FORMER CHINESE WAR LORD SHOTS EX-EMPEROR'S KIN

(Associated Press London Wire)

TOKYO, Aug. 2.—Chang Tsung Chang, former war lord of Shantung, early today shot and seriously wounded Prince Hsien Kai, cousin of the former emperor of China, P'u-Yi.

Mysterious circumstances surrounded the affair, which Chang claimed was accidental. Chang's version of the shooting of the young Manchu was that a revolver which he was handling upstairs at his hotel at Beppu, island of Kiushiu, exploded hitting the prince, who was standing in the garden below.

Hsien Kai was 21 years old and graduated from the Japanese military academy in July. He was spending a vacation in Beppu and had visited Chang on the evening of the shooting.

The authorities are investigating the accident story. Chang Tsung Chang, former war lord of Shantung at one time, was one of the most powerful figures in northern China before the chief lieutenant of Chang Tsi-Lin, the northern war lord who was killed by a bomb explosion more than a year ago, while returning to Mukden after his defeat by the nationalists.

OREGON BANKING DEPOSITS DECLINE BY TEN MILLION

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2.—Banking deposits have decreased over \$10,000,000 in Oregon in the last year, says a statement today by A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, concerning the call of June 29 last, showing the condition of business in the 236 banking and trust institutions at the close of business on that date.

The statement adds: "The present total of deposits, \$290,455,011 is lower than that shown by any June report since 1924. Of this total \$150,346,445.56, or over 55 per cent, are held by the banks of the city of Portland, \$10,956,972.49 by the banks of Salem, \$8,073,782.44 in Eugene, \$3,345,456.03 in Pendleton, \$6,266,602.90 in Klamath Falls, and \$5,382,987.32 in Medford. The deposits of these six cities, the only ones in Oregon reporting deposits of over five millions, aggregate \$197,371,356.74, or nearly 68 per cent of the total for the state.

"The reduction in number of banks continues. Eight years ago there were 293 banking institutions and trust companies in operation in the state, a year ago, 244, and at the time of this report, 236."

SLIDING SCALE ON SUGAR TARIFF SMOOT'S NEW PLAN

(Associated Press London Wire)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—A sliding scale sugar tariff plan, ranging from one cent a pound at the time market prices are high to three cents a pound when the market is depressed, was made public today by Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee.

Smoot will offer the proposal as a substitute for the flat rate of 3 cents a pound placed on sugar in the house tariff bill. Hearings will be held next week at which time the substitute will be considered by the committee.

Under the sliding scale, the present rate of \$2.20 on sugar would apply when sugar is selling in New York at 6 cents a pound, which is about the present rate. Cuba would receive the same 20 per cent preferential under the sliding scale as it now enjoys when the flat rates on sugar are applied.

Protests against any reduction in the industrial tariff schedules, if increases are made in the agricultural duties in the house tariff measure, were made before the committee today by Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire.
