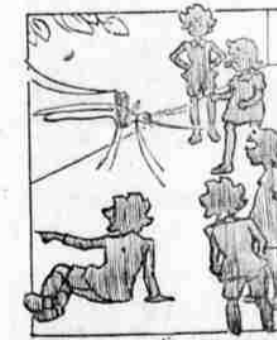

"Don't do it!" shouted the shadow-children. They tried to push May's hand back under the cover, but it was too heavy.

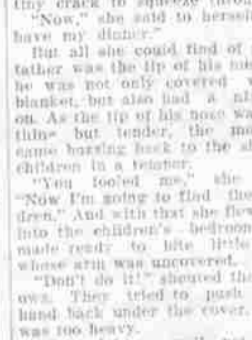
"You might as well not interfere," the mosquito said. "I'll all be over in a moment."

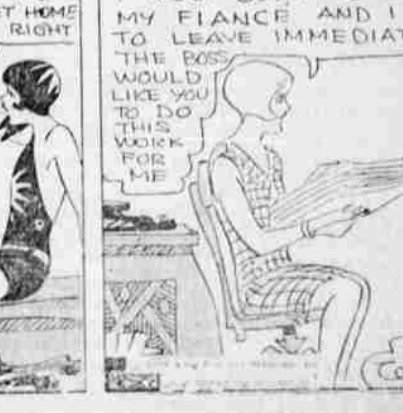
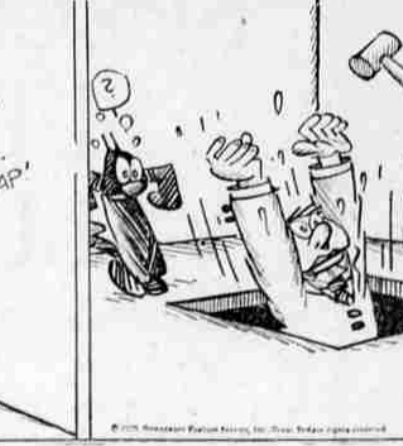
