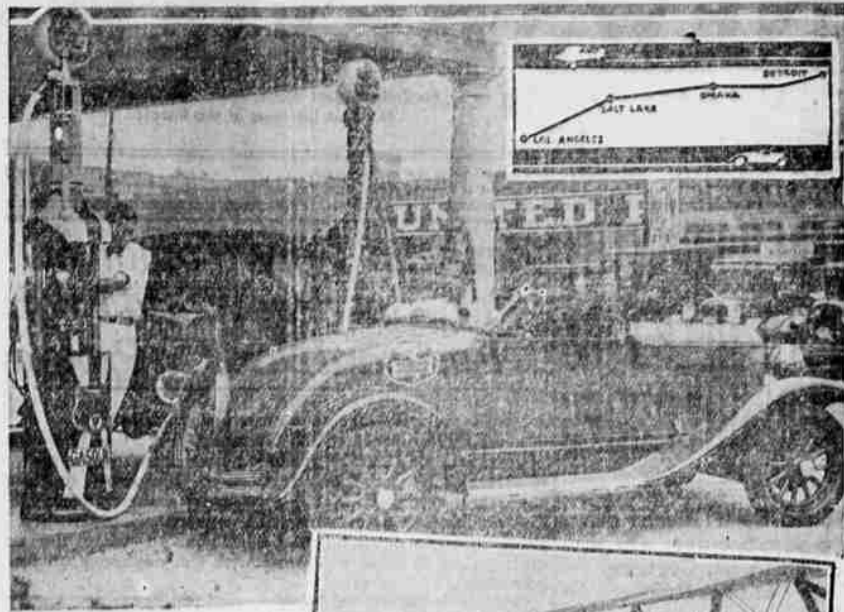

the police chief had released Smith from his "iron," the Plymouth driver was escorted in honor to the local Plymouth factory where he was appointed to a factory sales position.

Smith's arrival was the termination of a dramatic cross-country trip in which, chained to the wheel of his car, the Californian averaged in running time 38 miles per hour between Los Angeles and Detroit. Check of his gas tank, which had been filled with Richfield at the start and refueled in Salt Lake City and Omaha, also with Richfield at the latter points, showed his fuel average 20 1/2 miles per gallon. He added, he stated, no oil to the crankcase of Richlube with which he started.

An unusual feature of the feat was the fact that the key to the handcuffs, which were applied in Los Angeles by Police Captain Griffin, was air-mailed by Western Air Express to the Detroit police chief.

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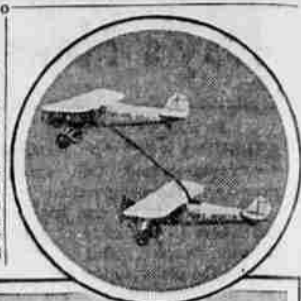
