HOP GROWERS OF OREGON UNITING TO GUARD INTERESTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SALEM, Ore., July 29.—With all but 128 of the more than 550 hop growers in the state signed up to participate in organization of the hop growers association, which has as its principal object the protection of the hop industry against adverse legislation, backers of the movement are predicting a large attendance from all hop producing sections of the state at the organization meeting to be held here August 3.

Growers of western Washington will hold a similar meeting Wednesday of this week and have promised to send a large delegation to the local session. It was announced Monday by Frank E. Schenck.

The proposed organization will have nothing to do with marketing of hops other than to keep members posted as to the trend of the market and crop statistics.

HOLDUP MEN GET THREE-YEAR TERMS

\$80 PER TON FOR ROGUE RIVER PEARS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) GRANTS PASS, Ore., July 29.—With a fifty per cent fruit yield in view, Rogue River valley pear growers are selling their crops at a price of approximately \$80 a ton to buyers who are swarming over this territory closing contracts. Buyers report the valley fruit in excellent condition for canning purposes and within a few days the movement is expected to attain top speed.

One Grants Pass box factory has contracts in sight for two million fruit boxes utilizing six million feet of lumber. One contract alone calls for delivery by August 29 of 23 carloads or 45,000 pear boxes for the movement of Rogue valley pears.

Large contracts have been placed here by California growers.

Miss Swearingen is a graduate of the Monmouth high school, class of '26, and was a member of the graduating class of the Oregon Normal school which received diplomas this week. Mr. Rose also is a graduate of the Normal, and both have teaching positions near Cottage Grove for the coming year.

KLAMATH FOREST REPORTED ABLAZE

Sixty-four lookouts near Bonanza lake said they could see the flames. They also reported a fire on Horse Sign creek in the Agness district, and six foresters have been dispatched to fight the flames.

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DOUBLEHEADERS OF SUNDAY PUT SEALS FURTHER IN LEAD

(Associated Press Leased Wire) Pacific coast league standings today showed the San Francisco Seals holding down a comfortable lead, with 21 victories out of 29 games, with the Hollywood Stars second and the Los Angeles Angels third. A sudden and decisive change in the leadership lineup resulted from yesterday's doubleheaders.

The Seals lost the first series in thirteen weeks of play when the Oakland Oaks won the first encounter of the day, with a score of 14 to 5. The Seals won in the afternoon 3 to 2.

The Portland Ducks rallied after a loosely played first game which they had dropped to the San Francisco Mission Reds 9 to 4, and won a thrilling second contest by a 3 to 2 count. The visitors from the bay city collected 15 hits in the morning affair, while the Ducks were held to 8 scattered hits. In the afternoon the Portlanders gathered only 6 while their rivals bagged 17.

Hollywood wound up a big week at Seattle by soundly thrashing the Reds twice in the day, first by a score of 6 to 5 and later by 12 to 5. The Stars won the week's series by 6 out of 7.

The reviving Sacramento Senators, after dropping 13 games in a row before defeating the Angels in the southern city Saturday, stepped out and won both games yesterday. The scores were 5 to 3 and 6 to 2. The Angels won the series, however, four games out of seven.

BANK OF AMERICA AND BLAIR GROUP PLAN TO COMBINE

NEW YORK, July 29.—Formation of another huge investment trust, sponsored by the bank of America-Blair corporation interests, was reported to be under way in Wall street today. Capitalization of the new company, it is understood, will consist of \$50,000,000 preferred stock and a substantial block of no par common, with \$25,000,000 in cash raised immediately. E. R. Tinker, former president of the Chase Securities corporation, is reported to have been named as head of the new company.

In the spring contest the Roseburg gunners took first place, winning from marksmen all over the state. Last year the local club had three representatives on the 11-man team which won high honors in a national contest.
