HEALTH LECTURER LAUDS COUNTY ON WORK DONE HERE

"The chosen officials of Douglas county are neither the masters nor the servants of the people." This statement was made at the meeting of the Douglas County Public Health association, in Umpqua park this afternoon, by Lloyd Wilcox, public director of the Oregon Tuberculosis association in a talk to "Community Leadership." "You have chosen your public officials," Mr. Wilcox continued, "to be co-workers with you in making Douglas county a place for full, abundant living.
"It is for this reason that the Douglas County Public Health association exists. Public health can best be promoted by whole-hearted cooperation of the official county health unit on the one hand and the private health organization of interested citizens on the other. It is the private citizen in each community who knows best the health problems surrounding him and can point out the needs to the county health officer and the nurses."
Mr. Wilcox congratulated the county upon the establishment and maintenance of its full-time county health unit, characterizing it a sound investment that will yield sure dividends through the years to come.
"One safe investment is in the protection of the people from unnecessary losses by illness, and the education of the young in proper means of health preservation," the speaker said. "It is the duty and privilege of the private citizen in every community to exercise community leadership in seeing to it that health services now operating are continued and strengthened by the cooperation of the public throughout the county."

Grant-Lee Memorial Is Overman's Plan.

North Carolina Senator Offers Suggestion for Banishing Sectional Feeling.

NORFOLK, Va., July 30.—Abolition of the last faint traces of sectional feeling between the north and the south is the goal of Senator Lee S. Overman of North Carolina.
His plan is for statues with the bridge now being built across the Potomac river.
Senator Overman is 75 years old and has served his state in the senate for 25 years. As a conception worthy of the wisdom of his years as well as the traditional culture of his beloved "old south," his suggestion has received attention of the memorial bridge commission, and a report will be made at the next session of congress.
The bridge, itself a symbol of a nation no longer divided, will lead to the Lincoln memorial on the Washington side and touch Arlington cemetery in Virginia.
Senator Overman has suggested that two sculptured female figures twining the north and the south should be erected in the center of the bridge. At the northern end, he would place a figure of General Grant looking south and on the other side a figure of General Lee looking north.
And to stress the idea of absolute unity between the two sections, Senator Overman's plan stipulates that the figures of the two famous fighters be posed in attitudes and facial expressions of peace and understanding as they look toward the lands which they once wished to conquer.

GAS BLAST KILLS THREE

TRAIL, B. C., July 31.—Two men were killed almost instantly and a third injured when an acetylene gas tank exploded in the burner shop of the Consolidated Reduction plant here today.

EX-NICARAGUAN CONSUL SHOTS HIS FRIEND IN FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The life of Celso De Leon, shot through the spinal cord by Francisco De Leon Perez, former Nicaraguan consul general, ebbed today while attorneys for the Central American official prepared to show in court he had become insane.
Police investigators asserted their belief that Perez, recently separated from his attractive wife, had been crazed with jealousy when he boarded a California street cable car yesterday during the midday rush and fired three shots across the crowded aisle. The third bullet paralyzed De Leon from the breast down.
"Why did you shoot me, my friend?" De Leon demanded when Perez was brought to his bedside for identification. "I've known you 15 years. Your wife has been a mother to my little niece. Why did you shoot me?"
Police said Perez' only explanation was that De Leon had "insulted" him. He refused details. They said he admitted De Leon was the man he intended to hit. He was charged with assault with intent to commit murder. He refused to see visitors, even his son, Oscar.
Until a few days ago Perez was consular agent for Guatemala as well as consul general for Nicaragua. A Guatemalan representative here said Perez had been removed from the agency after the government received information that he was acting wildly.

FIRE DESTROYS ARENAL

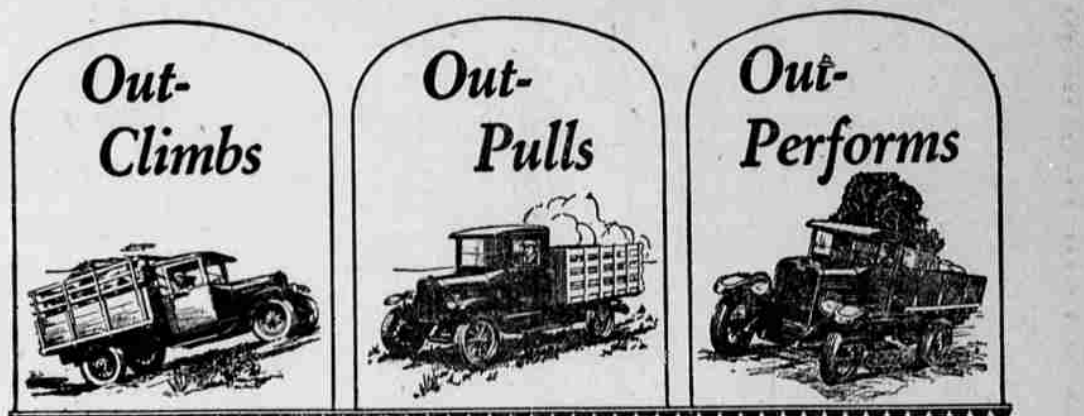

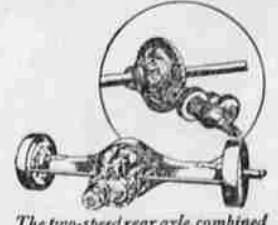
