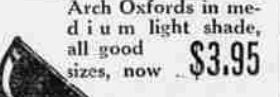
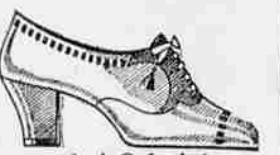

GRAF ZEPPELIN TO START TOMORROW ON WORLD FLIGHT

LAKEHURST, N. J., Aug. 6.—Work of refueling and replenishing the German zeppelin, Atlantic dirigible Graf Zepplin, went forward today in preparation for her departure at midnight tomorrow on the first leg of a globe-circling air voyage.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, her commander, will head his giant air liner back to her home port, Friedrichshafen, Germany, from whence she arrived Sunday. From there the dirigible will continue eastward around the world, with stops at Tokyo and Los Angeles, Latin America, and back to Germany, a total of 22,000 miles.

On the flight to Friedrichshafen, the Graf Zepplin has booked 18 passengers, some of whom have made reservations for the world tour.

The pay load for the world trip is expected to bring \$500,000, half the cost of the dirigible's construction. Of this 18 passengers existing \$8,000 each will bring \$144,000, while mail and freight, which Dr. Eckener said are more profitable, will bring twice as much.

White more than 100,000 persons flocked to the naval station here to view the huge air visitor, a former German battleship, as it was being towed to the water by a tugboat. The dirigible was towed by a tugboat, the Zepplin, towaway, now awaiting departure.

CHARGE OF ARSON FOLLOWS FIRE THAT TOOK THREE LIVES

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 6.—Dorothy M. Doby, operator of a drug store mysteriously blown up during a fire early yesterday, today suggested the police theory that an arson plot was responsible for giving five names to the police.

The blast took the lives of three firemen and injured eleven others. Three of the men named are under arrest with Doby and two others believed to be the master in the plot are being sought. The alleged drug store, Doby said, was destroyed by fire and she was injured. The men named are John L. "Pat" Crawford

and D. L. Piggott. Firemen said the floor appeared to have been covered with inflammable liquid.

Names of three other men mentioned by Doby, one of them being held, were not made public by the police.

Feeling over the death of the fireman was at a high pitch among the crowd in the neighborhood of the blast. Thirty-five men were on duty at police headquarters where the men were held to guard against violence.

ELEVEN FUGITIVE NARCOTIC ADDICTS OBJECT OF SEARCH

(Associated Press United Wire)
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—Deputy sheriffs and peace officers were making an extensive search today for eleven of sixteen drug addicts who escaped from a state hospital at Spadra near here late Sunday night.

Three were in the county jail here and another was in the custody of his father, while the fourth was captured in a road near the hospital shortly after the addicts' outnumbering the armed guards, forced the doors of their dormitories, surmounted a ten-foot wire fence and made their getaway.

The outbreak started soon after the order of "lights out" for the night had been given. The rioting spread from ward to ward until the hospital authorities were forced to call for help from two sheriff's subdivisions.

On arrival the deputies soon quelled the rioters and instituted a search for those who had escaped. The outbreak was said to have been caused by the intense craving for narcotics by the rioters. They failed to break into the hospital stores, however, it was reported.

The rioting culminated a bad week. J. G. Knox, chief parole officer in charge of the addicts, said "There had been an undercurrent of discontent, but we did not expect violence."

Ed K. Jensen, director of the institution, in a statement following the outbreak, said that the main trouble was caused by the fact that the courts sentenced felons who had the drug habit to the institution instead of to the penitentiaries where they should be sent.

He declared that those who made their escape were really dangerous and not the type of persons who wanted to rid themselves of the drug habit.

"Patients of this type should be put in penitentiaries, not here in institutions where patients are desirous of relieving themselves of the craving for drugs."

will be augmented from time to time as conditions warrant. I sincerely believe there is need in Roseburg of such a clinic as is proposed by the plan and that in due time any lingering doubts as to its desirability will be completely vanquished. Other cities in Oregon, in common with cities in all other parts of the country, are welcoming the establishment of these modern medical hospitals, and there isn't any reason why Roseburg should be passed up in that respect.

