Wild Game Birds To Be Released



At the request of a Florida Chevrolet, interested in the propagation of game in his state, the research department of General Motors instructed the San Francisco office of Chevrolet Motor Company to dispatch a scout car to the California State Game Farm for information. More than ten thousand wild game birds will be released this year throughout the state of California. In this unique bird sanctuary, California is setting the precedent for other states.

Added insurance for the future glory of the sportsman's paradise—the hunting grounds—is evident with the news that more than ten thousand wild game birds will be released this year throughout the state of California, according to August Bado, director of the California state game farm. A Chevrolet dealer in Florida, interested in the protection of wild game life in this state, and knowing of the vast activities of the General Motors research department, requested the home office at Detroit to obtain for him data on the manner in which the California State Fish and Game commission goes about the propagation of wild bird life. The research department of General Motors promptly instructed Chevrolet headquarters in San Francisco to proceed with the collection of the requested information and a scout car was dispatched to the game farm in Napa county. Four years ago the state game farm was instituted. A mere handful of wild birds peopled the game farm in those days, but scientific breeding methods and excellent

care—coupled with cooperation on the part of the state and sportsmen—has made it possible for the game farm to achieve an almost miraculous growth. The main output of the farm is the ring-necked pheasant, the most highly prized game bird, from a sportsman's point of view, in the entire west. Thousands of these wary fowl have been released and reports are they are increasing rapidly. While there is no open season yet, the time is not far distant when it will be possible to permit pheasant hunting. The second most prolific crop of the state game farm is the valley quail, plentiful in many sections of the west, but extremely scarce in others. A MOTHER ASKS AID IN LOCATING HER LOST SON. A negro was arrested as his killer. Eight white men and three negroes participated in the fight, using axes, knives, clubs and belaying pins. Police ashore watched the fight for some time, not interfering because they considered the ship American territory. 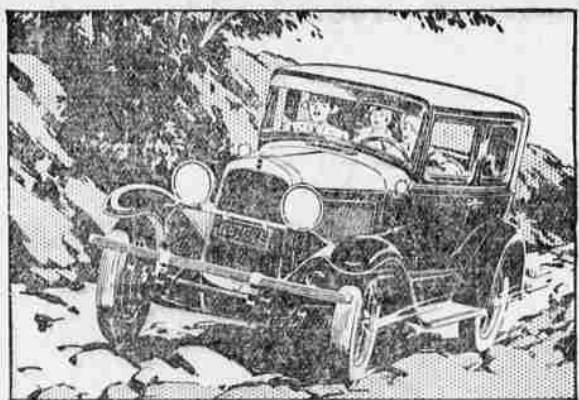
