STATE PRESS COMMENT

(Ashland Daily Tidings) Cities located along the Pacific highway are becoming aroused over the routing of travel over the coast rather than the inland route and the nucleus of a booster organization which will work to give the Pacific highway the former position which it enjoyed up until the completion of the coast route is to be formed soon at a meeting to be held in Yreka.

Ashland started this agitation for more advertising of the Pacific highway. The Dunsmuir News, under the heading, "Advertising Pacific Highway," has the following to say editorially relative to the matter: "For a number of years before the Pacific highway was in the good condition it is now there was an active Pacific Highway association that functioned out of San Francisco. While the completion of important changes in the highway that will make it one of the best in the United States, the people of San Francisco seem to have lost interest in this great north-south road."

"For the past two years the Redwood Highway association has been functioning on all eight cylinders with the head office in San Francisco, and this year the effort is fourfold by the association in having fruit in greatly increased traffic over the Redwood highway. This news comes to us by word of mouth of motorists from Dunsmuir who have recently made the trip over the highway from Crescent City south.

"It would appear that San Francisco knows that a large number of motorists will go into that city over the road regardless of any effort to promote the general well-being of the highway. Therefore, it is up to the towns located on this great motor artery to better themselves, organize a new association and get out advertising matter that will

measure up to the literature used by other highways to promote travel. This literature must be gotten out and sent east during the winter months while the people back there are planning their trips to the Pacific northwest next summer.

By what the last detail will be announced along the route of the Pacific highway, and then it cannot be said that there is a bad piece of roadway in the entire length of the road from Canada to Mexico. There is only an 8 mile detour in any one section, and that one is in such condition for travel.

"There will be several changes made in the highway next summer in the northern part of the state but they will not interfere in any way with travel. "The towns in Shasta county should wake up to the fact that the Pacific highway is the best asset they have. If properly advertised thousands of people instead of hundreds will travel over the highway next year, and bring hundreds of thousands of dollars into the coffers of the business men along the route. This is outside money, and it therefore all the more we come to our people.

"There is no sense in sitting around and talking things over. What is needed is immediate action in order to prevent the interference of the people along this wonderful highway. Call a meeting and instead of passing resolutions, do something worth while. Raise money and get action as soon as possible."

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Body Poisons Mean Danger

Dr. Copeland Explains the Evil Effects That Follow from a System of Blood and Intestinal Poisons.

NOT long ago I told you about the dangers which result from the absorption of body poisons. Why is it we overlook the importance of this subject? I have no doubt that constipation is a far greater factor in disease production than is generally believed. It stands as a reason that the presence in the body of a fermenting mass, must give rise to unpleasant symptoms.

Fortunately, the lining membrane of the lower bowel, the colon, is so constructed that absorption through its tissues is not great. But, in spite of this protective measure, happily provided by far-seeing Nature, there is some invasion of the body by this route.

Not only is there direct absorption, but bacteria or yeasts find in the content of the colon just exactly the proper conditions for rapid growth. Ultimately these agents, possibly of disease, are taken up by the blood.

Once more we have occasion to be grateful to the Master Creator. Provision has been made to filter out of the blood these poisons, whether they be chemical or bacterial.

But if their quantity and number are too great, the poor, overworked liver cannot handle them. Then they get into the general bloodstream and are carried to every part of the body.

Just what will happen then depends on chance and the resistance of the individual. We are confident however, that rheumatism, heart disease, various of the so-called "degenerative diseases," may be traced to the evil effects of chronic constipation.

It is a mistake to regard constipation as an unimportant condition. It is exactly as much a mistake to neglect the intestines as it is to neglect the teeth. Neither should be done.

Almost invariably constipation is the direct effect of wrong eating. A proper selection of foods will be likely to benefit any case. Of course there are other factors. The walls of the intestines are largely muscular. These muscles are just as dependent on right living as are your other muscles.

Seldom need be told the importance of exercise, sunlight and the out-of-door life as being capable of beating the general muscular system. They are just as important to the welfare of the intestinal muscles.

Think over what I have said today. Perhaps you, too, are among those neglecting the intestinal tract.

SHERIFF ADVISES IMPRISONMENT OF WAYWARD NEPHEW

(Associated Press Limited Wire) OAKLAND, Calif., July 31.—Holding his nephew by marriage "is a wayward youth and should be held to answer for the protection of society," Sheriff W. H. Jones of Fresno county, in a letter to Alameda county authorities, today recommended a prison sentence for 18 year old Lyle Poole. Poole, alias James Horton, pleaded guilty to robbery. He was charged with having robbed a restaurant proprietor in Oakland of \$15 on May 2.

The youth, Sheriff Jones said in his letter, "has a bad record" and recommended that Alameda authorities get in touch with the chief of police at Klamath Falls, Ore., where Poole was given probation, and authorities in Ashland, Ore., where he was charged with a store burglary in 1922.

JACKSON COUNTY OUTLINES WAR ON ALFALFA WEEVIL

(Associated Press Limited Wire) MEDFORD, Ore., July 31.—Steps for stringent control and eradication of the alfalfa weevil, recently discovered in the fields of Jackson county in an area between Central Point and Phoenix, were taken by the county court today. A district seven miles long and two miles wide is infested.

Appointment of an inspector with power to issue permits for the shipment of alfalfa hay and straw, to inspect fields and stacks, and to conduct a field service for new infested areas, was authorized. The inspector will be named by Oregon State college and will be a part expert. Work will start within ten days.

Movement of alfalfa and straw from the infested area to other sections of the county will be prohibited. A consignment of ichneumon, a parasite fly—harmless except to the alfalfa weevil—is expected this week from Salt Lake City.

DENVER WOMAN NAMED TO DIRECT INDIAN TRAINING

WASHINGTON, July 31.—Secretary Wilbur today appointed Miss Mary Stewart, of Denver, assistant director of education for the United States Indian service. Secretary Wilbur said that Miss Stewart will formulate plans for changing the training in Indian schools to lay special emphasis on vocational features. Supplementing this, Miss Stewart will develop plans for placing Indians in industrial pursuits after they have received training.

Miss Stewart received her A. B. degree from the University of Colorado and had done graduate work at Columbia university and the University of Chicago. She was for eight years a faculty member and dean of women at the University of Montana, later being associated with the employment service of the department of labor.
