## COUNTY CANVASS FOR EGG PACKING PLANT LAUNCHED

Today and Tuesday will see the actual solicitation work of the campaign to secure an egg-packing station here begin, it was announced this morning.

Poultrymen who are trying to secure the station in Roseburg are busy today interviewing members of the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers association to check up on the increase of hens signed up with the concern and to solicit new members and get them on a contract.

H. E. Garney is working in the southern end of the county, including the chicken farms around Myrtle Creek and south. George Burt is canvassing the central portion of the county, including the Camas Valley, Dillard and Brockway sections, and J. H. Clark and J. C. Leedy are busy in the Garden Valley, Melrose and Dixonville sections. Mrs. Anna Thompson and H. C. Hirst are working in the Umpqua section and J. E. Cooper has the Okanadi and Sutherlin divisions. J. H. Holloway and L. S. Compton will interview growers around Yoncalia and Drain.

Three thousand one hundred new hens signed up were reported this morning, with prospects of many more to be added today. The 2009 reported were from the Myrtle Creek, Wilbur and Roseburg districts.

A large delegation of Douglas county poultrymen are expected to go to Coquille Sunday to attend the picnic at which at least 12,000 more hens will probably be added to the county's allotment. There was little doubt in the minds of the leaders in the district today that the campaign would be put over. A total of 75,000 to 100,000 hens signed up is necessary to secure the station which will mean a new industry in Roseburg and a ready market and good prices for poultry products in the entire county.
