PLANT EXPERTS DISCUSS COSTLY INSECT PESTS.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 29.—Plans for concerted action against the spread of insect and plant pests which annually cost the United States several billions of dollars were discussed at the opening session today of the eleventh annual meeting of the western plant quarantine board.

George G. Schwela, director of plant industry, Nevada, and A. C. Plouffe, of the California department of agriculture described the manner in which refrigerator cars used for Florida fruit had been fumigated to combat spread of the Mediterranean fruit fly.

Insect invasions are responsible for the disappearance of the backyard orchards, once a common adjunct to the American home, Harnden Bonnell, agricultural commissioner of Utah, declared in outlining work of the board.

ALTURAS LINK NO AID TO ROGUE GROWERS THIS YEAR.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 29.—The expectation of Rogue River valley fruit shippers that the 1929 fruit crop would move over the Alturas cut-off of the Southern Pacific will not be realized, railroad officials said today. The line will be operated for fruit shipments in 1930.

The Alturas branch will be ready August 15 but the roadbed will not be in shape for fast freight. A few trains of the winter varieties of peaches may be hauled over the new line but the main portion of the estimated fruit crop of 4000 cars will be routed via Davis, Calif., as of old.

R. E. Burgener of Boulder county that no one can live within the confines of the county without wearing clothes.

Burgener made his announcement to the Chicago cult after he had spent several hours chasing a "phantom master" in and out among the rocks of St. Vrain Canyon, where seven women and three men have taken refuge "for the good of the soul." The phantom, said to be Alvin Karpis, was reported to the officer by a woman tourist, who complained that the man was taking a sun bath without a suit back. The cult proved futile.

REFORM SCHOOL FAILS TO CURE YOUTH OF CRIME.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 29.—Alvin J. Young, 21, and James Baker, 18, who completed a two-year term at the Monroe, Wash., state reformatory July 27, were today sentenced to prison terms at Salem. Young was sentenced to not less than four years, and Baker to not less than three years. The pair entered the Rogue River lumber company office here and stole a shotgun, a fountain pen and a screw-driver.

VOLCANO RAZES VILLAGE.

SEVA, Fiji Islands, July 29.—The British consul at Tonga today reported a volcano eruption on the island of Niw-Fu, one of the Tonga group. The village of Futu was destroyed. No lives were lost but the people of the island are absolutely destitute.

GIRL OF 9 KILLED AS AUTOS COLLIDE.

SALINAS, Calif., July 30.—A collision between two automobiles cost Edith May Lynch, 9, her life and seriously injured her sister, Evelyn, 5, and Clyde Sutton, driver of the car in which they were passengers. Segundo Blanco, driver of the other machine, was held for investigation.

ALFALFA WEEVIL IN JACKSON COUNTY.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 30.—A. C. Allen, member of the state horticultural board for southern Oregon, reported yesterday that alfalfa weevil had been discovered in the fields of this county. The weevil, he declared, were confined to an area between Central Point and Phoenix, about two miles wide. He said the state board would take steps to quarantine the infested area.

CHICKEN CANNERY OPENS IN ROSEBURG

Canned chicken is not altogether a new product, but chicken canned in a Roseburg plant is an entirely new feature. This food delicacy can now be had, since the Roseburg Poultry company has established a canning department to their plant. This new feature is under the management of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Talbot, experienced and expert operators, who are busy filling an order from an Oakland, California, retailer, and other orders from points in the Golden State will keep the local canning plant busy for three weeks or more. The canning is done in a gas heated latest model steam boiler, the chicken being boned and placed in glass containers before cooking, so that the meat loses none of its sweetness and flavor by the operation. This new industry is located at the corner of Court and Main streets, and already it is evident, the poultry company states, that additional equipment must be installed to keep up with increasing demand.
