

TESTED BRAKES MEAN SAFETY

The public does not realize what safety and brake testing campaigns mean to them, says W. T. Palmer, manager of the Russell Manufacturing company.

Statistics just issued by an insurance company in Hartford, Conn., show us just how serious the automobile death situation is. More than 12,000 deaths were recorded due to motor vehicle accidents during the first 6 months of 1929. Compare this to the 12,000 men of the A. E. F. who died of wounds received in action during the entire World war, and a realization of just how serious it is, can be had.

Going further into the war statistics we find that automobile accidents comprise approximately one-fourth of the total number of all soldiers who were killed during the World war.

The figures for the first 6 months of the year do not show any decrease from 1928 figures. Higher speeds, more cars, heavier pedestrian traffic and the ever increasing menace of thumb jerkers on the road means greater care in driving—reliable and quick-acting brakes—as well as cool and level-headed thinking on the part of drivers.

The National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, through the Highway Education board, Architects Ridge, Washington, D. C., offers more than \$6,500 in prizes for essays and lessons on safety on the highway. It is to our own advantage and safety that we follow a few of the rules on safety in driving that are already well known.

GEO. A. MANSFIELD DIES IN OKLAHOMA

MEDFORD, Ore., July 30.—Word was received here today of the death yesterday in Ada, Okla., of George A. Mansfield, for many years active in the civic and political life of southern Oregon. He was prominently identified with the Oregon state Grange. Death followed a heart attack.

Mansfield was one of the main proponents of the cooperative movement among Oregon farmers. He was a candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator in 1926 and also ran for the legislature from this district. He was active in sportsmen's circles.

Mansfield is survived by his widow, Rose, and five children. Mansfield was about 65 years old. He was legal fame and fortune by his conduct of an Indian land case that, after a long court fight, resulted in millions of dollars being paid by the federal government to the Indians. At the time of his death he was engaged in a similar case in the Oklahoma courts.

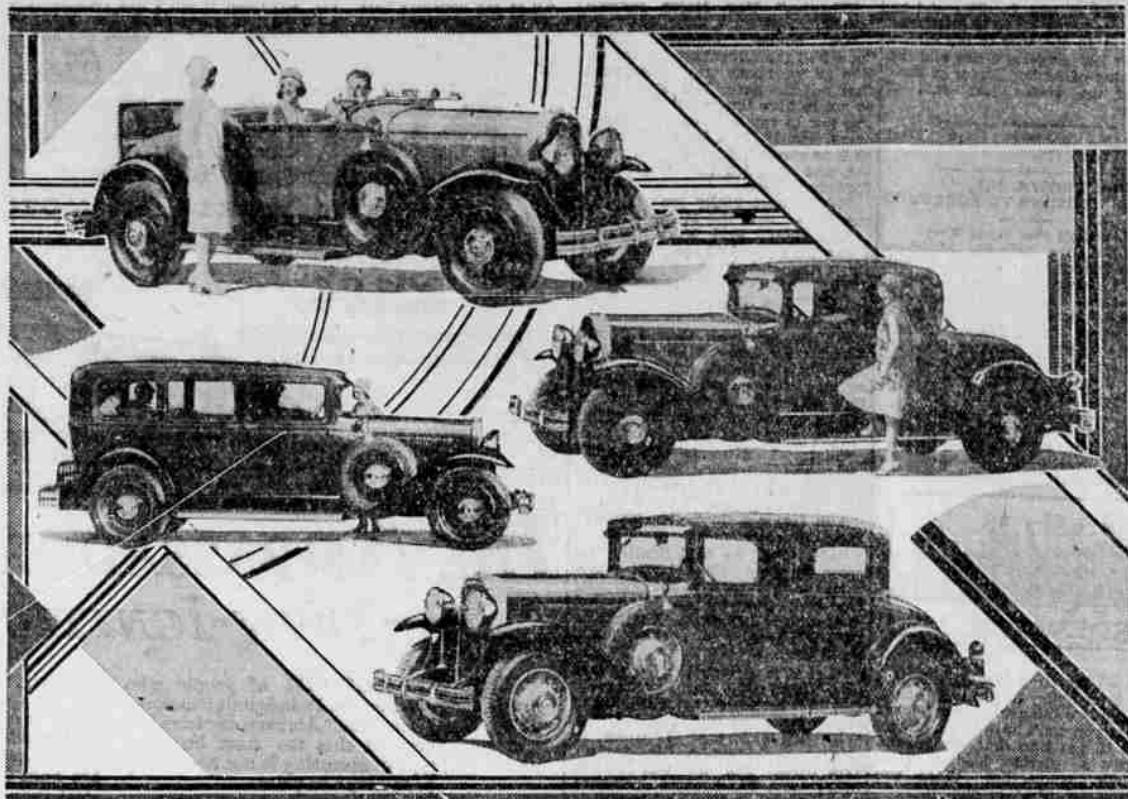

CHIEF OF MICROBE HUNTERS RETIRES TODAY AT AGE 70

Dr. Theobald Smith, director of research at Rockefeller Institute, New York City, who was characterized by Paul de Kruif as "Chief of American Microbe Hunters," is 70 years old today. And today he is relinquishing to younger hands the control of the institute's research work. He will, however, continue his bacteriological studies.

Dr. Smith was the first to discover that disease germs could be carried and transmitted by insects.

He demonstrated in 1892 that the Texas cattle fever was passed from animal to animal by cattle ticks. This find was the open sesame that later led to the discovery of the carriers of malaria and yellow fever—two species of mosquitoes. Still later it was found that sleeping sickness was spread by the tsetse fly.

Dr. Smith was also first to discover the difference between the human and bovine types of the

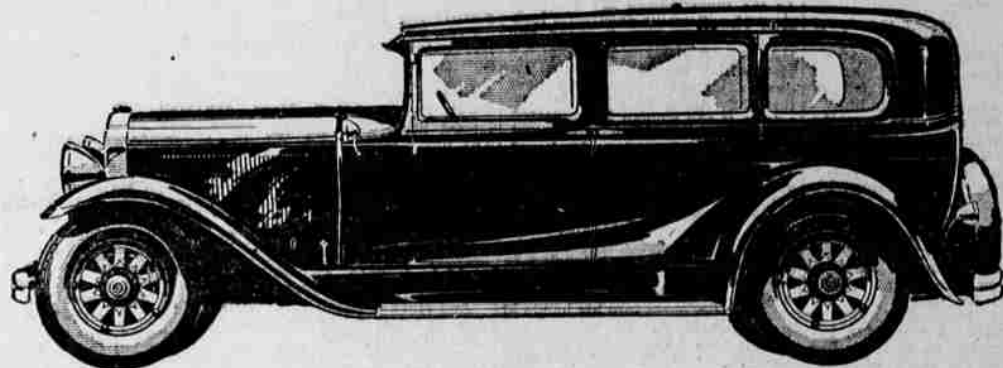
