### BOTTLE DRIFTS 8,300 MILES

An 8,300 mile voyage by a tiny "ship" of glass was recently reported by the U. S. navy's hydrographic office in Washington, D. C. On September 27, 1927, an officer of the American steamer K. R. Kingsbury tossed a bottle containing a message giving the location of the ship into the Pacific off the coast of Lower California. Seventeen months later, on February 12, 1929, it was picked up in the Philippine Islands, 8,303 miles away. This, says Popular Science Monthly, sets a record for a bottle drifting in the Pacific and is believed to be about the longest distance possible in that body of water.

The greatest voyage ever made by a floating bottle was 11,820 miles, beginning in the southern Indian Ocean and ending at Cape Horn, at the southern tip of South America. The record-breaking bottle was thrown in May, 1909, and ended in May, 1912.

### POULTRYMEN MAY GET ADDITIONAL FOR 1927 PRODUCE

Word was received here today by J. H. Clark, director of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers association that if the board of directors approves the plan an additional payment to members of 15 cents per case will be made for all eggs shipped during 1927. "This is an evidence of the financial strength of the egg cooperative and illustrates the fact that every possible amount will be paid the producer when he ships through the association," said Mr. Clark.

A mail vote is now being taken and should the directors vote in favor of making the additional payment on the 1927 shipments it will mean additional payment of from \$50.00 to \$200.00 to the members who shipped eggs during that year. Producers have already been paid a reasonable market price on their 1927 eggs and the additional payment comes as the result of the careful and efficient handling of the egg output by the association.

### GRAF ZEPPELIN GOING STEADILY OVER ATLANTIC

S. Seibel, special correspondent of the Associated Press aboard the Zeppelin, confirmed the existence of a stopover aboard. He was found just after the Zeppelin left the hangar. He jumped from the hangar down into the Zeppelin. If he had jumped between girders he would have endangered the ship, Doctor Eckener said he would be returned from America with the next steamer and severely punished.

Another message from the Graf told something of life aboard the ship. "We had champagne as soon as we were under way," the message said, "which resulted in a late breakfast. The two women became slightly nervous when we encountered strong headwinds shortly before lunch and were buffeted for an hour in the Rhone valley. Our progress was retarded.

"The route has been out of our way, but necessary to miss bad weather in northeastern Spain. A large tank of drinking water up in the bag sprang a leak and saturated the ceiling of the salon during lunch. There was much excitement but nothing to worry about. We had an excellent game of bridge in the afternoon.

"The new motors are performing perfectly at high speed."

Weather Favorable

Other messages from the dirigible said that the weather cleared after seven hours of steadily opening winds, and that the speed increased from under 45 miles an hour to more than 62. Passengers who were on the unsuccessful attempt in May enjoyed greatly pointing out landmarks below them of that historic struggle of the Zeppelin to regain its hangar.

Weather reports from the United States said that the Zeppelin was navigating in a region of diminishing headwinds and improving conditions.

LYMPNE, England, Aug. 2.—The Duchess of Bedford, England's flying duchess, started in her blue monoplane today on an attempt to fly 10,000 miles to India and back in a week. Captain T. D. Barnard piloted the machine with Bob Little acting as engineer and second pilot. The plane is called the "Spider."

Oregon River Honored.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 2.—Lieut. Harry A. Sutton of Aumsville, Ore., of the army air corps, was awarded the distinguished flying cross by the war department for distinguished service in the air. Lieut. Sutton has specialized in attempting to solve the problems of spinning in airplanes. His work the citation read, was conducted successfully under "most hazardous conditions."

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## NEW WEATHER PLAN PROVES OF VALUE TO BIG AIRPLANE

Proving the efficacy of the new service established by the U. S. weather bureau here, a big transport airplane was enabled to continue its journey south this morning after being forced back here by threatening clouds encountered at Myrtle Creek.

The big ship enroute from Portland to California points returned to the north field here at 11 o'clock to find out how the weather in southern Oregon and around the pass was. Kenneth Householder, a former Roseburg boy, who is relief pilot and mechanic on the ship, consulted E. H. Fletcher, weather observer, who takes care of the new service, and found that the plane could proceed with safety.

Mr. Fletcher phoned to Medford and Wolf Creek and found that the weather was clear. In less than an hour after it stopped here the transport was able to go on its trip.

This was the first demonstration of the value of the new plan, Mr. Fletcher pointed out. Recently the government sent him on an airplane observation trip in order that he might be acquainted with flying conditions in this section and be able to render service to commercial and air mail flyers.

## WEATHER GOOD IN JULY, IS REPORT OF E. H. FLETCHER

Eight days of July were partly cloudy and the remain 23 were clear, according to a report covering the month completed this morning by E. H. Fletcher, government observer in charge of the local bureau.

The mean maximum temperature for the month was 82.2 degrees and the mean minimum was 52.6. This made an average temperature of 67.4 degrees. Precipitation for the entire month totaled .01 of an inch, all of which was registered on July 19.

The highest temperature recorded was 94 which was on July 25 and the lowest was 45 which was on July 26.

Measurement of the wind for the month showed the prevailing direction was north and that the total movement was 2108 miles. The average velocity was 4.2 miles an hour and the maximum velocity for five minutes was 22 miles an hour.

### STEAMER DAMAGED AS IT CRASHES INTO PIER

HAVRE, France, Aug. 2.—The Ile de France, maneuvering with difficulty in a heavy wind last night, bumped into the pier here and its side was ripped open above the water line, for sixty feet along the steamer's quarters. Two passengers were scratched but their injuries were said to be very slight.

The French line announced that the damage to the Ile de France was unimportant and would not prevent the liner from leaving for America on scheduled time. Her next sailing westward is August 13.