Oregon Hospital association and the Roseburg Hospital and Clinic, two separate organizations, was definitely announced this morning by E. K. McLendon, who has been assisting in promotion of the movement.

The state corporation department today issued to the association a permit to sell \$17,500 in stock for the completion and equipment of the hospital in Roseburg.

"The Southern Oregon Hospital Association, Inc., was organized in July for the purpose of establishing a clinic and hospital in Roseburg and to operate an association in southwestern Oregon," Mr. McLendon stated. "On completion of the organization of the company in Portland on July 30 a 20-year lease was signed for the four-story Perkins building, with plans complete for using the two top floors as a 15-room, modern hospital."

Will Remodel Building
"The ground floor will be tenanted as at present and the second floor will be used by professional men. The two top floors, occupied by the hospital, will be leased from the association by the Roseburg unit which is now being incorporated."

"Such alterations and equipment will be made as will adapt the building to hospital requirements. The institution will be operated along strictly ethical lines and will follow out the latest developments in clinical and hospital work."

"Financing of the hospital will be done through solicitation of the general public. The purpose of the organization will be to furnish hospital and surgical care and medicine at a nominal cost, such services to be contracted by investors. The plan is to cooperate with professional men in this city and furnish a clinic and hospital available for use by the general public and any practicing physician for private patients."

Directors Being Chosen
Among the directors and officers already on the board of the new organization are Dr. Twichell, Dr. S. Housner and E. L. Eddy. Announcement of the remainder of the personnel will be made soon.

Remodeling work will begin immediately on the Perkins building where it is necessary to change the arrangement. Latest and most improved surgical equipment will be installed just as soon as possible, it was stated.

The head of the new organization first came to Roseburg in 1928. He practiced here until 1925, serving as corner for three terms and participating in many civic improvement enterprises. After a trip to the east, where he took postgraduate work, he returned to Portland, specializing in obstetrical work. In 1916 he was appointed medical director for the national W. O. W. organization and went there and a half years organizing and reconstructing that work along scientific insurance lines. Shortly before leaving Denver he was stricken, in 1918, to make the opening address at the national convention of the medical section

of the order.

Was State Officer
Among his other experiences is included a term as vital statistician on the Texas State Board of Health, and preparing that state for examination by Washington, D. C. health authorities for admission into the registration area.

Returning to Portland in 1926, after engaging in specialized insurance work, he practiced there particularly on oncology and diseases of the heart and circulatory system.

On a recent visit to Roseburg, he said this morning, he noted the rapid development of Roseburg and Douglas county and was persuaded by friends to head the new hospital. He notes with pleasure, he states, the completion of the Medical Arts building, which he characterizes as being in line with improvements in other cities in Oregon in the medical profession during recent years.

"That, in conjunction with a hospital and clinic with up-to-date scientific equipment," he stated today, "will provide medical care for the most serious ailments and do it expeditiously." He believes the ready accessibility and adaptability of the Perkins building will make it ideal for hospital purposes.

MAYOR HOOVER ACCUSES COUNCIL OF MALFEASANCE

ing into the future as well as the past for the upbuilding and prosperity of our beautiful city.

"As yet no avail has knocked at their doorways, but you have blocked everything suggested by your chief executive. You have sacrificed the interest of the municipality and that to your own personal greed and with a unanimous unit, or vote of the entire council, and to the detriment of the city. Roseburg certainly needs no more notoriety as has been handed her in the past six months."

Holds Promises Ignored
"Gentlemen, why not stick to and keep your promises as was suggested you would do by a paid advertisement in the Roseburg News-Review before your election. Pleading for yourself that if elected as councilmen of the different wards you would run the city up on an economical basis and support a business-like administration. The racket and objections and extravagance that you have seen fit to promulgate since your term of office as councilmen does not support your promises and as your chief executive I challenge you to show me why you have not kept your promises with the people."

