Opponents In Chicago Lightweight Affair



At the left is Tony Canzoneri, former world's featherweight champion, who failed in a game effort to wrest the lightweight crown from Sammy Mandell, pictured on the right. The challenger stayed the ten-round limit with the champion in Chicago Friday night and actually gained the referee's vote for a decision. The two judges, however, decided for Mandell, who impressed them by speed and cleverness.

MANDELL GAINS 2-1 VERDICT OVER TONY CANZONERI

Champion's Superior Skill and Speed Overcomes Fierce Rushes of Challenger.

(Associated Press Local Wire) CHICAGO, Aug. 3.—Tony Canzoneri, the chesty one, has gone the way of all featherweights who become too ambitious and Sammy Mandell, master ringman and boxer, is still the lightweight champion of the world.

Attempting to achieve what Johnny Kilbane, Johnny Dundee and many other featherweights, competitors failed to do, the flat nosed New York Italian gamely challenged the Rockford shiek for his heavier crown in the Chicago stadium last night, but received nothing but a neat boxing lesson, the decision going to Mandell after 10 stirring rounds.

Mandell won mainly by speed and boxing ability, after losing the first two rounds because of Tony's rushes and right hand attacks that caught him off guard. The champion calmly curbed his rival with his long left and choppy rights to pile up a decisive margin.

Tony had a chance only in those first two rounds, but he couldn't follow it up.

Mandell's accurate left hand, called the best in the business, fired sharply and true to the challenger's face and at the final gong Tony's face was well puffed up.

Sweeping overhand rights rocked the champion several times in those first two rounds. Sammy fought a very cautious fight against the ambitious contender.

The third was the turning point and in that session the real Mandell went to work.

Losers Gain One Vote.

Dave Barry, central figure in the much disputed "fourteen count" of the Dempsey-Tunney fight in Chicago, was referee and cast his vote for Canzoneri. Judges Ed Klein and Phil Collins agreed on Mandell as winner. Collins was third man in the ring when Mandell won the lightweight championship from Rocky Kansas here on July 4, 1926.

More than 24,000 witnessed the fight. An unofficial statement of receipts placed the gross receipts at \$105,000. Of this sum, Mandell receives 40 per cent and Canzoneri receives 20 per cent.

The champion was far from satisfied with his performance even though he thought he had won.

If Mandell carries out his announced intentions, he will next attempt to get a match with Jackie Fields for the welterweight title. He outpointed Fields before he is confident he can repeat.

Luis Vicentini, the Chilean lightweight, scored a surprise by winning the decision over Ray Miller, Chicago left hook artist, in the ten round semi-windup, which was put on after the championship fight. He dropped Miller in the second round with a right cross, and outslugger Miller in the last two rounds. He nailed Miller with straight rights repeatedly. Vicentini weighed 125 pounds and Miller 134.

SEALS CONTINUE TO LEAD RACE FOR FINAL HALF FLAG

Away to a flying start toward honors of the final half of the Pacific coast league season, the San Francisco Seals yesterday bettered their lead over the second place Hollywood Stars by defeating that aggregation 3 to 5 at Los Angeles. The Seals lead the league with 23 games out of 32. The Stars have won 21 out of 33.

A 0 to 3 advantage held by the Stars until the eighth inning was shattered by the mighty swats of Smead Jolley and "Red" Wingo, who put over a couple of homers.

The Los Angeles Angels paraded five pitchers at Recreation field, but despite their efforts the Missions won 9 to 5. The Reds pounded the five for a total of fourteen hits.

Roy Chesterfield, with his fast overhand shots completely baffled the Seattle Indians, his team mates on the home lot at Portland helping to carry off a 12 to 1 victory. But for Falk's Texas leaguer back of short when two outs had been called, Chesterfield might have had a shutout. Sixteen hits were the lot of the Ducks, while the Redskins were satisfied with ten.

Sacramento's Senators defeated the Oakland Oaks 8 to 4 at Emeryville. The Senators backed the game away in moth balls in the ninth frame when they pounded Pete Daglia for three runs.

ATHLETICS ADD TO LEAD BY WINNING AS YANKEES LOSE

The so-called ball games in the American league yesterday provided the customers with 35 runs on 47 hits and enabled the Philadelphia Athletics to stretch their lead over the New York Yankees to 11 1/2 games.

The A's outclass the Detroit Tigers in a fray that lasted two hours and 14 minutes to win by 11 to 4. The Yanks played two hours and 25 minutes before dropping a 5-8 decision to the Cleveland Indians.

Irving Hadley outpitched Alvin Crowder at Washington where the Senators downed the St. Louis Browns, again, 5-3.

A two-run rally in the tenth gave the Boston Red Sox a 3 to 2 decision over Chicago.

Cuba Also Gain. In the National league, the league leading Chicago Cubs, held idle by rain, gained another half game on Pittsburgh which was blanked 2-0 by the Phillies. The Pirates' defeat left them five and one-half games from the top.

The St. Louis Cardinals pounded Dazzy Vance for 18 hits and 13 runs in six innings and coasted in to a 14-7 verdict over Brooklyn. Ernie Ottavelli, Cardinal outfielder, got four hits and Jim Bottomley hit his 24th homer of the year.

The Cincinnati Reds finally broke the spell Fred Fitzsimmons has woven around their bats this season and beat the New York Giants, 3-2. Fitzsimmons had pitched 36 consecutive scoreless innings against the Reds until they scored a run on him in the first inning yesterday.
