

RUTH'S HOMER WINS 12-INNING BATTLE AGAINST ST. LOUIS

Through the enforced idleness of the Athletics, the Yanks found an opportunity to whittle away a little of the Athletics' lead yesterday and just barely took advantage of it. It took a home run by the ace and only Ruth to enable the Yankees to down the St. Louis Browns, 7-6, in 12 innings and cut the Athletics lead to ten games. With the score tied at 6-6 in the 12th, Ruth, the first man at bat, drove the ball into the bleachers for his 24th homer of the season. Lou Gehrig had hit his 25th homer in the first inning with one on.

A four run rally in the ninth gave Cleveland a 9 to 6 triumph over the Washington Senators. It was the Indians' third in a row over the Senators.

Aided by a home run and two singles by Marry McManus, Detroit's rookie pitcher, Kyle Graham, won his first game in the American league, beating the Boston Red Sox, 5-2. Graham saved only nine hits and blanked the Sox after the third inning.

Cubs Enlarge Lead In the national league, the Chicago Cubs increased their lead over Pittsburgh to two and a half games by trouncing the Phillies again, 7 to 2, for their seventh successive victory. Guy Bush won his 14th game of the season against a single defeat, giving the Phils six hits.

The New York Giants beat St. Louis, 10-5. Mel Ott got his 25th homer of the season. Cincinnati ran its winning streak to five by beating Brooklyn in both ends of a double bill, 4-1 and 7-5.

Today vigilance at prisons was even more keen, four machine guns were placed on the docks at Sing Sing prison, to guard the fence that separates the prison grounds from the Hudson river.

At 1:15 p. m., a trusty strolled across the yard to where Mark Osborne, keeper of the prison key room, stood. As he neared Osborne, the trusty whipped a pistol from his clothing and fired.

Osborne fell beneath the feet of half a hundred convicts who had sprung from all parts of the prison yard in response to the signal of the pistol shot.

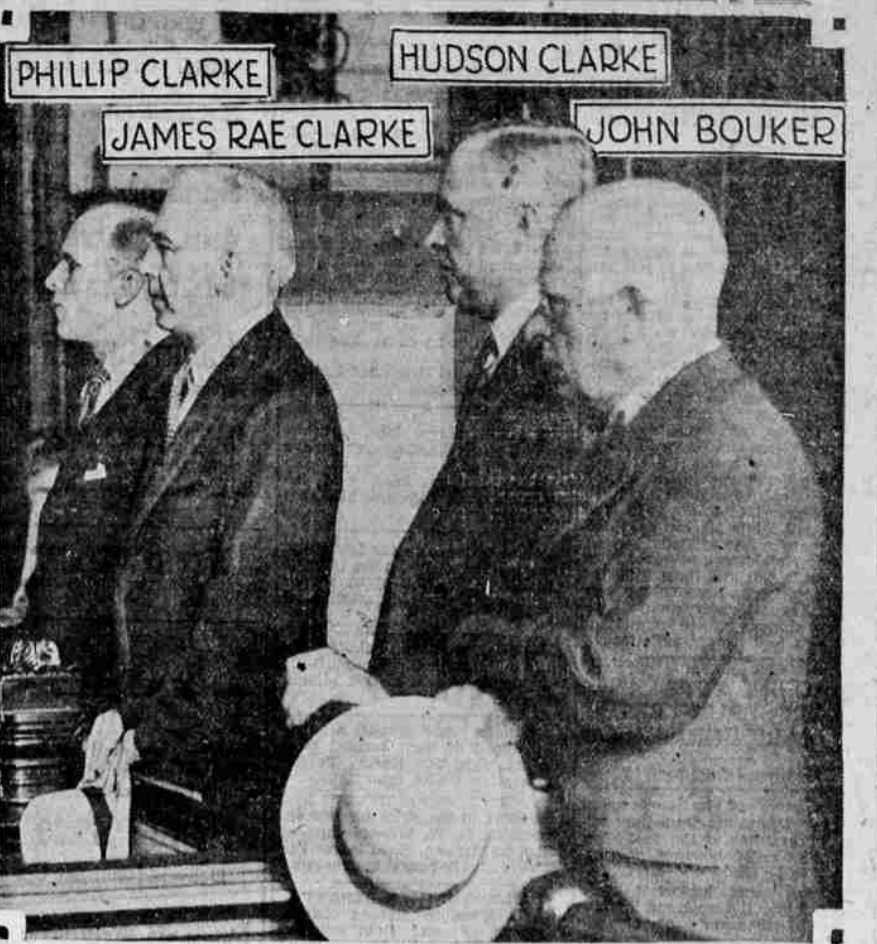
As the prisoners swept over him, they snatched Osborne's keys from his pocket and headed for the arsenal. There they seized every available rifle and four sub-machine guns and rushed for the main gates.

