowcapped mountains by the pilots. In leaving Medford on a clear day, every snowcap in the Cascade range, clear into Washington, is plainly visible. I was told that a pilot leaving Medford flies straight toward Mt. St. Helens, which puts him on a direct line into Portland. When there is fog over the lowlands and only the mountain peaks are visible, a pilot can always locate Roseburg by Mt. Thielson and Mt. Bailey. Roseburg is directly in line with the summits of these mountains, and when a pilot has the peaks in line he can turn west and make an emergency landing in Roseburg, if necessary."

"Our trip into Portland was over all too quickly. The next morning we started back early, and there was a low fog all over the upper part of the Willamette valley along the Columbia river and the lower Willamette. The foothills of Mt. Hood were fog covered, but at an elevation of about 5,000 feet we broke through into the sunlight, and the peak of the snowcap could be seen above the blanket of fog. It was a very beautiful sight. We ran out of the fog area soon after leaving Portland, and had good visibility all of the rest of the way."

Mr. Fletcher took a motion picture camera along and made a reel of scenic views from the plane.

The weather bureau, he states, is endeavoring to give every possible cooperation in the development of aviation. It has built up a very efficient system for collecting and compiling weather data at frequent intervals, so that fliers may know exactly what kind of weather to expect along all parts of his route, and may thereby make his plans accordingly. Such information has been of great benefit in providing greater safety for passenger flying.

The Roseburg office, Mr. Fletcher expects, will soon be increased to handle a larger amount of aviation bulletins. A ceiling light, which will be used at night to measure the height of clouds, has already been ordered and will be installed soon. It is also expected that additional equipment, map service and other features will be added in the near future to give greater and more efficient service in supplying aviation needs.

RIFLE CLUB WILL SHOOT SUNDAY FOR STATE TROPHIES

The Roseburg Rifle club will shoot tomorrow for the 52nd Brigade cup and the Governor's trophy. The cup is a team prize, while the Governor's trophy is an individual award. Each club in the state will shoot on its own grounds over 200 and 300-yard ranges using both slow and rapid fire. 30 calibre Springfield rifles are to be used, but the shooters have preference of any sights, except those using snailshot (No. 8).

A six-man team will compete for the cup, Hugh and Steve Pearson, Ben Shields, Hugh Harrison, J. W. Smith and Leland Powell, having won, as a result of try-out matches, the right to represent the club in this squad. Several other members will participate in the individual match.

The try-outs were held last Sunday and the scores from that shoot, together with those to be recorded tomorrow, will be used to select 40 men from among the marksmen of the state to make up the group from which to select the Oregon team that will go to Camp Taylor. The adjutant general of the state will appoint a committee to select the 41 best shots from among the 40 marksmen and these, together with a captain and coach, will make the trip to Ohio. Last year the Roseburg club had three members, Hugh and Steve Pearson and Vernon Orr on the 11-man team, which won high honors in the shoot.

Sunday, August 4, the local club will compete for the Oregonian and Meyer and Frank trophies, using small calibre rifles. These trophies were won last year by the Rock Quarry team of this county.
