

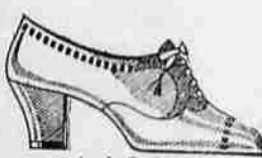
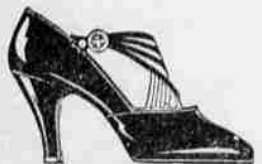

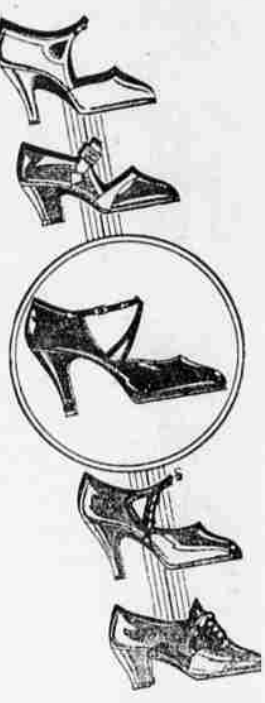

DR. J. STRAUB, 52 YEARS AT OREGON, QUILTS NEXT YEAR

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 7.—Dr. John Straub, 52 years old, professor of Greek at the University of Oregon, will conclude his active teaching work in October, 1930, retiring after 52 years of service to the institution, and 53 years of teaching. Announcement of his resignation was received by the University yesterday. He will continue to make his home in Eugene.

"The teaching age limit at the University is 64 years," Dean Straub said, "that's why I decided to resign. In 70 years old and it is about time I gave the young fellows a chance."

Dr. Straub will teach his regular classes at the university this year. When his teaching duties have been concluded he plans to write his reminiscences of the early days at the school and to trace the history of the institution from its founding to the present date.

He and hearty, Dean Straub made nine commencement addresses in high schools over the state this year. He had seventeen invitations to make addresses.

Times have changed from the days when students went to 7 in classes carrying their own candles. Dr. Straub says, and when he had to light the fire in the classroom stove in Deady hall, the single building on the campus at that time.

AMERICAN LEGION HEAD DEDICATES "PERSHING HALL"

PARIS, Aug. 7.—The American Legion memorial building in Paris was dedicated as "Pershing Hall" today by National Commander Paul V. McNutt of the American Legion, and the colors he brought with him were formally taken into the building. One of the large rooms was named "Horrish Hall" in honor of the late American ambassador to France.

General John J. Pershing and Paul Painleve, who was minister of war then as now, recalled the days of the war, while M. Painleve told how he had read in every school in France a letter which General Pershing wrote Marshal Foch in the dark days of March, 1918, asking that all American troops, trained or not, be thrown into the battle in that critical hour.

General Pershing, thanking the Legion for the honor of dedicating the building to him, said:

"If the legion may be regarded as the presence of Franco-American friendship, this building will be a most important contribution."

OREGON FOREST FIRE SITUATION IMPROVED

Bum Show, Nobody Killed

We learn that there was dissatisfaction at Twin Falls over the manner in which a noted daredevil went over the Shoshone Falls in a boat. Several thousand people gathered to view the hair-raising spectacle. The boat went over the falls, landing in the water below and was towed ashore. Nobody was killed. Nobody was even hurt. It was not nearly as sensational as the advance notices had indicated it would be. And it lasted only a moment. So there was dissatisfaction. Some thought they had been bent out of fifty cents or whatever it was they had paid to get within sight of the falls, which by the way are worth any reasonable admission price in themselves.

It seems that the boat was enclosed and was water tight. This would be a necessary precaution, for the falls are about as high as Niagara. The principal complaint, however, is that the boat was not towed to a light wire, which guided it away from dangerous rocks and made sure it would light in the water. Some claimed the boat was slowed up by the wire, thence it was hard to see how. What did the trouble want? Somebody killed to make the holiday more entertaining?

The real trouble was that the daredevil went with his boat "know his stuff" as the saying goes. He was able to make an apparently dangerous stunt comparatively safe by a simple precaution or two that would never occur to his audience.

It is in the winter when streams run bank full that sediment carried in Rogue river water absorbs the effect of the chlorine treatment, and some bacteria escape destruction.

Purity.
(Grants Pass Courier.)

Safety of the water furnished Grants Pass by the Rogue River Water company, from the standpoint of freedom from dangerous bacteria, is not an issue in the city's attempt to secure an adequate and clean supply for its citizens.

The city makes no allegation that one water is dangerous to health, even in the summer season.

As a matter of fact, city water is much more safe to use in the summer than in the winter when it carries its deposit of mud and assumes a brown tint varying with the state of the river's flow.

Less chlorination is used during the summer than during the winter in the city's water, yet this relatively less drastic treatment is more distasteful to the user, because absence of the mud permits the chlorine treatment to become

more effective, and the excess imparts its offensive flavor to the drinking water.
