

ANNUAL MEETING OF TURKEY MEN SLATED AUG. 13

LIGHTNING STARTS 200 FIRES IN U. S. FORESTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 3.—An electrical storm sweeping over the Cascade mountains from the south-east point in Oregon to the Canadian border started at least two hundred fires in national forests last night, officials of the forest bureau here estimated today.

None of the fires was considered serious, however, and fast action by rangers prevented most of the fires from spreading.

The forest office declared that present cloudy weather has not eliminated the fire hazard, but that a heavy rain is needed to dampen the forests.
