## 39 PERSONS SICK AFTER CONSUMING POISONED PASTRY

CHICAGO, July 29.—Twenty-nine persons who ate coffee cake sold by a north side neighborhood bakery were suffering today from food poisoning. Six of the victims were in a serious condition and it was feared that one might die. A policeman was stationed at the shop to keep it closed until the health department completes an investigation. Cakes were taken for inspection by health authorities. The victim who was believed to be dying was Mrs. Francis Bonifer. Five of those stricken ate the cake at a family reunion at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Hildebrand in Palatine, Ill. It was the second wholesale poisoning case within a week. Several days ago five city firemen, a family of 15, and a mother and her son were poisoned after eating cake bought at a north side bakery. All recovered.

## HEARING OPENS ON WEST COAST RATES

CHICAGO, July 29.—The Interstate Commerce commission today opened a ten-day hearing on the application of West Coast lumber manufacturers for a reduction in the freight rate on lumber from west coast states to points in Indiana, Michigan and Ohio. Testimony of all interested persons will be heard during the sessions of the commission here, after which members will return to Washington before issuing a decision.
