

ROSEBURG LEGION WILL HAVE LARGE GROUP AT SALEM

Umpqua Post No. 16 will be well represented in Salem at the American Legion district convention this week. More than 100 legionnaires from the Roseburg post are planning to be in attendance and expect to have among their number the largest legionnaire, George Hoban, 275 pounds, 18 1/2 feet, four inches tall and red-headed. Counting Hoban as but one member, the Roseburg post numbers 553 and is cited as being the largest legion post for a city of this size in America.

Compensation was secured during the year for 46 ex-service men and 20 men were admitted to the veterans hospital as a result of this post. A strong contender for the junior baseball championship was the Douglas county team, and an extremely fine Boy Scout troupe is sponsored by the Roseburg post.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—Hubert Veltum, 22, of Eugene, a student at Oregon State college, was fatally injured on the beach near Waldport yesterday when the automobile in which he and Miss Anna Fletcher, also of Eugene, were riding overturned. Veltum died 30 minutes after the automobile turned over when it struck loose sand. Miss Fletcher had several broken bones. Veltum was the son of Robert Veltum of the Veltum and Clow Iron Works of Eugene.

Mrs. R. P. Burke, 35, of Olympia, Wash., was killed when a tire blew out and overturned her automobile near Garden City, Kansas.

COLUMBIA RIVER TAKES TWO LIVES

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 5.—Eve Stange, 17, lost her life yesterday in an unsuccessful attempt to rescue Glen Robinson of June, as the two were swimming in a slough on the Columbia river. Midway across the slough Robinson suffered an attack of cramps. The girl swam to his side. Both drowned.

CONVICT CHOOSES DEATH TO RETURN TO PENITENTIARY

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—William Barry, a convict on parole, lost his nerve yesterday and was arrested. A short time later he recovered it and it cost him his life.

Barry was paroled from the Joliet state penitentiary in January, 1928, where he was serving time for robbery.

Yesterday Barry was out riding in a stolen car. He lost his nerve when he saw a detective squad approach and sped away, attracting the attention of the detectives, who probably would have passed by without noticing him.

In custody, Barry was recognized as a companion of "Red" Bolton, in whose west side saloon Detective Sergeant Joseph Callahan was killed several weeks ago. The policeman accused Barry of the slaying.

"No," he protested, "you'll pin no 'bum tags' on me!"

He was taken to the bureau of identification. Seeing his chance, Barry dashed to the window and jumped.

Police saw him land on his feet on the roof of a passing elevated railroad train, away directly, clutch for support, and plunge 40 feet to the alley, where he was killed instantly.

HUNTING SEASON OPENS SEPT. 15; RULES STRICTER

The deer hunting season will open September 15 this year instead of the 10th as last season, and the number of days will be five less, according to the official synopsis of Oregon hunting laws.

A slight tightening up of the rules and regulations is evident in the new laws. Last year two of any kind of deer could be shot by a hunter, but this year the regulations call for one male deer and one black tail or two black tails. Last year two male deer could be killed.

"The increase in the non-resident hunter's license from \$15 to \$19 is another change."

Deer, duck and pheasant hunting are the most popular in this vicinity and equipment stores in Roseburg report that as yet there has been little call for hunting paraphernalia, although the rush will commence within the next few weeks.

Hunting and angling licenses may be produced from any county clerk by applying in person or by application signed by two freeholders on regular blank which may be obtained from county clerk or from any regularly appointed agent of the state game commission. It is stated:

Captain Winch himself will, from now on, tell the world about the Umpqua. He took several hundred feet of film with his camera and has borrowed John Ewell's North Umpqua fishing club, and sporting organizations all over the United States.

HITS COMMERCIAL FISHING

Asked his opinion of the future of fishing in the North Umpqua, Captain Winch said: "Commercial fishing at the mouth of your river will mean the doom of fishing in the upper river. Under ordinary circumstances and even after your road to Diamond Lake is completed and the world is driving along the banks of the stream it is not likely to be fished out by anglers—but the canneries can run it all in a very short time."

Every effort will be made to influence congressmen and other influential men in government affairs with whom he is acquainted to pull for the completion of the North Umpqua road by the government.

"It is nothing short of a crime that you people here are engaged in reaching the Cascades with a road through the forest," he said.

Captain Winch is traveling on a fixed schedule and did not intend to stop in Roseburg at all. He would have passed right through the city without stopping had his attention not been attracted by the parking of the commercial secretary of Winchester street, he said. The sign, placed there by the Roseburg Lion's club, so impressed him and Mrs. Winch that they decided to stop at the chamber of commerce office and ask about it. E. R. STOWAWAY SHUT UP ON ZEPPELIN; TO BE DEPORTED

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Buhakow, I learned, had arrived in Friedrichshafen the day before—on a bicycle. He's a baker and questionnaire, born in Dortmund, Germany, August 17, 1911.

He had a friend with him, it was said, but at the last minute, the friend's nerve gave out, apparently. They certainly did not make any hero of the young man. I don't think any of the other passengers bothered to ask his name. Many of them didn't even know he was aboard until word came he was far out over the Atlantic.

Isolated and Ignored
Among the passengers he didn't come in for any particular censure. We simply ignored his presence. "We locked him in a room so that he could not run around and commit further nonsense," said Dr. Eckener after describing how the youth used a rope to drop from the top of the Graf's hangar into the bag. "He had a very ingenious idea."

"This poor blighted young man got his foolish idea from the American stowaway," the doctor continued, referring to the recent flight made by Arthur Schneider of Portland, Maine, in the trans-Atlantic plane Yellow Bird.