Says Power Usurped
"Gentlemen, you have continually without a single exception attempted the usurpation of the powers of the mayor, the chief executive of this city, and arrogated to yourselves the duties and powers expressly delegated to the mayor by the charter of the city of Roseburg. You have refused to provide a suitable dump ground for the disposal of refuse and deleterious matter, with a resultant menace to the health of the citizens of the community and leaving a blot upon the civic beauty of the city of Roseburg, noticeable to the incoming and outgoing passengers on trains and stages."

"Gentlemen, I charge you with gross incompetency by attempting to discharge your duties of councilmen on the theory laid down by yourselves or your star chamber advisers and not confining yourselves within the law as prescribed by the city charter."

Extravagance Alleged
"I charge you with flagrant extravagance in the purchase of road machinery, not required or necessary in the needs of the city at a price scandalous in amount and without notice to competitive firms now residing in the city of Roseburg. This was thoroughly demonstrated in the purchase of a roller and cooking pot to repair hot holes and streets torn by private parties. If the council was determined to buy a roller and cooking outfit, why was it not done in the regular way by passing an ordinance first and giving the taxpayers an opportunity to remonstrate and show reasons, if any, for the necessity of such a purchase? It is my idea when it comes to the expenditure of thousands of dollars of expense to the city, that the citizens and taxpayers have some say."

Batch of "Whys"
"One word regarding the roller and cooking outfit which you councilmen have attempted to buy when the necessity did not exist. I would ask you the following questions: "Is it the intention of this council to repave the city of Roseburg?"

"If answered in the affirmative, why not proceed in the matter in the manner as provided in the city charter?"

"Why have you attempted the buying of either a roller or cooking outfit when the present outfit is ample to take care of hot holes and torn up streets, if the same be manipulated under competent supervision?"

"Why attempt to buy a roller when you were advised by contractors and road men that the same could not be used to advantage in repaving hot holes and practically useless for that kind of work?"

"Why have you tried to purchase an expensive roller and cooking outfit when you could have bought from local dealers at a saving of \$500.00 on the roller and a guarantee of seven years' service and repairs and they are here to look out for it—a gas motor and one ton heavier than the one now here?"

"Why have you bought a roller on the streets and at your private chambers, when you could have rented one in good running condition of a local contractor who has three rollers, at a cost of \$2.50 per day, or \$19.00 per day and he furnishes an experienced man to run the same, or instead bought the

Says He Was Ignored
"Gentlemen, a local paper has made the statement that the roller controversy would be settled with out argument. I am here to tell you that I stand for the saving of \$500.00 to \$800.00 to the taxpayers and will not under any consideration sign my name as mayor or otherwise, when the council proposes in a slipshod, or go easy way to pussyfoot anything over the city of Roseburg. There has been a lot of correspondence regarding the roller roller and cooking pot, but the chief executive has not knowledge of what has transpired. The only notice I had of what was going on was a letter addressed to the chairman of the street committee, that the roller was purchased by the city council, and the order signed by all the members of the council."

"I wish this time to report to you that the city of Roseburg is being sued by Geo. A. Frew for his salary for the month of June. I as chief executive have asked the dismissal of this man who is acting as street commissioner and have appointed a number of good efficient men to fill his position, but the dead lock has been faithfully carried out with no chance of a change."

"Gentlemen of the common city council for the city of Roseburg, Oregon, I ask you in all candor and for the best interest and welfare of the city, if it is possible, for us to get together and proceed in the half of the best interest of the city, and run the city on an economical and business-like basis?"

"I want to know why the not streets have not received attention? Gentlemen of the common council and the officers of Roseburg, I am not opposed to the keeping in repair of the city streets and do not understand why the street force have not been active in repairing the same."

"The report of the committee appointed to investigate city expenditures was to the effect that they had thoroughly looked into the matter and did not care to be bothered further regarding such investigation."
