COOPERATION IS NEED OF TOWNS, SAYS PENNEY MAN

"One of the investigators for the J. C. Penney Co. recently completed a cross-country trip by motor car, calling on scores of store owners and seeing the picture of the towns in the light of the average resident of any city or town in the country," says A. A. Richard, manager of the local store of the organization.

"Out of his trip he suggested the following question and answer which have been sent to every manager of the 1285 towns where there are stores. The question is: 'What does business owe its home town?' The answer is, 'Cooperation with every worthwhile activity in town'."

Quoting him, Mr. Richard says, "Cooperation means co-working with everyone in town in every way that can make the town better."

"Business should work closely with local government bodies for the local officials are custodians of the public good in the cities where they serve. Better business committees from the business clubs could well afford to have joint sessions with the local administrative bodies."

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SAFETY DEVICES GET ACID TEST ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 1.—A series of tests to determine the practicability of newly devised safety equipment was started today when a locomotive and a train of fifty tank cars and cabooses, all especially equipped, were given trials on a level stretch of track near Walker, 18 miles south of here.

Prof. Harry Reubenkovich of Purdue university, and a corps of research assistants are directing the experiment, for which the American Railway association, representing all the railroads of the United States, has appropriated one million dollars.

The tests are expected to cover a period of ten months and will subject to every possible operating condition, new types of equipment developed in the past four years.

Two hundred cars will be used in the tests which will be made with trains of 50, 100 and 150 cars at a time. The first tests will be made with empty cars and the later ones with tank cars filled with water.

Accurate data on the performance of all-braking equipment such as is now used, is desired. Later the cars will be fitted with the present types, and rigid tests will be made under similar operating conditions.

Eugene has been selected as headquarters for the operation tests, the Shasta route tracks of the Southern Pacific between Eugene and Dunsmuir, Calif., having been selected as offering the best facilities in the country for testing equipment under all conditions of level track, grades and curves. The heavy grades over the Siskiyous are expected to give the equipment as severe a test as would be offered anywhere in the United States.