Milton Ryther, on guard at the gate, locked the gates and threw the key over the wall into the street. Then the mob was upon him.

Under the menace of leveled rifles, Ryther backed up the stairs to the wall and into one of the guard houses near the main gate. He was followed by four convicts, two of whom according to witnesses who saw the incident from the streets, carried machine guns. While one man covered Ryther, the other three swept the street in front of the prison with rifle and machine gun fire. Then the four leaped from the wall to the street.

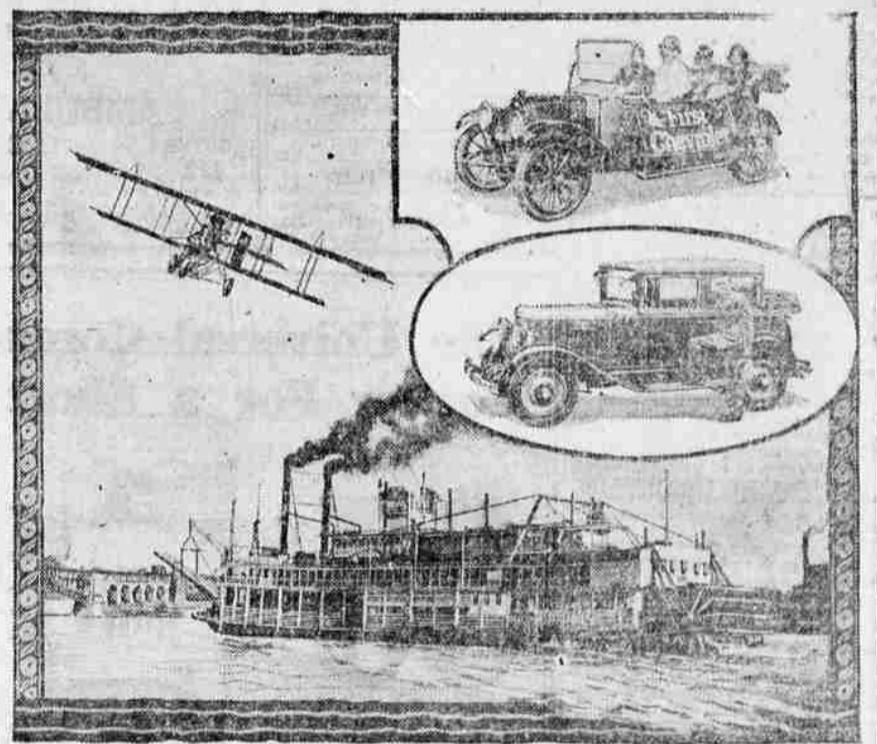
Two of the convicts, armed with rifles, jumped into a passing car driven by Jacob Reese of Auburn and forced him to drive them out of the city. On the outskirts they compelled him to stop near an unoccupied shed which they prepared to fire. Reese bolted. Three shots were fired at him by the convicts, one shot puncturing his pocketbook.

MYSTERY POISON KILLS THREE OF BRITISH FAMILY

LONDON, July 29.—A verdict of murder by poison, administered by a person or persons unknown, was returned by a coroner's jury today in the conviction of a "rotten" suspect over the body of Miss Vera Sidney, one of three members of the same family whose deaths are connected with England's great poisoning mystery.

The mystery, which has all the elements of a Conan Doyle detective story, was further complicated by threats of death received by the coroner and chief detective on the case. A constant police guard was kept at the coroner's house. Mrs. Grace Duff and her brother Thomas Sidney also have received threatening letters.
